He had made a most excellent and faithful public servant, and the unwarranted and ungrateful assault on him by Finlay in the Senate had made it almost necessary to the vindication of himself and nationality that he should be re-nominated. In selecting a German for the second office the names of Mr. Degener of San Antonio for Lieut. Governor, Mr. A. MADRID, Sept. 1.

The members of Isaura's Junta, Carthagena, are already reported arrested by Gaiter. One of the six colleagues are Souville. The Insurgent Minister of Finance and General Caspe, President of the Junta, were quickly released. The cause of their arrest is not known. Souville is charged by Gaiter with treason, and having altered and falsified the communication of Vice Admiral Telvan to the Junta. It seems that in the beginning of the affair with the British commander Souville was named by the Junta in carry of the negotiations on the Cobara. The Vice Admiral expresses the hope to the Junta that the affair may be amicably arranged.

LONDON, Sept. 1.

The morning publishes further particulars of the negotiations between the British Vice-Admiral Telvan and the Carthagena Insurgents in regard to the movement of the iron-clad Manx and Victoria. Upon notice from the Admiral of his intention to take the vessel of the insurgents, he was answered that the forts would open fire upon the British squadron if the attempt was made. This was made on the 28th of August. The iron Manx was brought to anchor at the entrance of Escombril, within range of Lord Warden the English flag ship, and the two vessels lay with their broadsides towards each other. The Lord Warden carries 18 guns, an iron-plated screw steamer of four thousand and eighty tons. The Manx is an iron old steamer and carries forty 60 pounders. On the 29th, Vice-Admiral Telvan replied that he would give forty hours for reconsideration, at the expiration of which time he would take vessel. On the 30th the two vessels were communicated to.

BARCELONA, Sept. 1.—The schooner Golden West, from London, which just arrived, was an American fishing schooner in the service of Cuba. The American schooner reports that twenty American fishing schooners belonging to Fiveto-

town and Beverly, Massachusetts, and another schooner named Ida May, of Quebec, were captured at Buzzard Bay, Massachusetts, but given up particulars. The schooner Watch, which was off Boston, belonged to Newcastle. She measured 110 tons, and was built in 1872. It is reported that 40 American fishing vessels were cast off the north side of Prince Edwards; and that only 18 lives were saved out of all the crew, but none of the late arrivals at this point credit the report.

At Charlottetown, Prince Edwards Island

the storm was destructive to life and property; crops destroyed. The destruction of fishing boats is unprecedented on the north coast. There was a great loss of life. Six square rigged vessels were wrecked and crews of two of them were drowned. Four American fishing vessels were also wrecked, and crews lost. Dead bodies and wrecked material floating ashore daily.

LONDON, Sept. 1.

BARCELONA, Sept. 1.—A military escort of a train containing supplies for Republicans to Herga Saltes at Narquera, twenty miles from their destination and refused to go further. A battalion of Republican Chasseurs stationed in Vich, 27 miles northeast of this city have mutinied. At Madrid, Sept. 1.—The Carlists are again interrupting the mails between Madrid and the North Coast.

has by a vote of 119 yeas against 32 nays rejected the proposition to grant amnesty to insurgents. The Government has presented a bill in the Cortes calling into the army all males between the ages of 20 and 25 years.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.

PATONA, IND., Sept. 1.

Brigham & Co's distillery burned; loss \$50,000, including 150 hogs, 3000 barrels of corn and 40 barrels of whiskey. SAVANNAH, Sept. 1.—Jacob N. Cordage, who has been connected with the newspapers of this city and Charleston from the beginning of the century, died last night, aged 87. He was the oldest living editor in the South and was engaged on papers till within the past two years.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 1.

Deaths for the week ending August 30: Cholera 4; Cholera morbus 16; Cholera infantum 21. LITTLE ROCK, Sept. 1.—The last spike on the Cairo & Fulton Railroad was driven at Fulton to-day. The road is now completed, from St. Louis to Fulton, 641 miles.

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.

The post mortem examination of the body of an English immigrant named Edwards, who was reported to have died of Asiatic Cholera, showed the man to have died from typhoid fever.
