A Inpanese Execution.

We have been favored by a correspondent with the following account of a Japanese execution : "I went to see an execution at

Yeddo, out of a vile curiosity. I repented of it, but still it was a most extraordinary spectacle, and impressed me very much. The culprits were eight in number, one being a woman. They were all beheaded with a sword. The operation was performed with wonderful dexterity and coolness, and not one of them, even the woman, showed the slightest symptom of fear. There was a space of ground roped off; juside were three holes dog in ground, with a little mound behind each, on which was spread a mat for the criminal to kneel on. On one the criminal to kneel on.
