

But eliminate their breeding sites. he cautioned that labels should be read carefully to determine the hazards these insecticides pose to applicators, fish and nimals that may use the water.

Control of adult mosquitoes offers the most immediate relief. Inside the home, aerosol bombs containing pyrethrins offer quick knockdown of adult mosquitoes, the Extension agent said. The killing effect of pyrethrins is very short-lived, so frequent application will be necessary to control adult mosquitoes inside the house. The pest strip" offers effective indoor control for long periods. "One pest strip for each average size room is necessary to control mosquitoes," Tanksley said

"Persons who are active where mosquitoes are a problem should use repellents," the Extension agent advised. "These repellents will protect you from biting mosquitoes for from one to three hours, depending upon your type of Cont. Page 3, Col. 1

### State Plans Improvements

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has approved a \$70.5 million program to improve safety and to protect the public's investment in 3,766 miles of statemaintained highway facilities, according to George Wall, Jr., district engineer.

He said the program is the 1979 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program. It includes work in every part of the state.

Wall said the work to be performed in Bailey County will be seal-coating U.S. Highway 84 from the Parmer County line to the west city limits of Muleshoe, a distance of 9.4 miles. It will cost \$152.000.

Poland.

"The accurate, scientific method of mixing feed employed at the Texas Tech Feed Milling Plant is very impressive, and something I have not seen before," noted Dr. Zenon Szumera, leader of a three-man team of Polish engineers in charge of designing a new feed mill in Poland. The team visited Lubbock last week as guests of Grain Sorghum Producers Association and Texas Grain Sor-

ghum Producers Board. Sponsored by the U.S. Feed Grains Council (USFGC), the team will spend two weeks in the United States observing and studying the technology behind different methods of feed processing so that they can incorporate these techniques into their new mill. Their U.S. tour includes visits to reed mills in Georgia, North Carolina, Texas, Kansas and Colorado.

In the Lubbook wea the team toured Producers Grain Corp. Feedlot in Mayfield, Olton Grain Co-op in Olton, Taylor Feedlot in Dimmitt, Pre-Feeders Feedlot in Herefore, and the Experimental Feed Milling Plant at Texas Tech University.

The need for a new feed mill in Poland was determined by members of a team of Polish animal scientists who visited the High Plains last fall. Also sponsores by **UTFGC** and host-ed by Grain Sorghum Producers Association, the team of scien-

tists saw great advantages in the methods of feed processing practiced in this area and asked that an experimental feed mill which would utilize some of these processes be built in their homeland. The Polish government agreed and the present team of engineers was named to design the mill.



"The hot, dry summer weather that is normal for the South Plains should dry out these temporary pools of water and give people some eventual relief from these biting mosquitoes,' Tanksley said.

## **Bob Bullock** Announces Allocations

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Thursday he has made the ten year allocation of state ad valorem tax money amont 17 senior colleges and universities as required by the Texas Constitution.

Bullock warned, however, that "this tax is under a cloud because of the suit filed by Representative Wayne Peveto and this office will not distribute the money to those schools until that lawsuit is settled."

Peveto filed suit in Travis County Districk Court April 5 challenging the legality of the tax, which is used to finance new construction at the 1/ colleges and universities named in the Constitution.

The high daily temperatures are producing plenty of plant growth and a flurry of insects which are on the diet of nearly all birds in the Panhandle and on the South Plains.

A wild turkey killed by a passing vehicle-was examined and found to contain nearly a quart of grasshoppers in it's crop in the Panhandle. Most landowners realize the importance of birds for the control of injurious insects that eat important crops such as corn, wheat, and vegetables.

need is sometimes difficult. Attorneys in our Insurance Banking and Securities Division and Consumer Protection Division say many homeowners are underinsured without being aware of it. This is primarily the consequence of rapidly increasing property values. For example, if you bought a home in 1965 for \$20,000, it might cost as much as \$40,000 to replace that house today. If you have not increased your insurance coverage in accordance with the increase in replacement value, you may have assumed a potentially serious financial burden

This is particularly true because many homeowner policies require that you carry insurance in an amount equalling 80% of the replacement value of your home.

If you do not, then you are subject to a penalty in the form of reduced benefits, for depreciation. For example, if you have to replace your roof and you have the required 80% coverage, the insurance benefit will be the total cost of the repair, less the deductible. If you have not maintained 80% coverage, you will be charged for depreciation. In other words, you will receive a benefit which is less than full replacement value, based upon a depreciated value of the roof. In order to avoid such penalties and expenses, you must maintain your level of protection at 80% of its replacement value, not of its original cost.

In reviewing your needs for homeowners insurance, you should be aware that there are three types of homeowners policies: basic, broad, or comprehensive. A basic policy usually protects against such things as fire, lightening, wind, hail, explosion, riot, aircraft, theft, vandalism, vehicles, breakage of glass, loss of property removed from premises endangered by fire and other perils.



The five-week ROTC advanced camp provides an opportunity for cadets to develop and demonstrate leadership capabilities in a field training environ-


