**A Chaotic Case.**  
 It appears to be very difficult to  
 get hold of the right end of the story  
 of the Cuban "unpleasantness."  
 (1) That somewhere from fifty to  
 one hundred men have been brut-  
 ally butchered in a bloodthirsty  
 manner in Cuba, seems to be about  
 as near definiteness, as the combin-  
 ed wisdom of two hemispheres can  
 come. It also seems tolerably clear,  
 that the hot-blooded islanders and  
 and their Spanish guardians were  
 highly elated at the butchery, and  
 indulged in a two days' war dance,  
 worthy of a lot of lava-bed Modocs.  
 Then it seems, likewise, that when  
 the news reached Spain, that the  
 hidalgos—and *los dalgos*—of that  
 explosive bull-ring became danger-  
 ously enraged at the United States'  
 wooden-legged Minister, and the  
 Government could only persuade  
 the Spaniards by driving them  
 away in a herd at the point of the  
 bayonet, from doing personal vio-  
 lence to our Minister, and offering  
 insult to our flag!

But, whether the Virginias is an  
 American ship; whether Ryan and  
 the rest of the murdered prisoners,  
 are American citizens; whether  
 they were murdered according to  
 international law, or not, is badly  
 mixed. War is a bad thing. It  
 has brutalized Spain. And Spanish  
 war has brutalized Cuba. Spain  
 and Cuba have been drunken on  
 blood for centuries. If arbitration,  
 by the German Emperor, or any one  
 else would free Cuba from Spanish  
 bullying rule, wipe human slavery  
 out there, and bring order out of  
 disorder, all right;—but to this  
 complexion it ought to come at  
 last.

 the mother when she heard this  
 news; the son was sent for, came  
 to France and hastened to his  
 mother's house. But at sight of  
 him she drew back shuddering. In  
 the disfigured idiot before her, with  
 horrible scars all over his face, one  
 of his eyes gone, his nose crushed  
 flat, his lips cut by a sabre stroke,  
 his whole body emaciated by long  
 suffering, she failed utterly to  
 recognize the darling of her heart,  
 the gay, handsome boy of former times.  
 In spite of the papers found upon  
 him, and the genuineness of which  
 could not be disputed, she refused  
 to accept him as her son. In this  
 she was encouraged by her nephews,  
 who had already considered them-  
 selves the only legitimate heirs to  
 her great wealth. The son was ar-  
 rested on charge of forgery and  
 misrepresentation; but, being not  
 yet completely restored to health,  
 he was, by consent of all parties,  
 sent to an insane asylum. Here he  
 was so successfully treated that he  
 soon recovered completely in mind  
 as well as in body. Thus restored,  
 he wrote a touching letter to his  
 mother, who came to see him, and,  
 after a long conversation, in the  
 course of which he made known  
 matters concerning his childhood  
 that could not have been known to  
 any one else all doubts vanished from  
 her mind, and she acknowledged  
 him openly. But her nephews are  
 not satisfied, and consider, or pre-  
 tend to consider, the young man to  
 be a cheat, who has by foul means  
 overcome the natural instinct and  
 good sense of the mother. Accord-  
 ingly the trial is going continued,  
 and there is great excitement in  
 Paris as to the probable result.

**When will Coke be inaugurated.**

The wisecracks of the Austin Statesman have discovered that the term of office of Governor Davis expires on the second Thursday in January 1874 and that Governor Coke will be inaugurated on that very day. In proof of which they cite page 17 of the Constitution and the election declaration on page 44.

If there was ever an instance of whipping the devil around the stump, it is the sophistic logic, the Statesman indulges in. One slight blow and the spider-web is torn to pieces. The election declaration on page 44 will not be considered a part of the Constitution proper by any lawyer of reputation. It had only reference to one single subject, the election under military rule, and no provision of this declaration can annul the provisions of the Constitution proper. But let us look at the third article of said declaration. It reads as follows:

"The officers as elected shall commence the discharge of the duties of the office for which they have been chosen as soon as elected and qualified, in compliance with the provisions of the Constitution, therewith submitted, and shall hold their respective offices for the term of years prescribed by the Constitution, beginning from the day of their election."

If this means anything, it means that the officers shall be considered duly elected the very day they have qualified for their office. We would like to ask the Statesman what day he considers the election day of Governor Davis? The election lasted four days and he may have had a majority of the votes cast on the first day of election as well as on the last day or the day of finishing; the counting of the votes may be considered the election day. But it is evident from the whole tenor of this article that the term "day of election" refers to the day the officers are qualified.

But we are of opinion that this election declaration, fixing the day of election on the first Monday in July 1869 and the three succeeding days, has never been a part of our constitution, in as much as it was subject to the change by the military authorities and actually has been set aside by the postponement of the election day to December 1869.

The clause on page 17, referred to by the Statesman, reads: He (the Governor) shall be inaugurated on the first Thursday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable. But that portion of the same section, which provides that the Governor shall hold his office for the term of four years from the time of his installment, has been entirely overlooked by the Statesman. This seems to us plain language, and while the election declaration is very indefinite in the meaning of its words, there is no doubt as to the meaning of the above provision. The Governors term of office commenced on the day of his installment, the third of April 1870, and ends on the second day of April 1874. It will therefore not be "practicable" for the next Legislature, if there be one, to inaugurate Mr. Coke before the 3rd day of April 1874.

**The Salary-Grab.**

The question, who is responsible for the Congressional salary-grab, is now before Congress and will be settled at once. Although the fact cannot be denied that a majority of the Democratic members of Congress voted for the back-pay and a majority of the Republican members against it, the Democratic press has charged the Republican

Since the re-assembling of Congress the salary-question has been taken up by the Republican members and a late dispatch states that the Republican Caucus has resolved to make the repeal of the increase of the salary, and the refunding of the back-salary, a party measure.

On the other hand the Democratic members have ostentatiously selected a man as their Candidate for speaker of the House of Representatives, who played a conspicuous role in the enactment of the salary law, who pocketed his back-pay and never returned it and who in all probability, will appose the action of the Republican party in this matter. They have thus endorsed the salary-grab and though we are satisfied the Democratic press will pass in silence over it, yet the people will make a note of it.

**Latest Appearance of the Green Eyed Monster.**

Two days ago two of our fishermen were out in a small boat in Conception Bay, a short distance from English Cove, plying their avocations. Suddenly they discovered a dark, shapeless mass floating on the surface of the water a short distance from them. On approaching it the men concluded that it was a huge bale of goods—perhaps part of the cargo of some wrecked vessel, and that they had found a valuable prize. They seized the bale with their boat-hooks, when suddenly the dark mass became animated, opened out like a huge umbrella without a handle, and the horror-stricken fishermen beheld a face full of intelligence, but also of ferocity, and a pair of ghastly green eyes glaring at them. Its huge, scissor-like beak seemed to open with a savage and malignant purpose. The men were petrified with terror, and for a moment so fascinated with the horrible sight that they were powerless. The eyes of the monster were peculiarly large and prominent, bright, and apparently glistening with rage. Before the fishermen could make any effort to escape, the creature, now but a few feet from the boat, appeared to open out, and suddenly there shot out from around its face several long arms of corpse-like fleshiness, grasping for the boat and seeking to envelop it in their liquid folds. Had these lithe, slimy arms, with their death-like, adhesive powers, once fastened themselves on the boat of the men, nothing could have saved them from destruction, for when the suckers with which they are furnished have taken hold nothing can tear them away. They would have been brought in a moment withing reach of the powerful beak which was ready to dart upon them. Only one of the longer tentacles reached the boat, and, owing to its length, went completely over and beyond it. Quick as lightning one of the men seized his tomahawk and at one blow severed the corpse-like arm which was flung over the boat to drag it to destruction. The green-eyed monster uttered no cry of pain, but it disappeared beneath the waters, and the fishermen, who had thus escaped from a horrible death, found themselves in possession of the most valuable arm—an unprecedented trophy for which there is no parallel occurrence on record.

The portion of the kraken's arm amputated by this rude surgical operation has been forwarded to St. John's. I have just returned from a careful examination of it. The member is business-like in construction, is tough and fibrous, but not thicker than a man's wrist. The fishermen who acted as surgeons declare that there must have been at least six feet of the arm left behind attached to the monster's body. Indeed, I am inclined to think from the description that this creature—never before seen in this part of the world—has several feet of his arm remaining, making its entire length twenty-nine feet. The amputated arm is lived in color, pointed at the extremity, where it is covered with rows of suckers, which are cartilaginous, horny and about the size of a quarter dollar. I have examined some of the suckers for its preservation in spirits, and it will be placed in our museum.

The absurd story concerning the alleged seizure of President Grant, in withdrawing his funds from the First National Bank in Washington just before its failure, and making no effort to save the government deposits, has long since been so plainly denied that it is now credited—if, in fact, it was ever believed—in anything like well informed circles. The scandal, however, is running the rounds of the country press as vigorously as if it had never been contradicted, or was not to be denied. Under these circumstances it may be permitted us to publish the following paragraph from a strictly private letter, written a few days ago by the President to an old personal friend in this city. The quaint and laconic style of Gen. Grant is apparent all through the letter, and at its close, where he says: "I write this for your information, but not for the public. It has been a rule of mine never to respond to slanders." The paragraph referred to is as follows:

"You may have seen the statement in the papers that I drew out of Jay Cooke's bank \$40,000 the day before it failed, and took no notice of the \$187,000 government had there. This bank was not a national bank, and therefore not a bank of deposit, government, therefore, had no deposits with them, and lost nothing by them. I, individually, was in Pittsburg at the time of their suspension, and was as much surprised to hear of it as you or any one could be. If I had a deposit there—and I did keep an account with them—it is still there. If I owe them anything—and I suspect I do—that is among their assets. Unfortunately, I have been in a condition since my occupancy of my present office that no bank could fail after the 15th of any month and victimize me out of \$500."

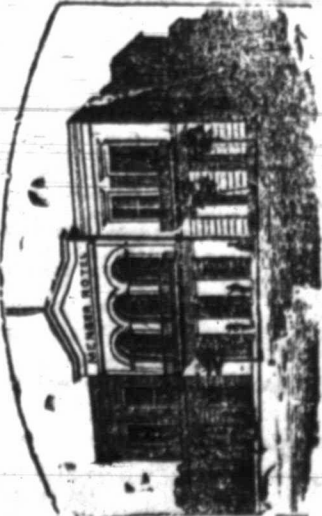

 Dispatch intimates, at two and one half cents per hour—in a worthy companion piece to the story of the religious revival conducted in a certain brigade during the war by a chaplain of more than forty-parson power. Having revived several of the regiments, he called one morning on a New York Colonel. "Colonel," said the enthusiastic dervish, "I want to speak to your regiment. I have had grace, with other regiments, to convert many. There is that Hoosier regiment on the hill yonder; I baptized twenty-seven of them only last Sunday." "Stop," said Colonel K. "How many men do you tell me you baptized there, chaplain?" "Twenty-seven men, Colonel," Adjutant E. said the Colonel, turning abruptly to that officer, "detail fifty men for instant baptism. I'll be damned if this regiment shall be outdone, while I command it, by a Hoosier regiment, or any there in the service!"

In obedience to a resolution of the International Congress for the promotion of agriculture and forestry, recently held in Vienna, the Austrian Government has undertaken to guarantee the life of all birds useful for the soil and the forests by international treaties with all other European States. These treaties stipulate that no person shall be allowed to catch or kill any insect-destroying bird; but the catching of birds that live chiefly on grain is permitted, except during their breeding time, from March 1st to the 15th of September. 
