to this city, having made no sales there. He will remain here a few days longer, and if not successful in selling will, perhaps, turn the matter over to some Wall Street banker, just what he should have done at the start, and he will then return to Washington to renew the fight against Clark and Plets, and the lesser lights that fit around the star-spangled banner of republicanism. It is likely that the well-known house of Williams & Guion will take the nine hundred thousand dollars of bonds, as their claimants to be paid out of the sales of these bonds.


There is much said about the sacrifice of bonds when sold for less than the face. Finances are little understood by the people, and in fact some people deal largely and sometimes successfully, for a time, in stock and bonds, without fully understanding "finances." These state bonds are seven per cent. gold paying interest bonds. At eighty-five cents they are equivalent to ten per cent. currency paying interest bonds, less the fifteen cents off, which, when reduced to interest, is really less than one-half of one per cent. on thirty-year bonds. So that a sale at eighty-five cents would not quite equal a bond bearing ten and a half per cent. interest sold at par, or one hundred cents on the dollar. Money here is not worth as large interest, but in Texas it is worth more, and the question is not what New York can do with her money, but rather what can Texas do without money? The governor holds bonds firm at ninety cents. He can not get these figures. What can he get? This question has no answer. No offers are made as yet, and none may be made. Texas is good for her debts, but the Legislature is the financial agent of the State, and that body alone must supply the means to pay debts.

General Items.
The Baptist association at Jefferson is largely attended.
The Baptist state convention met in Jefferson on Friday, the 26th of July.
Corsicana has voted an appropriation of \$100,000 to secure the location of the State University at that place.
The Gainesville Gazette has been enlarged to a paper of thirty-two columns.
Baltimore was visited by a destructive fire on the 35th. Loss estimated at a half million of dollars.
It is expected that through trains on the Texas-Pacific will commence running from three o'clock to Dallas early in August.
A Mr. Dunn was the successful candidate for sheriff of Falls county, at the recent special election, judging from the returns which appear in the Enterprise of the 26th.
The Bonham News of the 25th records the killing of a negro man on a creek a short distance north of Honey Grove. He was riddled with bullets. No clue to the murderer.
We notice in the Houston Telegraph the statement that capital punishment has been abolished in the state of Tennessee by the legislature. The law, which was passed on the 11th inst., will take effect on the 16th of September next.
The Gazette mentions a report that a woman and a man were hung a short time since in the nation above the Red River station—the woman because she would not divorce the whereabouts of her husband, and the husband because he was a horse thief.
Col. John W. Forney, of the Philadelphia Press, has accepted an invitation to deliver the annual address at the Marshall fair in September next. Forney is a polished and able speaker, and will doubtless add much to the interest of the occasion.
The Beaumont News Beacon says that the dead body of a man has been found in Hardin county, supposed to be that of Mr. P. Weldon, who when he came to that county stated he was from New Jersey. He died at his camp at the Neches bottom, where he was cutting timber, all alone, and is supposed to have been dead several months previous to the discovery of his body. His remains were buried near his camp.

The woman fixed her eyes on him, and said: "I don't know you, sir." The surgeon concluded that his case must indeed be hopeless, as this woman declared to know his assistant.
