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PROCLAMATION By the Governor of the State of Texas. To all to whom these presents shall come: WHEREAS, The Legislature of the State of Texas by a joint resolution passed June 4th, 1873, has proposed certain amendments to the Constitution of said State, which joint resolution reads as follows, viz:

SECTION 1. Be it remembered by the Legislature of the State of Texas, that section twenty of article one, Bill of Rights of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows to-wit: SECTION 20. No power of suspending laws in the State shall be exercised except by the Legislature.

SECTION 2. That section 2, section 3 and section 4 of article 5 of the said Constitution, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit: SECTION 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of one Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum. They shall be appointed by the Governor, and with the advice and consent of the Senate, for a term of nine years.

SECTION 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only, which in civil cases, shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Appeals from inferior courts may be allowed with such exceptions and under such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe.

SECTION 4. The Supreme Court shall hold its session at the Capital, and two other places in the State. SECTION 5. That section twenty-eight, section forty and section forty-eight of article five of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows: SECTION 28. In each and every organized county in the State, there shall be an assessor and collector of taxes, elected by the people at the next ensuing general election and every four years thereafter, who shall assess the property and collect the taxes as assessed in conformity to such laws as now exist, or may be enacted by the Legislature, relative to the assessment and collection of taxes.

SECTION 40. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases, that is to say for locating or changing county seats; regulating the practice in Courts of Justice; regulating the duties and jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace and constables; providing for changes of venue in civil and criminal cases; incorporating cities or towns or changing or amending the charter of any city or village; providing for the management of common schools, regulating the rates of interest on money, remitting, suspending or extending the law of descent in all other cases when a general law shall be enacted; or in any case when a general law can be made applicable, no special law shall be enacted. The Legislature shall enact general laws providing by the cases before enumerated in this section, and for all other cases when a general law can be made applicable, no special law shall be enacted. Who is Kessler?

One of the Democratic Candidates on the legislative ticket is Louis Kessler of Comal County. The people are asked to cast their vote for him. Who is Kessler and why is this honor conferred upon him? What are his merits and his capacities? Kessler said in one of his public speeches the Democratic Convention nominated him for no other reason but because he was the only intelligent German in this District. If the Democratic party has such a poor opinion of the intelligence of the German element in this section of the Country we can well understand the existence of know-nothingism even at the present time. There is, however, no danger in this respect. Not the intelligence, but the stupidity of Kessler has elevated him to the position he now holds before the people of this District. The Democratic party knows well enough that Kessler does not belong to them; he belongs to no party, he has no idea of party obligations and party objects, he does not even belong to himself! He is running for the Legislature since 1866 and suffered himself to be beaten three times. At every election he pops up again, first ventilating which Convention offers the best chances for his nomination, and if no Convention stoops down low enough to pick him up, he becomes an independent Candidate. Such was the case in 1872.

Now we ask for what reason has the Democratic Convention nominated Kessler? Do they believe him to be possessed of the time-honored principles of old Democracy? Then go and hear him when in conversation with Republicans he condemns the time-honored principles and palms himself off for a Union man, and a liberal Republican! Hear him, when he refers to his Republican record and principles and listen to the promises he makes, should he be elected! We do not doubt in the least that when amongst his Democratic friends, he is of quite the opposite opinion. Why should he not! What does he care for principles? He is not running in the interest of any party! He runs solely for—George Pfeuffer! He is George Pfeuffer's man, he belongs to George Pfeuffer! Last year George Pfeuffer worked hard to secure Kessler's nomination in the Liberal Convention. He failed. George Pfeuffer has then nobody and had to take a backseat. Now George Pfeuffer has managed to become the Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of this Senatorial District and George Pfeuffer's wishes must be respected. So Kessler chanced to become a regular Candidate of the Democratic party.

Now what is the object of Pfeuffer's intrigues? What is the secret of all this underground-working? Did you ever, gentle reader, hear of Pfeuffer's narrow gauge? Do you know that this narrow gauge is the ambition of his life, that he has spent his money and his time in a railroad speculation by which he expected to become a so-called self-made man? Don't you know that he has labored hard for a subsidy for his road? Remember his blind opposition to his party-man Hoffman during the last election! Why, Hoffman ridiculed his narrow gauge mania! New Braunfels will be in direct communication with Houston and Galveston as soon as the International road reaches Comal County and therefore can easily spare Pfeuffer's narrow gauge.

What have the people of this Senatorial District to expect from a Representative, who is a perfect fool in the hands of a Railroad Speculator? Have we not had enough of such material? Must we further the private speculations of an individual and set aside the interests of a whole community? Let the honest Democrat consider before he votes! Remember that Western Texas has suffered long enough on account of her poor representation in our Legislature! We are to blame ourselves for our shortcomings! There are higher interests to be taken care of but Pfeuffer's narrow gauge! There are better men we ought to send to Austin than Kessler.

Latest News.

DEMOCRATIC NEWS. New York, Nov. 26.—The Herald's special dispatches from Madrid say that the situation there is grave, and that a serious misunderstanding exists between Minister Siskies and the Spanish Cabinet upon arrival of the news of the capture of the Virgins.

A FORMAL PROTEST.

President Castellar called at the U. S. Legation and expressed his regret, and ordered a suspension of the sentence. When Secretary Fish telegraphed the news of the executions, Gen. Siskies sent a note, at two o'clock in the morning, demanding a stay. The Foreign Secretary answered, questioning the accuracy of the information, and intimating that Gen. Siskies' action was not authorized; thereupon Siskies, in the name of the United States, addressed

AGAINST THE INHUMAN BUTCHERIES, AND THE INSULT TO THE UNITED STATES.

He again demanded that Spain should enforce obedience to its order in Cuba, and insisted on the rights of American citizens to trial, under the treaty of 1796. He complained to the American Consul at Santiago, but was prevented using the telegraph to Washington by the Spanish Secretary, who answered that the matter was wholly a municipal affair between Spain and the Virginian pirates. Spain could not tolerate American interference. The interview ended by Gen. Siskies demanding that Spain should enforce the order of her cabinet to Cuba for the suspension of further executions. Gen. Siskies would not discuss the municipal affairs of Cuba. The interview terminated angrily, Siskies saying he would hold no more personal interviews. Only in official relations with the Minister would he give his attention.

The public feeling runs high. The Spaniards blame the United States for the Cuban insurrection, and say they will welcome war. Minister Siskies does not see how war can be avoided. If Spain will concede nothing and public opinion prevents President Castellar from making any concessions, there is no use in the United States trifling any more on the subject. If the Spaniards are stubborn in making any concessions, it is impossible for the extreme Republicans to favor the views of the United States in the affair. The officers of the City of New York give the names of the passengers seized: Mrs. Dorritals de Monti, a widow and her child, Richardo Loucis, and entire family consisting of wife and three children, and Donna Catalina Perez. Nothing suspicious was found in the clothing of the women and children. They were all discharged except Loucis. Two hundred persons captured are implicated by correspondence. There were no executions when the steamer New York left.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Dispatches received by the Secretary of State are confirmatory in part of the special telegrams from Madrid in regard to HOSTILE DEMONSTRATIONS to Minister Siskies, though the Secretary is of the opinion that the specials are somewhat exaggerated. The mob which was collected in front of the American Legation, was promptly dispersed by the government, and there is no doubt here, in official circles, but that the authorities at Madrid are fully capable of preventing an outbreak.

The position of Minister Siskies is very uncomfortable, but it is not believed that any violence will be endured, as Mr. Siskies telegraphs that the Spanish officials are equal to the emergency. Minister Siskies is hourly in communication with the State Department, and his dispatches indicate the existence of a very strong feeling against the United States. Mr. Fish submitted a number of telegrams from Minister Siskies to the Cabinet meeting to-day, and the session, which has just commenced, will probably be one of the most interesting and serious meetings since the commencement of the present complications.

Members of the Cabinet this morning seem to be very serious in demeanor, and there appears to be a more extended discussion in all places as to the probabilities of a war. So far as has been made known, the official advice from Spain have not varied in the assertions of the honesty of the Castilian Government to preserve friendly relations, and to command calmness and dignity during the progress of negotiations. The excitement of the populace in Madrid does not seem to be shared by the Government.

FOREIGN NEWS.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—A tumultuous session, McMahon's prolongation of seven years independent was adopted. The constitutional bills were adopted by 66 majority. A motion to appoint a committee of 30 to report on constitutional bills was adopted by 65 majority. Paris is excited over the result.

Immediately after the adjournment of the Assembly last night, the members of the Cabinet waited upon President McMahon and tendered their resignations. He refused to accept them, begging that the Ministers would retain their offices until after the formation of a new Cabinet.

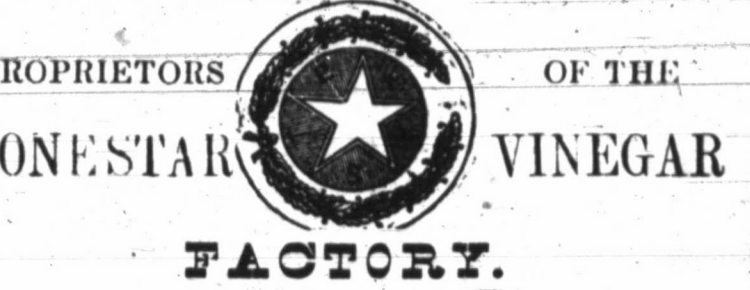
