SPECIAL ELECTION!

The citizens of the city of Texarkana and of the County of Texarkana being presented to the County Court for instruction to take the opinion of the electors of said County on a proposition that said County shall aid in the construction of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Rail Road, according to the terms and conditions of the same, and submitted by the committee of citizens of said County to Dr. W. Peirce, President of said Road and accepted by him, which proposal is substantially as follows: It is proposed to pay said Company Five hundred Thousand dollars in Bonds of said County, payable in thirty (30) years, bearing eight (8) per cent. interest per annum, with yearly coupons attached, on condition said Company will build and equip and run said road from Columbus, Texas, to within not more than one and one-half miles of the Main Plaza in the city of San Antonio, the exact distance and boundaries to be determined by the Chief Engineer of said Company, within twenty (20) months from the time of the promulgation of the order that two-thirds of the qualified voters of said Bexar County has been given in favor of the proposed road. The amount of the bonds to be paid by the County of Texarkana and the amount of the bonds under vigorous consideration to be paid by the City of San Antonio. Said Company to give a good and valid Bond for the sum of one hundred thousand dollars to be approved by the County Court of Bexar County for the faithful performance of this agreement, with the following stipulations: if so required, said Company will be released from a Bond of One hundred thousand dollars heretofore given.

The whole amount to be paid by the County of Texarkana is not to exceed Eight hundred thousand dollars.

We further instruct the County Court, etc., to issue such an injunction before the election of the 13th day of September next, for the purpose of taking the opinion of the Electors of said County on the above-mentioned. Which election shall be made according to law.

The views of the proposition shall be by ballot "For the Proposition" or "Against the Proposition."
