## Governor Davis at Marshall

From a telegram in the Galveston  
News from Marshall, it seems that  
Governor Davis has told the peo-  
ple that Webb Flanagan is not the  
right man for Senator. This ex-  
pression of opinion on the part of  
Governor Davis is considered by  
many Republicans to be very im-  
portant, but it proves that Governor  
Davis is above party policy when  
it comes to his opinion about men.  
He does not believe Mr. Flanagan  
the proper man to elect to the State  
Senate, and this opinion is based on  
past experience; this honest, fear-  
less expression was cost him some  
votes in Mr. Flanagan's District but  
it should cause the people all over  
the State to come to his rescue.  
We are anxious that Governor Da-  
vis succeed. We sincerely feel that  
his election is necessary to preserve  
the best interests of the State, but  
we would rather be beaten, and see  
our political enemies in power than  
to have a victory and a repetition  
of the 12th Legislature, and the in-  
cubus of its corrupt men hanging  
about our necks. The Governor  
goes into office independent of all  
unholy alliances. He will be the  
Governor of the whole people, and  
will be in the future as in the past  
the fearless enemy of corrupt men  
and measures.

## A Young Party.

The Republican party of Texas is  
a young party, but its rapid growth,  
its certain victory is the wonder of  
all old politicians. In 1860, there  
were but few men in all the South  
who desired to court martyrdom by  
declaring themselves Republicans,—  
it was almost equal to having a  
death warrant to subscribe to the  
New York Tribune. But the veil of  
the temple was rent by the war and  
old things have passed away. The  
Republican party rose young and  
fresh from the ruins of the old po-  
litical parties, it began a great  
battle against disloyalty to the old  
Union, still existing in the hearts of  
a large body of the Southern people,  
and in behalf of the downtrodden  
and oppressed laboring class of the  
South; it inscribed on its banner  
equal rights, and civil and political  
liberty to all men. Opposed to the  
Republican party were the old po-  
litical leaders and politicians, who  
gathered up all the wounds of the  
South, and organized a party under  
the old name of Democracy. But  
whether victorious or defeated, the  
Republican party is continually con-  
quering, because the vindictive  
forces which compose the so-called  
Democratic party, are dying out.  
The South is rapidly becoming Re-  
publican.—Texas is bound to be so,  
as two powerful agents are at work,  
the old element is becoming liberal  
and the new element is anti Demo-  
cratic and naturally Republican.

Every contest since 1860 in Texas  
has shown a growth of the Republi-  
can party, and in December the old  
politicians will stand aghast at the  
verdict of the people if we are not  
greatly mistaken at the signs of the  
times.

Greeneyes killed the National  
Democratic organization, and recent  
experience in the way of Demo-  
cratic legislation have destroyed all  
public confidence in Democratic  
politicians. The Republican party  
is a young party and is certain of  
complete triumph.—Journal.



## AN important suit has just been decided in the District Court at Colorado Springs, El Paso County, Col., Judge Hallet presiding. Suit was brought by the Colorado Springs Company to recover possession of a lot of ground deeded by the former to the latter some months since, a condition in the deed prohibiting the manufacture, sale or other disposition of intoxicating liquors as a beverage in any place of public resort or residence conveyed, under a penalty of forfeiture. The condition was sustained, and the jury found the defendants guilty of a breach of condition, and the property in fee reverted to the plaintiffs.

## PLAIN TALK.

As long as the EXPRESS is under its present editorial management it will support the Republican nominees just as long as the Republican nominees support each other, and no longer. We do not propose to follow the example of the Herald, and support indirectly candidates, not even indirectly by keeping silent.

Before we undertake to advocate the claims of Republican candidates we want to be assured that they did not obtain their nominations through fraud, and that they are doing their duty to the whole ticket.

Either the election for county offices is a political affair, or it is not.

If it is, we demand in the name of the Republican voters of this county that the leading Republicans and the candidates on the ticket fulfill their obligations to the party that nominated the latter.

If there are no politics in the county election, then the Republican voters of this county want to be informed of it, as there are various and sundry individuals who could fill the offices infinitely better than the men who have been nominated.

We do not propose to be misunderstood in this matter, and although we are not thoroughly posted as to what amount of secret information is going on between Republican candidates and disguised Democrats we know enough to justify us making the foregoing strictures.

In the first place our nominee for sheriff is working jointly with Jno. Rosenheimer to the detriment of his brother nominee, Mr Wulffing, while a prominent member of the Republican Executive Committee, and a member of the convention is assisting him in this matter.

In his address to the voters of this district Judge Siemering defines his position as follows: "I have no private axe to grind, no private interest to promote, and do not propose to allow myself to be used to further the private interests of others. I am not interested in any railroad scheme, nor in land speculations, neither do I wish to make money by my position, should I be elected, and am not striving to become renowned.

But I do favor a practical system of free schools that will secure every child in the State at least a primary education. I think that the counties should have the management of the schools, but that they should be sustained by the State, and that there should be a central power in the State to compel the counties to comply with their duties.

I am also in favor of a system of State Police, by which a number of police are to be employed by the counties, elected by the citizens; the said police to be under the control of the sheriffs, and through the sheriffs to be controlled by the Adjutant General and Attorney General.

I oppose every donation of land or money to railroad corporations that is not regulated by the general laws of the State, so each section of the country may be treated impartially.

I am opposed to all Sunday and Temperance Laws, and favor an effectual system of frontier defence.

## TELEGRAPHIC.

FOREIGN NEWS.  
MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—The severest storm for years is prevailing.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—It is reported on the stock exchange, that Thomas Baring, the founder of the house of Baring Brothers, dead.

Half a million of gold was bought in open market for New York.

The Daily News proposes that England and America act in concert in the Virginia outrage.

HAVANA, Nov. 19.—The Vos de Cuba publishes a rumor that seventeen prisoners have been shot at Holguin, on account of a recently discovered conspiracy of the corporate authorities with the Cubans on the Virginia; but there is no official confirmation of the report. The same paper says:

"The laws ought to be enforced against the conspirators without consideration for either small or great, or what strangers may say or do. We are owners of our homes and are well able to manage our affairs and defend our rights."

DOMESTIC NEWS.  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—As an evidence of the entire unanimity of the cabinet on the existing complications growing out of the Virginia capture and consequences, it may be mentioned that all the cabinet officers, though guarded in their expressions as to what diplomatic action has been taken by the United States government, or what will be the result of it, do not hesitate to say that entire confidence can be placed in the President, and they all look for approval by the people of the course pursued, when the same shall be made known.
