did not like Tracy, but would swallow any dose the convention ordered. Parker had previously shown much Christian meekness in accepting the epithet "liar" from Allen, and this final display of grace won him such favor that he was subsequently rewarded with a place on the ticket. Deserted by his allies, beaten at every point, at last Gillespie turned at bay and opened his last guns on Tracy, whom he charged with every species of corruption, treachery and baseness. As specifically charged that, in 1869, Tracy had offered to defeat the Republican candidate for the county clerkship for \$500 gold. During this attack he was frequently interrupted and was pungently reminded that Tracy had been his "bread and meat," and that he had served the bad man for four years and only denounced him when his time of apparent weakness came. The question: "How much did you get to keep the secret so long?" brought down the house and completely staggered the speaker. When the vote was taken, Tracy's election was unanimous, and Gillespie left the convention utterly beaten.

Talk on the streets has been chiefly engrossed with Gillespie's charge, about the truth of which opinion is much divided. Many enemies to Tracy doubt whether the only specific accusation made can be proved. So far as the Republican party is concerned, Gillespie has injured himself far more than Tracy, and it seems doubtful whether any serious defection will result. The Convention ignored wholly the Germans in its choice of delegates, and probably hurt its cause more by this action than by its other disputes. The Democrats of Harris county will carry the election this fall if they work faithfully, but any reliance upon Gillespie's defection will be illusory. Col. Tracy will be on Dallas on Saturday, and will make it hot for his opponents. Col. Gillespie has promised to call a public meeting of the citizens of Harris county, at which he will fully expose his former chief. Should he fulfill this promise, developments may take place which will give an importance to his movement it does not at present possess. —Galveston News.

CURIOSITIES OF CRIME.
Stolen, Secured, dug out of a Sewer, and Returned to the Owner Before He Found out that he Had Lost It.
(From the New York Tribune, August 7th)
Andrew L. Thomson, in journeying down town in a Broadway car, yesterday morning, was embarrassed by the persistently close presence of a young man, and sought refuge from the familiarity of the platform in the interior of the car. On arriving at Spring street he left the car without a suspicion that after he had entered it he had been robbed, and walked to his place of business at Nos. 56 and 58 Greene street; being one of the firm of Thomson & Conen, wholesale dealers in hats.
An hour afterwards several laborers opened the culvert at Wooster and Canal streets, to clean out the sewer, and with the first bucket of mud brought up a bundle of papers. Patrolman Burke, of the eighth precinct, who was standing near, opened the bundle and discovered that it contained papers and bank checks of apparent value. At noon the officer handed the papers to Captain Williams, who, after a careful examination of them, found they consisted of 250 shares of the Elastic Spring Company, a check on a city bank for \$90, a promissory note of \$1,100 and memorandum accounts of a large wholesale business. One of the papers bore the name and business address of Mr. Thomson. Going to the merchants store in Greene street, Captain Williams asked to see him. Mr. Thomson soon appeared and was asked by Captain Williams whether he had any shares in the Elastic Spring Company. He replied: "I do own some shares in that company; paid \$3,200 for them. At this moment, I have them in a pocket of that coat, hanging there. I'll show them to you." Then stepping up to the coat he put a hand quickly into the breast pocket, hunted around desperately for a moment, turned around in a frantic manner and exclaimed: "Heavens! I've been robbed." Observing then that the man who had asked about the stolen shares was in citizens dress, Mr. Thomson suspected that he was one of the thieves who had come to compromise the robbery. Acting on this belief, Mr. Thomson placed himself between the door and Captain Williams, and was about to send a clerk for a policeman when the officer produced the stolen bundle and handed it to him. The pocket which had stolen the papers from Mr. Thomson's pocket probably left the street-car at Woos-

ter and Canal streets, and then through four throes them into the culvert. Mr. Thomson lost a \$2 bill which was folded in the bundle.

This advertisement was issued in consequence of the discovery of the murderer of the widow Spelling and her daughter, and the recovery of the spoils of his fearful crime upward of twenty years after it had been committed.
In July, 1852, the police of Amsterdam saw on the floor of the house on Harlem street, where Catharine Spelling lived with her daughter Dorothy, a notice to the effect that the two women had gone to the country. This notice aroused no suspicions, but when the old lady and her daughter did not return after the lapse of six weeks, the police entered it. A fearful sight met their eyes. The widow and her daughter, with their throats cut from ear to ear, were lying on the floor in an advanced state of decomposition, while all the bureau were riddled of their valuable. It was ascertained that the murderer had carried off diamonds, money, and bonds, amounting to nearly one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Time passed by, and the double murderer was almost forgotten, until on the 3d of July last the house in which the crime had been committed, was torn down. Between it and the adjoining house was a space of about one foot in width, and hemmed in there was found a male skeleton. At the bottom of this space lay a large leather packet, containing the diamonds, the money, and the bonds of the murdered widow. This skeleton was undoubtedly that of the murderer of the two women, who, after assassinating them and bagging his plunder, had tried to escape over the roof of the house, but, slipping his foot, had fallen into the space between the two buildings. There he met with the just retribution of his terrible crime. He died there the excruciatingly painful death of slow starvation.

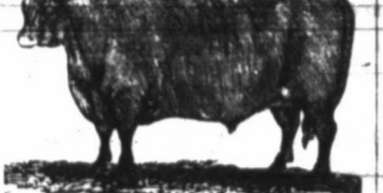
