[COMMUNICATED.] SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 14, 1873. Editor San Antonio Express: SIR:—Your amiable cotemporary having, in his last night's issue, honored me with a notice, slightly complimentary in its nature, I respectfully ask to be allowed the use of your columns for the purpose of correcting a misstatement therein occurring, which does gross injustice to the worthy gentlemen comprising the Democratic Reception Committee, and, what is more important, of explaining the reason why, I requested permission to ask Col. Hubbard some questions.

I had written three letters during the day, and called upon Col. Hubbard personally, but was unable to obtain the decision of the Democratic committee, previous to the commencement of Col. Hubbard's speech, I thereupon sent up a fourth communication, in answer to which I was politely informed by Gen. Young and Maj. Brackenridge of said committee, that the resolutions previously adopted, (which were at the same time shown to me) precluded any joint discussion or interference.

I am satisfied that these gentlemen acted in perfect good faith, and with that perfect courtesy, the non-practice of which is pronounced by the Herald writer, to be so eminently proper.

As a partisan, it is not somewhat curious that the once so amiable Herald should now quote the authority of your illustrious predecessor—in fact that—thus inspired by an idiot—he sings about epithets of that sort in such an idiotic manner. Now to the important feature of this little incident.

The questions I wished to ask, as submitted in writing, were in relation to Immigration, Frontier Protection, Public Education, Public domains and free homesteads for settlers.

Any one, of common intelligence, who has watched their course, must have been struck by the clumsy strategy, displayed by the Democracy in relation to these important points, which are in fact the vital issues of this contest—the frantic shrieks of tyranny, corruption, &c., being, as every man of sense will agree, but the merest gammon, ever dished up before a people, whose intelligence the aristocratic Democracy undoubtedly undervalues, and which it so persistently attempts, by a desperate opposition to the establishment of public schools, to keep down to the standard, by them deemed proper—just about equal to that of a Texas beef.—Col. Hubbard has not, just as I expected, deviated one inch from this time honored line.

Their way of putting the case has always been a solemn declaration of their being in favor of these points—in principle, followed by a wholesale denunciation of our Governor and party, who according to their assertions, are alone responsible for the bad showings until now made in these directions.

Hubbard, defying his position, and I, supposing, he pledges himself and party to a plainly described and reasonable system of frontier protection, a suitable provision for the furtherance of immigration and security for the safety of what little public lands they may have left us—will gladly wear the Democratic Livery—forgive them even them even the two dollars donors generally paid to their intelligent adherents from the land of God and Liberty, and—acknowledge that a silk purse can be made of the arid-arian appendage, &c., &c.

Last time it was Col. King, this time it is Col. Hubbard, who are sent here to charm us with their syren songs. As the Herald has so often asserted, both are polished gentlemen, of vast attainments, orators of no mean order—remarkable for good looks—but let me ask, can we vote for Col. Hubbard? If we are to vote for him for the reasons set forth by the Herald, why will not the French at once bow down to the Sage of Frochdorf and the Spaniards cry *¡viva!* to the virtuous Isabella? Why oh, why shall we not call on Pio Nono to realize the golden age upon this side of the Atlantic?

No—in all common sense. We know to what line of policy our Republican Candidates are pledged. We know that their election will be conducive to the greatest good to our State and people.

We do not know, in spite of all the efforts we have made to find out what, after all, the Democratic Candidates are going to do, but after the dear experience of the ever-memorable Thirteenth, we can guess, and, in spite of Col. Hubbard's glittering generalities, we would rather be excused.
