An official communication to those Headquarters, dated, Fort Richardson, Sept. 5th, contains the information that three citizens were attacked by Indians on Little Salt Creek about six miles from the Post on the day previous, and two of them, Mr. Howell H. Walker aged 50, and his son Henry aged 12 were killed. The third was Mr. Mortimer Stevens (formerly a soldier in the 5th Cavalry,) made his escape and succeeded in reaching the post, having been compelled to travel about thirty miles in a circuitous route to do so.

Capt. Thomas Little, of 10th U. S. Cavalry, with the available officers and men of his Company were ordered to pursue.

The bodies of the two murdered men were brought to the Post in a horribly mangled condition, their entire countenances torn to shreds. The old man had the bullet hole through the chest, an arrow and a spear point, a large hole was cut in the right side from which a rib and a portion of the liver had been taken. The boy had two bullet holes through his abdomen, a hole under his right arm, two shots in the right side and the right hand put off at the wrist.

Capt. Little found the trail at day break and started at once in pursuit.

Mr. Stevens, assisted in investigating the scene.

The assassination is from Col. W. H. Wood, of the 10th Infantry, commanding the post.
