LETTER NO. 6.
**Gonzales as a Sanitarium —
The Intelligent German at a
discount—Peach Creek, &c.**

Gonzales is a few houses built upon the sand, but if the rain were to fall and the floods come, and it actually fell, there would not be much of a fall. Yet, the citizens dream of a railroad like San Antonio; they base their hopes on Morgan, which is as much as can be expected of a town built on the sand. As a general thing the people have sandy complexions, and have plenty of grit in them. When the ladies and gentlemen prosenade up the street, a stranger would take them for a batch of prisoners being taken to jail, they have to straddle like they had clanking chains on, so deep is the sand. The people do not know what blotting paper is. Everybody has the dengue, and a gun is fired three times a day, as a signal for the people to take their pills, but there is so much promiscuous shooting, they have all overclosed themselves with quinine and lost their hearing. At least I asked a dozen or so to subscribe, and they didn't respond. Nobody says: "Let's take a drink," but, "Give me an anti-malaria!"

Anti Malaria is very popular, they call her "Benzine" in San Antonio. As it is possible that some stranger, who has never been there before, may have to stop there a few days, I advise him to go at the OVERTON HOUSE, the only oasis in this Sahara. The proprietor is a gentleman, and there are good cigars to be had.

I had the pleasure of making the acquaintance of Judge Maney, who was holding Court while I was there. Judge Maney is quite a young man, very quiet, but at the same time has a determined air which is unmistakable. His resistance to the mandates of the Supreme Court, in a matter, in which it is the general opinion of the Texas bar, that he is right, is still fresh in the minds of the people.

While talking to the Judge in the Court House a man came up, rather excited, and wanted advice in reference to a desperado, who was trying to assassinate him, having made several attempts, one in presence of his family, and that very morning had been seen skulking with a gun around his house. What a pleasant state of affairs, truly! Of course, that man feels grateful to the Democracy for having abolished the State Police. I shall have something more to say on this subject when I write about the rowdy-riden County of DeWitt.

The country along the road from Gonzales to Peach Creek is not settled much, and there is but little stock on it, as the cattle and horses are not accustomed to browse on yellow weeds, which flourish in exuberant profusion. I only met one man on this road, and he was traveling to get out of it. Said I: "Were you raised here?" Said he: "No! I'd rather peddle gunpowder through Hell at 10 cents a keg than live here, I'm from the piney woods of North Carolina, I am."

About 12 miles from Gonzales you strike Peach Creek, to see which I had a great curiosity. It is a little sluggish mud puddle, reminding one very much of Soledad St., near the Post Office on a rainy day. How often, after waiting in vain for the mail to come for many days, have some of our best citizens used profane language to an excess, because "Peach Creek was up." Now, there is a bridge over it, and the mail goes over, no matter how high it is. On the opposite bank there is a hotel, around which the ground is covered for six or seven miles with empty barrels, bottles, and other indications of extensive provisional camping out.

Scientific Memoranda.
H. C. Vogel finds that the light emitted by the sun is less intense near the edges of the solar disk than at the center; comparing the latter with a point three fourths of the solar radius from the center the relations are as 48 to 35. The difference is, in his opinion, caused by the absorption power of the photosphere.

Iron states that Russia possesses valuable coal deposits of enormous extent, one of black gas coal on the river Kama being especially valuable.

Professor Huxley, the recently appointed Lord Rector of the University of Aberdeen, proposes certain changes in the medical examinations. German or French is to take the place of Greek in the preliminary examination, and the examinations in Natural History and Botany are to take place earlier in the course.

An octopus in the Brighton Aquarium has deposited a number of eggs. These she vigilantly guards, usually encircling or concentering them within a coil of one or more of her snake like arms, and vigorously repelling the approach of any of her comrades in the same tank.

P. Carles states that the akalooids are distributed through all the layers of cinchona bark, but that quinine is in much greater proportions in the epidermis than in the liber, the proportion diminishing regularly from the outside to the inside.

A report was recently read by a committee of the Master Mechanics Association of Baltimore, in which it is recommended that on the railroads traversing lime districts it would be an economy to construct rain sheds and reservoirs for the collection of the water to be used in the locomotives, and so avoid the formation of incrustations and the expense of the repairs required in consequence.

Mr. John Aitken has observed, that after the same water had been melted and frozen a number of times it generally burst the tube in which it was frozen. This he explains on the hypothesis that ice containing air is viscous and adapts itself to the form of the vessel; by repeated freezing the air is removed, and the pure ice being less or but little viscous will not so easily adapt itself to the enclosing walls.

AUSTIN, Oct. 28, 1873.

Editor San Antonio Express: Col. Bob Taylor, our next Lieut. Governor, spoke to a vast concourse of citizens of both parties on last evening from the balcony of the Avenue Hotel. Prof. Herzog's Brass Band was present, and cultivated the occasion with some of its choicest pieces. The immense success, which has attended the efforts of this distinguished speaker wherever he appeared before the people, could not but ensure him a hearty welcome and a ready hearing by a great many Austinians.

And well did he succeed last night; though the air was cool and brazing, yet despite this atmospheric coolness, he continued to speak for over two hours and kept the vast audience together—spell-bound as it were, and warmed up by his stirring and patriotic appeals, alternating with scathing sarcasms and biting satire on the doings and undoings of the soon to be defunct democratic party. His happy and jovial mode of argumentation, the lucid arrangement and presentation of facts and the inexorable logic, by which he strung together the facts thus presented, making them clear and comprehensible in all their bearings to the commonest intellect even, had a most telling and convincing effect upon all hearers. Would that all democrats could hear this eloquent and forcible orator, he would soon cure them of their past heresies and delusions, provided they would listen to him honestly and patiently. When the brave Col. had finished his speech last night and the band had struck off Hail Columbia in conclusion, some vociferous democrats, whose false idols Col. Taylor had effectually driven from their hearts, clamored for one Prendergast—a fine specimen of the infamous "Thirteenth" and also for that inveterate German-hater, Buck Watton—to answer the brilliant arguments advanced by Col. Taylor. But these arguments were unanswerable; in proof of which, I need but cite the simple fact, that after several futile and abortive attempts at rebutting the arguments, they had to give up the task as hopeless, and shouts of derision followed them as they withdrew. Gen. Jack Hamilton having also been loudly called for by his friends, courteously declined to speak, as he thought it eminently improper to enlarge upon the speech of Col. Taylor.

Our tried and faithful Governor is carrying the day wherever he goes—the people have made up their mind to sustain him at any cost. He has passed through the fiery ordeal as Governor for one term, and he has come out of it, as he went in, with a character as pure and sterling, as free of blemish or stain of any kind, that the honest people of this State are determined to have their old and faithful friend—Gov. E. J. Davis—again at the head of government to watch over, maintain and defend all that is dear to them.

A propos—have you read the article in the Houston Mercury about the Commissioner of the General Land Office—Hon. Jacob Kuechler? Our State Journal of this morning comes out with an able defense of Mr. Kuechler's character as a State officer, and gives a pithy and thrilling account of his "curriculum vitae." There is no office in the gift of the people, that has been conducted with a stricter adherence to the principles of impartial justice, economy and honesty, than the General Land Office under the efficient management of Mr. Kuechler. The simple fact, that he is a terror to all "landmarks," speaks volumes in favor of him. PROCLAMATION By the Governor of the State of Texas. To all to whom these presents shall come: WHEREAS, The Legislature of the State of Texas by a joint resolution passed June 4th, 1873, has proposed certain amendments to the Constitution of said State...

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas, That section twenty of article one, Bill of Rights of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows to-wit:

SECTION 2. No power of suspending laws in the State shall be exercised except by the Legislature. That section 2, section 3 and section 4 of article one of the Constitution be so amended as to hereafter read as follows to-wit: Section 3. The Supreme Court shall consist of one Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction, which in civil cases shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Appeals from interlocutory judgments may be allowed with such exceptions and under such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe.

SECTION 4. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases, that is to say for locating or changing county seats; regulating the practice in Courts of Justice; regulating the duties and jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace and constables; providing for changes of venue in civil and criminal courts; incorporating cities or towns or changing or amending the charter of any city or village; providing for the maintenance and improvement of all those things...
