Those International Bonds.

Although the people of the State may not be generally posted as to the intricacies of the International Bond Question, they understand enough of it to know that the Convention at Austin should take some action in the premises, or else the Texas Democracy is properly charged with advocating repudiation. The Legislature declared unqualifiedly that the State of Texas owed the International Bond nothing. This was the act of a legislature that had more Democrats in it than are likely ever to be there again.

Now, what is the Democracy going to do about it?

Most of the Democratic journals announce masterly silence in the Convention, and a prompt application of the party lash to the delegate who attempts to call it up. We hardly believe this will succeed. It looks too much like the ostrich, that buries his head in the sand but leaves his rear conspicuously elevated.

Telegraphic.

PARIS, Sept. 2.—Cholera made its appearance among the troops at quarters here, it having been communicated by German immigrants on route for New York.

The Republican members of the Assembly will meet M. Thiers at Nancy on his way from Switzerland, and entertain him at a great banquet. The towns of Alsace and Lorraine will also be liberally represented by prominent citizens, most of them having signified their intention to join in testimonial to M. Thiers.

Boston, Sept. 2.—Yesterday was the anniversary of the capture of Fort Mifflin. A monument commemorating that event was unveiled in the King's Plaza amidst the enthusiastic acclamations of thousands of citizens. The city was gaily decorated and given over to festivities.

MAVANA, Sept. 2.—Yesterday evening while a party of Republicans were holding a meeting in their club rooms, the Chief of Police arrived and arrested about forty of them and placed them in jail. It is said that they had been notified previously that it was against the law to hold meetings.

London, Sept. 2.—The Times of this morning has additional details concerning the affair between Yelverton and the Insurgents in relation to the removal of the iron clads after the Admiralty's notice that at the expiration of 40 hours they should keep the vessels out of the harbor. The Insurgents, Junta, proposed he should pledge his faith for his government that they would be held at Gibraltar, and not turned over to the Madrid government.

This proposition was rejected, and the British commander informed Junta that he would take the vessels to Gibraltar, and then recommend to his government that they be set surrounded until the affair with Carthagen was settled (but he declined to give personal guarantee. All this the Insurgent leaders were much exasperated. Junta issued orders to the commander of the rebel vessels to go down the bay prepared to resist by force the removal of the iron-clads.

The English Consul is prepared to leave Carthagen. A conflict seemed unavoidable. Accounts received report accident on the Luxemburg Railway, by which eight persons were killed and 15 hurt.

A report is current here that the municipal authorities at Madrid have raised a red flag of Commune on the Town Hall, and that the military have discovered the secret department of arms, ammunition and petroleum belonging to International.

The rumor is not generally credited that Vice-Admiral Yelverton had taken the iron-clads, Almansa and Victoria from Carthagen and sent them to Gibraltar. The Insurgents made an attempt to prevent the vessels from going.

A telegram from Madrid announces that the Vice Admiral has taken the vessels without a conflict.

Specialists trouble of a serious nature has broken out in Andalusia, in the neighborhood of the town of Jominia. The farm laborers have banded together for the purpose of demanding and endeavoring to force a division of property. They have burnt forty farm houses of those who oppose them, and have committed other excesses which are not yet reported.

NEW YORK.

New York, Sept. 2.—Another counterfeit \$500 greenback was received at the Sub-Treasury.

An expert here says the paper of the counterfeit is brighter than the genuine, but the face is perfect. The letters on the back are tinged with green where they should be white, and the blue tinge in the genuine is not perceptible in the counterfeit.

Three bills have been received here and they are all believed to have come from the West.

The Treasurer of the New Jersey Central Railroad states that no counterfeit bonds on that road have been seen or heard of, and the Secretary of the Western Union Telegraph Company knows of no counterfeit of their stocks or bonds.

Hobkins and Brown, who advanced some \$40,000 to soldiers, suspended to-day. A Washington dispatch states that the Manifesto question will be brought before the judicial tribunal in a few days. The Court holds a secret session there, for another session will be tried.

MISCELLANEOUS.

TORONTO, Sept. 2.—The marine and fishing Department received dispatches from Magdalen Islands stating that fifty American and British vessels were wrecked in the gulf of the St. Lawrence.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Sept. 2.—Cholera is at Paris and Millersburg of the most malignant type. Every case in Millersburg fatal, there eighteen deaths are reported in twenty-four hours.

BROWNVILLE, TEX., Sept. 2.—Cattle thieving on the Texas border has been renewed with unusual vigor. About 200 head were crossed into Mexico near Guerrero, a few days ago and boldly driven on the highway to Monterey by the thieves without the slightest interference on the part of the Mexican authorities.

St. Louis, Sept. 2.—A dispatch from Oakville, Ill., 2 miles from here on the Great Southern Railroad, says the cholera of a true Asiatic type is raging there; 23 persons died in 24 hours, among them the principal bridge builder of the Southeastern Railroad.

W.
