Letter No. 3.
Politics in New Braunfels—
Seguin.
In my last communication I have
had much to say that was favorable
of the New Braunfels people, but
the tribute of praise is most cer-
tainly deserved; but politically,
New Braunfels is given to eccen-
tricities. It happens occasionally
that they draw their political inspi-
ration from the neighboring village
of Seguin; but, from my opportuni-
ties of observation I was convinced
they had been duped, and a natu-
ral desire not to be so anymore was
making itself felt. The number of
promoters. Democrats has never
been large and is less now than
ever. There are several strong local
reasons for the change that is
going on, one of which I will men-
tion more definitely afterwards.
The voters of Comal county went
very strong for Hancock, but under
no possible circumstances would
they do so again, in fact the men-
tion of Hancock is like talking a-
bout a rope in the house of one
that has been hung. Owing per-
haps to peculiar resemblance in the
names, they regard the Hon. Rich-
ard Coke as a diswater modification
of Hancock. A prominent citi-
zen told me he considered them
both bad eggs, a comparison which
the friends of Judge Hancock might
regard as odious, now that our U.
P. M. C. has been consigned to the
silent tomb of political oblivion by
his enemies.
The New Braunfels people went
into the Greeley movement with
refreshing energy, and at the insti-
gation of "the Seguin clique,"
Judge Ireland himself hardly elaims,
I see by the papers, that the move-
ment was altogether successful.
Again, Col. Hoffman (the New
Braunfels Berends) has not gained
any lasting laurels in his legislative
capacity; in fact, there seemed to
be a disposition manifested among
his friends not to send him there
anymore, if they would possibly
prevent it; although, the recent
nomination of Kessler has miti-
gated his unpopularity. Again, the
people of New Braunfels were very
much in favor of the 13th Legisla-
ture, they listened to the syren song
of Ireland and his friends, and
themselves were deceived than ev-
er. The 13th Legislature was the
feather that broke the camel's back.
Its atrocities have had the effect
of changing almost the entire Ger-
man element in Texas from ardent
friends to bitter enemies. The Ger-
mans, everywhere I have been, are
almost a unit for Gov. Davis, and
this great wave of reaction has had
its effect in New Braunfels. The
results of the next election will es-
tablish this conclusively.
I have neglected to mention some
thing in connection with New
Braunfels, but, as it is a subject
which concerns indirectly the peo-
ple of San Antonio, I can't not be-
lieve to supply the omission. Some
of the original settlers of Comal
county bought nearly 35 years ago
a tract of land known as the Horton
League, and on it the flourishing
town of Hortontown stands to-day.
About 10 years afterwards Judge
Hancock and Morgan Hamilton lo-
cated three 1280 acre certificates on
the land, which has consequently
been in suit ever since. At the
last term of the Supreme Court the
case was decided adversely to the
occupants. The case is similar to
the Paschal-Dangerfield suit in re-
ference to the "Currier League" near
San Antonio, recently decided by
the same tribunal adversely to the
representatives of the ancient occu-
pants, a decision, by the way, which
leopardized almost every land title
in Western Texas.
In this Hortontown case there
are extraordinary hardships, the
most important improvements, a-
mong them the largest steam mill
in the county, comprising a gin mill
and saw mill, not to speak of the
spirited farms, have been made
since the suit was begun, and con-
sequently the hardworking owners
see themselves after an occupancy
of nearly 40 years deprived of the
fruits of so many years of toil. But
the peculiar hardship in the case is
this: two thirds of the land recover-
ed is rocky and useless, while all
the good land is under cultivation.
The owners, or occupants, are will-
ing to repurchase their lands and
improvements at a high figure, but
the successful friends of the Ger-
mans, the attorneys in the case, will
only listen to proposals to sell the
whole tract, for which they ask the
modest sum of \$38,000. I get these
facts from an old citizen. This may
all be law, but it is not justice.

Letter No. 4.
Seguin.
A rural post once sang:
"Seguin Seguin Seguin, I have
seen,
My little grass grows over
And grows over,
Not being on the lookout for
"seguns," I failed to perceive any,
but am not prepared to say that
they are not there. As to "the
mesquite grass and live oak" I am
willing to be qualified at any time.
The are *there*, and growing finely in
the middle of the streets. The only
live things in the city besides the
liveoaks are a few live republicans,
and the only green things that
attract attention are the local
democrats. They are so verdant
that if Noah's dove had come
across them they would have gone
into the Ark ahead of the olive
branch.
Seguin has not voted any large
subsidies to Mr. Pierce, an omis-
sion, which causes the road to strike
the Gaudaloupe several miles on
the wrong side of the corporation,
whereas the Columbus road makes
a beeline to San Antonio, as soon
as Jay Cook & Co. resume specie
payment.
I was told that there was a news-
paper called "The Times" published
in Seguin, but I didn't inspect it.
I had seen enough of dull-times in
San Antonio on account of Judge
Ireland causing us to loose the In-
ternational, so like Young in his
"night thoughts" "I took no note
of time."—(Guadalupe Times).
I felt so sorry for the Seguin
Democracy that I made an earnest
effort to get them to subscribe to
the EXPRESS, but they showed a
difference in the matter that was
painful. They didn't want the daily
EXPRESS, nor the weekly EXPRESS
nor even the tri-weekly FREE
PRESSED, and were harassed with
serious doubts about the weekly
FREE PRESSED, but I came near
getting them on the CAYOTE, and
anti-railroad monopolies. At last
one said, "I'll take your paper, if
Judge Ireland says so."
Said I, "I can't wait so long;
because Judge Ireland won't favor
the EXPRESS until he goes to San
Antonio, and consults with Judge
Devine."
Then I proposed to take a drink,
but they couldn't join me until
Judge Ireland returned, and they
had held a census, so I lost the op-
portunity of making a number of
lasting friendships.
As it was, I came very near ac-
cumulating a fortune of \$1.45 by
securing the advertising of several
of the leading business houses and
legal firms, particularly the latter,
as the Seguin Democrat who is not
a first class lawyer is not regarded
as a sound member of the party.
There is too much "brawn" en-
tirely, among the Seguin Democ-
racy; the party don't know what
to do with it all, now that so many
pumpkins and cabbages are raised
in Western Texas.
Seguin develops a superior ar-
ticle of Republicanism. Fry,
Vaughn, Gordon, Maney, Ball and
others are freemen who know their
rights and knowing dare maintain.
A few Republicans of their stamp
in every county in the State would
leave the whole mass of liberal re-
publican shams, that are in the
habit of crowding to the Demo-
cracy. Nobody attempts to intimi-
date there is every disposition to
do so. Here, as elsewhere, the col-
ored voters, are unwavering in their
allegiance to the party that freed
them, with the exception of perhaps
about a baker's dozen, that are
peculiarly, or otherwise, under the
thumb of their old masters.

bail out all the horse-thieves in the
State. The greater part of the cot-
ton raised by the Germans is picked
by the children, who are thus
taught habits of industry, which all
might do well to imitate. The
German farmer calls a mass meeting
of his children, and makes a formal
parade with them. The are to
receive a certain price for every
hundred pounds they pick, and the
way these babes and sucklings pick
cotton is edifying.
The sagacious parent opens a
running account and charges the
little cherub with boots, shoes and
other articles they may need during
the winter. In this way they are
taught habits of industry and
practical arithmetic at the same time.
Speaking of crops reminds me
that the bakes between here and
San Antonio are hanging full of
ripe wassels. The crop is so large
that there are not hands sufficient
to pick them all. I always said the
negroes would never work if they
were once set free.
