COME EXPOSED AT LAST The Existence of his Secret Letter. HIS COMPLICITY WITH THE INTERNATIONAL RAILROAD RING. HE IS NOMINATED BY REPUBLICAN RAILROAD MONOPOLISTS.

The Press, the Public Opinion of the State—Democratic, Republican and to be Corrupted. The Present Supreme Court to be Decried, and a Constitutional Supreme Court to be Appointed. Every Railroad Ring in the State Seeking to Defeat Davis to-Hold Office, and to Rule the People.

Both the Statesman and State Gazette have been forced at last to deny our charges against the Coke International Railroad ring! This thing has gone quite far enough. The Journal has been harping on this slander for weeks and could have made the publication threatened long since, had it thought proper to do so.—State Gazette.

The Journal, in its issue of Wednesday evening, asserts that it has evidence that Judge Coke wrote a letter before his nomination, containing pledges "to support the International Railroad ring and to appoint certain men to office," and further, that it has been offered money to purchase its silence, which it refused! We do not believe a word of this, and we call on the Journal for the proof.—Statesman.

Will the Journal explain how it failed to get blackmail from Gen. Barnes and the International? Did it try hard enough?—Statesman. Both the Statesman and the State Gazette, as will be seen by the above, have joined issue with the State Journal on the questions involved in the above quotations. We intend to meet those issues fairly, squarely and boldly, and let Mr. Coke and his International Railroad ring take the consequences of the temerity of his Agents friends, and the cowardice of his San Antonio friends. As for ourselves, we are ready for all the consequences of the position we have assumed.

If the facts developed do not prove the death-knell of Mr. Coke's hopes of election to the Governorship, we are mistaken as to the instincts of a virtuous people. We have shown abundantly, and the whole people of Texas believe it, that Gov. Davis, during four years of a stormy administration, while surrounded by corrupt railroad rings who were spending millions of money to corrupt legislators of both parties, and when the Governor, a poor man, then and now, could have made himself independently rich without any direct corruption whatever, was as firm as the granite hills in protecting the interests and honor of the State, and is now famous throughout the State and the Union for his incorruptible integrity in a time of great trial and temptation, when he stood almost alone and without friends.

On the other hand we propose to show that Mr. Coke, the Democrat nominee for Governor, heading the ticket of a party which claims all the "virtue and intelligence of the State," entered into corrupt combinations with corrupt railroad rings even before he was nominated; that he got his nomination by these combinations, and thus betrayed the State, his party and his rivals for the nomination, in advance. The first point in issue is the existence of a secret letter, written by Mr. Coke to some of his friends in San Antonio, which is of such a character that he and they will not allow it to see the light of day, and be read by all the people of the State. The Statesman and State Gazette deny the existence of such a letter, and we affirm. They say he has written no letter inconsistent with the letter he wrote to Hon. W. D. Bayers, and published at the time. We are assured that it is different, and the proof is, that we have charged its secret character, and called for its publication in the most urgent and public manner for nearly two months—but it has not yet seen the light, and Coke, his San Antonio friends, and the Democratic press throughout the State, have maintained a dead, suspicious and ominous silence in relation to it. If it were of the same tenor and character as his published letter, why this long silence under the heaviest charges? If it is harmless, why has it not been published long since? Even the Statesman and State Gazette, while daily reading the charges of the State Journal, have never replied until yesterday, and then only in a general denial, thinking it too late for the facts to be circulated throughout the State before the election. Here is the power of the silence of the letter! In order to prevent it, we are compelled to publish our private note. Our excuse for this is, that General Barnes, through his organ in this city, has charged the State Journal with attempting to blackmail him; when we have

the proof, in his own hand-writing, that he attempted to subsidize our paper in the same way that we believe he has subsidized the Statesman and State Gazette, and also the proof that his bid was rejected. Here is his letter admitting the existence and character of Coke's secret letter: [PRIVATE.] AUSTIN, TEX., Oct. 28, '73.

Editor Journal: I wanted to see you about what I said relative to "Coke's San Antonio letter," before you alluded to it in your paper. It is a nice subject, and any misrepresentation as coming from me might force me to say more than I desire to say. You can use the matter in a better way than to bring me to the front. Yours in haste, and privately, (Signed) J. W. BARNES.

Gentlemen of the Statesman and State Gazette, what you say to this! The existence of the letter is admitted; it is admitted to be a "nice" or delicate "subject," and therefore, unlike the Bayers letter, which was published. This admission is made by the Vice President of the International Railroad. If Coke was not in complicity with the International Railroad rings in running the Democratic convention, how did it happen that its Vice President, an avowed Republican, should know anything about such a "nice subject" as the secret correspondence of this aspirant for the Governorship? And if the letter does not make secret pledges to the leading Democrats of the West, why was it written to San Antonio and kept so darkly secret, though demanded by the Republican press for nearly two months?

We have but little hope now, when the election is so near, that a genuine copy of this letter will be published in full. Having tacitly denied its existence to the present hour, we suppose Coke and his co-spirators will "through it out to the bitter end." Being forced to do this, they may publish some garbled extracts from it, with all the coarse left out; but the whole genuine letter will never see the light before the election, unless the State Journal should publish it. We now call attention to the second vital issue between the State Journal on the one hand, and the State Gazette on the other. We affirm, and they deny, that the Coke International railroad ring ever attempted to subsidize the State Journal, as it has evidently done the Statesman and State Gazette, and that we rejected the offer. The following correspondence will settle that question at once.

AUSTIN, TEX., Sept. 8, 1873. Mr. J. P. Newcomb: For the use of your Journal and your personal services in canvassing the proposed subsidy by Travis county to the International railroad, I agree to give you one per cent of the amount of the bonds donated for the above purposes; this to include all your expenses in the canvass, &c. JAMES W. BARNES, V. P. I. R. R. AUSTIN, Sep. 15, 1873.

SIR: My occupations have hitherto prevented a reply to your proposition of the 8th inst. I must respectfully decline your offer. The Journal is considered the organ of the Republican party of Texas, and also, to some extent, that of the State Government. It is not proper for it to become the special advocate of any private enterprise.

I will insert any statement or notice you may wish to publish in the Journal as an advertisement, and at the usual rates. Very respectfully, JAMES P. NEWCOMB. Now, people of Texas, give attention to what is proved in the foregoing, either directly or by unavoidable implication.

An immense and corrupt railroad ring including the heaviest capitalists in the United States, all of whom, we believe, are Republicans, undertook, by the aid of their money and influence, to control the Democratic State Convention and the Democratic nomination for Governor, because they thought the Democrats were most likely to carry the State. Think of Republicans proving traitors to their own party for the sake of railroad subsidies; think of Republicans controlling a Democratic State convention by their corruption money; and think of Republican monopolists putting their own tool upon the anti-monopoly majority of the Democratic party as their candidate for Governor; and all by the corrupt use of money. Richard Coke, the Democratic candidate for Governor, is the chosen agent of this corrupt and grasping railroad ring. If not, how does it happen that the Vice President of the International Railroad knows

all about his most secret correspondence—so secret, indeed, that our two months' call for it has not brought it to the light of day? (Concluded on next page.)

Our County Election.

The prospects of the Republicans thanks to the good common sense of the people and the demoralization of their opponents, are becoming brighter every day.

All the independent candidates are from the ranks of the Democracy, and the only field open to them is to quarrel with each other about the Mexican voting cattle. As this element, from the eternal fitness of things, goes with the Democracy under all circumstances, no loss accrues to the Republicans.

In the county of Bexar there will hardly be a dozen who will refuse to vote the Republican ticket.

A Not only has this corrupt railroad ring sought to corrupt the conventions, nominations, journals, and public opinion of both political parties in this State, but it is now using all its corrupt power to destroy the present able and irreproachable Supreme Court of this State, in order to make room for five judges of their own selection—like Coke, tools of their corrupt railroad ring. And, doubtless, this secret and "nice," or delicate letter of Coke to San Antonio, makes pledges of appointments to the Supreme Bench to western men, to enlist them to help him carry the West.

4. Not only does this corrupt railroad ring aspire to corrupt and control both political parties, both Republican and Democratic journalism and public opinion, and the Supreme Court of the State, but it seeks to drag down all the counties through which it may pass to give them large subsidies in addition to that so liberally given by the State.

5. And this ring is much larger than anybody is aware of. It seems to be only the International Railroad, but it is in secret copartnership with every railroad scheme in the State, designed to corrupt the Legislature and rob the people.

Coke is the candidate, agent and tool of this vast and corrupt railroad combination to corrupt, rob and ruin the State; they are trying to elect him by their money. Davis, poor and unaided, stands as the bulwark of the honor and interest of the people of Texas—State Journal.

Gov. Davis and the Gazette.

The State Gazette, alarmed at the sneers of Gov. Davis, and anxious to divert attention from the serious and damaging charges against Coke, makes an onslaught on the Governor for what it calls his bitterness against secession. The truth is, the Governor has not argued upon any such dead issue as secession. Of course he is opposed to secession, and so is every body else, except the editor of the Gazette, Coke, and a few old fossils like them. But Gov. Davis is justly severe upon those self-constituted leaders who deposed Gov. Houston, aliened or drove out the greatest and best men in the State, and dragged the people, the majority of whom were for the Union, into submission to the secession conspiracy. And he is also severe upon Coke who still secretly supports the old secession heresy, and tries to covertly beguile the people to stultify their votes into his support.

But the Gazette is only trying to save Coke from the indignation of the people for supporting the party that goes against public schools and immigration, that destroyed the credit of the State, that sought to pass the infamous landlord and tenant bill, that tried to put gamblers and sportsmen in the penitentiary and taxed the liquor dealers to an enormous extent, and it is especially alarmed at the established charge that Coke got his nomination by a corrupt combination with the International Railroad ring lawyers. But murder will out.—State Journal.
