The Rev. James Wilson of Bell county thinks his cotton crop will turn out two bales per acre.
Three wagon-loads of Mexicans have arrived in Austin en route to the Brazos Bottom to pick cotton.
A man named Harman fell from a third story in Austin, breaking all the ribs of his left side and his left leg, but he still survives.
Major Tom Snow and Mr. Sam Wright, of Austin, had a difficulty in the Court rooms in which the former was seriously wounded with a knife by the latter.
A Mr. Armstrong killed a Mr. Nicholson with an axe in Lamar county.
Five hundred head of cattle was shipped from Elgin in one week.
Fine apples that weigh three quarters of a pound each, are raised in Ellis county.
The Waco Advance local goes into a fine spasm over the charred remains of the man Liemens, who perished in the late fire at that place. The Advance, as an exponent, is a success.
The Galveston Civilian has this brace of items:
Hidden.—The receipts of hides the past year are a little over 450,000, an increase of 52,000 over last year.
The Comanche Chief, Vol. 1, No. 1, published in Comanche, Comanche county, and edited by G. A. Beaman, is to hand, and is decided by a creditable issue. We exchange of course.
The Tyler Democrat has this:
Mr. Sam A. Goodman has placed upon our table a piece of very rich iron ore, we think fully 75 per cent pure iron. It was picked up on a ridge near Sunstowen. Iron ore, rich enough to pay for working, abounds in many portions of this county.
Mr. Goodman says the worms are beginning to bite some in the Jamestown country, but haven't done much harm yet. Politics are all right.
The track layers on the Trans-Continental expect to reach Paris, in Lamar county, on the first of October next.

Mr. A. F. Hunt presented the editor of the Tyler Index with an apple grown by himself in Smith county, which measured 13 1/2 inches in circumference, and weighed 14 1/2 ounces.
The Brownsville Rancher has this additional of the outrage committed upon a party of Texans in Mexico.
"We have several times of late mentioned the fact of a reported outrage having been committed upon immigrants going to Texas, Mexico. Yesterday the family consisting of B. A. Perdue, wife and four children, and his brother, C. Perdue, returned to this side of the river after having been robbed of \$9000 in gold, and valuable property amounting altogether to \$3000.
The entire party of men, women and children were tied hand and foot and left to starve, if one of the party had not by accident been able to go to the assistance of his brother, and helping him, while his hands were tied behind him. These men state that no indignities were offered to the women, except the tying of their hands behind them in a helpless position on the ground. One of the robbers said that the party had orders from Cortina to rob all Americans who come this way. They are now en route for their old home near Corpus Christi.
The Bonham, Fannin county, News has this brace of items:
Prof. D. G. Calhoun, a grandson of John C. Calhoun, of South Carolina, died from congestion of the brain at his residence on Red River, in this county, last Monday at 9 A. M.
Prof. C. taught school at Honey Grove for several terms, and only a short time prior to his death had moved to the vicinity of Elwood, fifteen miles northeast of Bonham.
A party of railroad surveyors for the M., K. & T. railway, from Deal-

son, have been making a preliminary survey in this vicinity for several days past. Are we to get that road too? Bonham is destined to be a railroad centre yet.
The Streets of Corpus Christi are being graded and shelled.
Denison does not seem to have an excited opinion of its Mayor, a large public meeting having requested him to resign, which he refuses to do. Other measure against him are now threatened.
Waco is shipping South bay, flour, corn and bacon.
A new military company has been formed at Austin called the Austin Sharp Shooters.

The Raleigh (N. C.) News insists that the Modocs should have been tried by jury, because the "white brand of peace" was floated for eight long years" over this land, "good by no hostile foot" in that length of time. The irresistible logic of this declaration is that the late Modoc disturbance was merely a continuation of the unpleasantness which we have supposed came to an end eight years ago. But the News continues, saying that the execution of the savages under the sentence of a military tribunal will be murder, and argues that "they have had wrongs—deep, bitter, burning wrongs—wrongs
"To stir a fever in the blood of age
Or make the infant's sneeze strong as steel
This is all very fine as a piece of indignant rhetoric, but is far from a thorough accord with the spirit of the times. The idea that Captain Jack and his fellow murderers were entitled to the same concessions that were extended to Jeff Davis, when it was proposed to give him a trial by jury, is simply preposterous. It may be true that both parties were guilty of violations of the laws of war, and deserved the late which attaches to such violations, but our people generally make a distinction between them in favor of the latter. We can only account for the sympathy of the News for the Modocs on the presumption that "a fellow feeling makes us wondrous kind," and that Captain Jack did his level best to do what many of the Southern people tried to do eight years ago. After all, the News must have something to growl about, and perhaps it is better that it should vent its ignorant spleen on this subject than on matters of greater importance. If the Modocs had been pardoned it would have found fault just the same—merely because it would have been the act of a Republican Administration.

It was a great mistake the Southern Historical Society made in putting Jefferson Davis forward as their speaker. To be sure, he has opened a good many eyes to the truth of the situation, but he has, at the same time, given a quietus to the tender refrain which comes up perpetually from the South to the effect that perfect cordiality exists towards such Northerners as are well "behaved" characteristics the feelings of the people.—[N. Y. Commercial Advertiser.
