The latter is not, be it understood, a common name; for, although I admit that Tubbs is not a very euphonious name, still it suits me, and as far as I know, was always satisfactory to Augustine. Her mother did, I believe, at the earliest stage of my intimacy with her daughter, sniff disdainfully when it was pronounced, but my good conduct and the steadiness of my devotion overcame her objections, if she had any, and Tubbs, by maternal consent, was added to Augustine Clara. The Christian Union (H. W. Beecher), speaking of the speech by Prof. Agassiz, at the opening of Anderson School of Natural History, says:
After a few opening words, felicitously united to put all their minds into fellowship, Agassiz said, tenderly, and with touching frankness, "I think we have need of help: I do not feel that I can call on any one here to ask a blessing for us. I know I would not have anybody pray for us at this moment. I ask you for a moment to pray for yourselves." Upon this, the great scientist—in an age in which so many other great scientists have concluded that praying is quite unscientific and very useless proceeding—bowed his head reverently; his pupils and friends did the same, and there, in a silence that was very solemn and very beautiful, each spirit was free to crave of the Great Spirit the blessing that was needed. For our own part, it seems to us that this scene of Agassiz and his pupils with heads bowed in silent prayer for the blessing of the God of Nature to be given to that school then opened for the study of Nature, is a spectacle for some great artist to spread out worthily upon canvas, and to be kept alive in the memories of mankind. What are coronations, royal pageants, the parade of armies, to a scene like this! It heralds the coming of the new heavens and the new earth—the golden age when Nature and man shall be reconciled, and the conquests of truth shall supersede the conquests of brute force.

This is irrelevant. We only edit the paper and acknowledge we know so little about typesetting that we use a looking-glass when we want to read the paper after it is set up.

2nd, That the Express is indebted to the Free Press for its translated editorials.

This is the first true statement that has appeared in the Mercury for some time. We also credit the Free Press for any translations we insert in the Express. To be able to give a good translation from the German is a very great accomplishment, which may be added to the many other accomplishments which have been denied to Mr. B.

It is more difficult to acquire that his art of setting on the political fence, and being an object of contempt to his enemies and of melancholy derision to his friends. Gov. Ireland.

A number of the lesser lights were nominated for some other State offices. Intense enthusiasm prevailed, speeches were made by Messrs. Ireland, Denton and others. So the status of Wilson is fixed in the coming campaign.

Nothing has given us so much pleasure in a long time as this unanimous rallying of the Democracy

to the Standard of the Republicanist. This is but the beginning of a movement that will teach our San Antonio Democracy a lesson. It is useless to disguise it, Ireland is a power in the land.

Our eastern papers see in him the western cap's paw that will bring the chessnuts out the fire for them. They can pay off the moral obligation they are under to give us a western Governor by electing a man who is a power in the West and at the same time favors the continuation of the spoiling of the West.

Note of the Ireland crew can make a speech in San Antonio that would be listened to by any except the hired peddlers of a few professional office-hunter, but after you cross the Salado on one side and the Alazan on the other the long haired Arabs, who regard railroads as an enemy of their mode of raising stock on other people's land, are enthusiastic for Ireland.

He is the embodiment of opposition to railroads and increased taxation to pay for them. If railroads come, they argue, the country will be filled up with immigrants who fence in the land that our stock grazes on. We don't want railroads and Ireland is our man. The next place where a Republican meeting will be held will be in Atascosa county and it will be as great a success as that of Wilson county.

We recognize in this Ireland-Democracy the genuine Petroleum V. Nasby Democracy, down on schools, railroads, opposed tooth and toenail to anything that interferes with the nomadic state of society which has made the very name of Texas disreputable.

Before these "children of the wilderness" can be tamed the order and peace-loving portion of the Democracy will have "to throw itself into the arms of Radicalism."

Telegraphic.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Germany disavows any responsibility for the capture of the Vigilante. The captain who effected the capture has been ordered home for an explanation.

The French assembly has passed a bill shutting the shipping tax.

The Liberals carried the election at Naples.

Two thousand Remington rifles landed at Bilbao, were received by six hundred Carlists and taken to the interior.

LONDON, July 29.—The government proposes upon the marriage of the Duke of Edinburgh with the Grand Duchess Maria of Russia to increase his yearly allowance to \$125,000.

MADRID, July 29.—The Bishop of Granada, who was held as a prisoner of the insurgents in that city, has been released, and a dispatch has been received at the War Office announcing that the insurgents have commenced an attack upon the Seville government forces in that city, and they were actively resisting the assaults and were confident of keeping off the insurgents.

The Spanish steamer Vigilante, seized by the German man-of-war Frederick Charles, has been given up to the Spanish Consul at Gibraltar.

The report that the Republican agitators in Valencia have joined the insurgents is untrue.

MADRID, July 29.—Senor Palanca, Minister of the Colonies, and the deputies from Pinarion are holding conferences for the purpose of discussing the bill providing for the abolition of slavery in Cuba.

A Carlist force, which has been laying siege to Verga for several days past, made an attack on the town yesterday, but was with a repulse and have raised the siege.

The U. S. Vice-Consul at Valencia announces that two of the vessels seized, the insurgents have sailed from that port with troops for America.

BYRONNE, July 29.—Don Carlos has arrived at Biza in Navarre, 17 miles north-west of Pampelona.

The Carlists are concentrating before Logrona, the Capital of the Province of that name, and an attack will probably be made soon.

One hundred and seventy Carls and other Clergymen have fled from Spain and sought refuge in France.

VIENNA, July 29.—In the barracks in the suburbs of this city there have been in one day as many as two hundred cases of cholera and thirty deaths.

No doubt many of the highest prizes for goods exhibited will be awarded to Americans.

LONDON, July 29.—The Republicans of Bristol have issued a manifesto, protesting against an increase in the allowance of the Duke of Edinburgh, on the occasion of his marriage.

There are six candidates in the House of Commons, occasioned by the death of Sir David Salomon. As four are Liberals, the Conservatives will probably carry the election.

The vessel which landed its cargo of Remington rifles at Fusterabla was one which several times runs the blockade of Southern ports of the United States during the late war. On this occasion she was commanded by an Irishman and manned by an English crew.

BRANZ, July 29.—Bismark has granted permission to the Good Templars to establish lodges in Prussia.

VERSAILLES, July 29.—In the Assembly to-day treaties of commerce with Great Britain and Belgium were concluded by the Duke DeSalerno, and were approved. A message from President McMahon pro-

longing the Assembly was received, and the President says he will answer for the preservation of order during the recess, and will assure every member of respect for the authority of the Assembly. He points out the happy results of concord between the Government and the Assembly, during which he specifies the passage of the bill for re-organization. Alluding to the evacuation of the soil by the German troops, he makes grateful acknowledgments of the successful negotiations of President Thiers to that end; praises the entire department for their heroism, and the French people for their patriotism and abnegation in the protection of their country, he adds, will never cease to feel a sense of it when it remembers what a price has been paid for peace; but manifestations over the event should not be indulged in. Peace is the just necessity, and the Government is resolved to maintain it. Assurances are received daily of the sincere sympathy of foreign powers. The President closed his message by declaring himself shall continue the policy by the frequent and unanimous votes of the Assembly.

Texas News and Views

MEXICAN NEWS.—There seems to be a general expectation on the "Haric" side of the Bravo of another revolution in the State of Nuevo Leon, which will probably break out about September next. The cause is this. There were three candidates for Governor of that State in the recent election, which resulted in no choice by the people. The candidates were Garza Malvo, who runs on his own merits; Ramon Trevino, who was backed by Quiroga, Gen. Trevino, Pedro Martinez and his friends, and Garza Ayala, who was probably the government candidate. The Governor will have to be elected from these candidates by the State Legislature of Congress, when it meets in September, and it will probably elect the first named candidate. Trevino, Martinez and company may attempt to put their man in by force. This is the way the case stands at present, and the foreign merchants at a little unsway at the condition of affairs, as in the event of revolution they will come to grief and have the paper to pay whoever may do the dancing—Banchero.

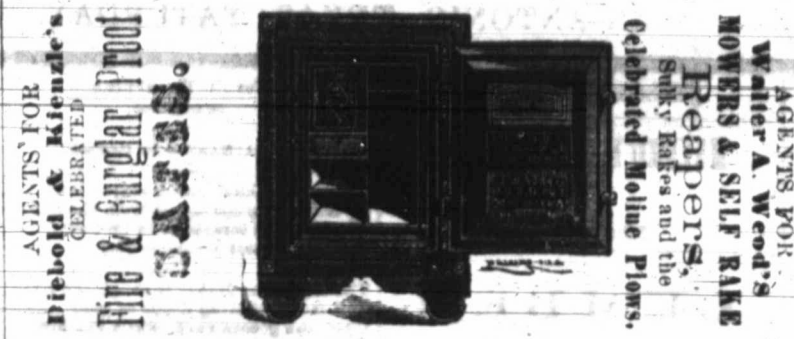
