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Coke for a Constitutional Convention.
The Coke secession party are pledged to a constitutional convention if the amendments proposed by the Coke 13th Legislature be defeated. The amendments, which are part of the Coke revolutionary platform, are certain to be defeated. In that event, Coke and all the Democratic members of the Legislature are pledged, and instructed by their platform, to call a constitutional convention. The constitution does not provide for such a call, nor for a constitutional convention. Both would be revolutionary, because outside of the constitution. Are the people of Texas prepared for a revolutionary movement of this sort? Will they elect Coke, and thus force this revolutionary movement upon the State? A constitutional convention would cost the people a million of dollars. Are the people of Texas willing to pay a million of dollars, merely to gratify a few bitter, ambitious partisans? Will they elect Coke and thus bind themselves and their children to pay this million in addition to the already heavy taxation imposed by the notorious Democratic Thirteenth Legislature?
Are the people of Texas aware of the danger of a constitutional convention, in the present bitterly partisan temper of the Coke secession Democracy? They may divide the State, for this is really desired by the leading Coke secession Democrats of both the East and the West. They want at least twice as many United States Senators, Congressmen, Supreme Judges, and the like as we now have, to satisfy the office-hunger of their army of men who think they ought to be in public position.
Division of the State would remove the Capital from Austin, and they might remove the Capital with out division. Then, the people would have to pay millions of dollars for new public buildings. A Democratic constitutional convention once assembled, they would change nearly every important feature of our present Constitution, make new offices, cut down the pay of the present offices, and embroil the State with the Federal Government.
If Coke is elected, we shall have all this trouble, expense, and injury; if Davis is elected, we shall have all this trouble, expense and injury. He would veto all such ruinous schemes.—Journal.

More Democratic Corruption.
Among the meanest of the many mean things which the Democratic 13th Legislature did, was the passage of a joint resolution, requiring "the payment of treasury warrants without regard to date or number." It is well known that the 12th Legislature adjourned without making any appropriation for the support of the State Government for the fiscal year commencing September 1st, 1873, and consequently the employees and officers of the State Government labored on without compensation, waiting for the "gal-lons" 13th to meet and make the necessary appropriation for their support. In the meantime the ever-to-be-remembered 13th met, and instead of at once making an appropriation for the payment of those who had been working for four months and a half without any pay, or any evidence of indebtedness even, finding that there was about forty thousand dollars in the State Treasury which the Treasurer was carefully hoarding up for the purpose of paying creditors of the State according to priority of their claims, and with regard to date, they, with indecent haste, made an appropriation for themselves, passed the joint resolution above mentioned, drew the last cent out of the treasury, which should have been paid in liquidation of claims due one year before the Legislature met. Not satisfied with that, they went even further, like the Hon. (f) O. N. Hollingsworth, and wrote to the sheriffs of the various counties which they represented, and offered them bribes to remit their taxes to them, to buy up the warrants of those whose claims dated back before they were elected, and utterly refused to make any appropriation for the suffering employees until the last day of their session, taking very good care that not one cent should remain in the treasury, and that no funds should find their way there for months, this should have reached the treasury in the ordinary course of events. And the same thing is still going heavily on, and the shapers and shynkers who are buying State warrants at 50 per cent discount are getting the money of them, while the honest creditors of the State are paying away one third or more of their salaries in the shape of interest, to those very shynkers.—Journal.
