The Depot.

About a year ago the Congress of the United States appropriated one hundred thousand dollars for the building of a military Depot at San Antonio. The city made the government a present with a valuable tract of land, such as the officials selected themselves, and the present was accepted.

But the depot has not been built, nor has any effort been made to reach the appropriation.

Why is this so. Either the government needs a depot at this place and then it ought to have built it or it does not need it and then Congress ought not to have given itself the trouble of appropriating money for that purpose. The fact is that the citizens of San Antonio have been deceived by false promises; expecting to have headquarters permanently located here they have spent about \$10,000 for depot purposes; they have bought a site for the depot, they have sent Col. Williams to Washington to use his influence in our favor, they have given a splendid reception to Secretary Belknap and Gen. Sheridan, and all to no purpose. We now hear it rumored that Headquarters will be removed to some other place, and then, of course, the whole depot matter is at an end. In connection herewith it is stated that Mr. Peirce does not intend to accept the offer of Bexar County and his road will not be built as stipulated therein.

But then we have secured a democratic victory, which ought to compensate our property holders for the loss otherwise to be sustained. We have formerly expressed the opinion that the present Government of the United States would not invest any considerable amount of money in improving our harbors, our inland cities and take an interest in our prosperity generally as long as we insist upon remaining good Confederate Democrats. Right or wrong, this seems to be a fact, and as this is a free country, it is entirely left with us to ascertain which is the most profitable road to fortune. If it is our pleasure to place ourselves in opposition to the central power, we must patiently bear the consequences.

The Liberal-Republicans.

A few remnants of that liberal-republican party, which died on the 8th day of November 1872 on a sickness contracted in Cincinnati in May of the same year, have lately been discovered within the United States, and it became necessary to do away with them as quick as possible. We refer to the Senators Sumner, Schurz, Fenton and Tipton. Last year these Liberal Republicans were entirely ignored by the Republicans in forming the Committees, and the Democrats voluntarily ceded to them some of their places.

A few days ago the Republicans asked them whether they would accept seats from them or from the Democrats. Tipton confessed to have become a sound Democrat and declared he would remain with the Democrats. Sumner, Schurz and Fenton expressed their wish to be remembered by the Republicans in the formation of the Committees and their wishes were respected.

There will now be an end with any movement based on personal vanity, ambition and a desire to become a great man. The "Fiasco" of the Liberal-Republicans is, in the history of political parties without a parallel and well-merited. Sumner, Schurz and Fenton—we wish the latter had, like Tipton, remained with the Democrats—have now an opportunity to work within the Republican ranks for reform, as this party has publicly pronounced to be in favor of all desirable reforms.

London, Nov. 18th, 1873.

The Committee on Appropriations of the Senate agreed to report the House bill, giving the navy \$1,000,000, without any amendment.

The Finance Committee reported adversely to the bill authorizing a partial payment of duties in greenback bills, placing the telegraph lines in connection with the Capitol and the departments under the control of Gen. Babcock.

Passed a bill removing the disabilities of William Steel, of Texas.

Senator Morton made a long speech in favor of Pinchback. Senator McCreey speaks to-morrow.

Col. Frederick Dent, the father of Mrs. Grant, died at midnight.

His daughter, Mrs. Casey, is quite ill at Philadelphia, and an unfavorable effect of the sad news is apprehended.

Col. Dent has resided for a long time at the White House as a guest of his daughter. The Colonel has never abandoned his Democracy. His somewhat forcible denunciations of the prevailing faction in its highest places, has been one of the features of the Executive Mansion. He ate his breakfast and smoked his cigar yesterday morning.

The Committee on Privileges and Elections are divided upon this question, whether Pinchback is entitled to be sworn in upon his credentials. Senator Morton's resolution that the credentials of Pinchback to a seat for six years, commencing on the fourth of March, 1873, being the regular term, he is entitled under the law and usages of the Senate to be sworn in, and that the ground of contest to his right should be made thereafter. The vote on this question comes up to-day after the morning hour, but too late for the regular noon report. The question before the committee, upon which they divided, was not between McMillan and Pinchback, but whether Pinchback should be seated.

FOREIGN NEWS.

BAYONNE, Dec. 16.—The official journal of the Carlists announces that the town of Berge has been captured by the royalists under Tristang.

The cure of Santa Cruz is to be tried by court martial.

MADRID, Dec. 16.—The Carlist insurrection is decreasing.

PARIS, Dec. 16.—It is rumored that in consequence of the Republican successes in the late supplementary elections for members of the assembly, the Right will propose the alteration of the suffrage law depriving four million persons of the franchise.

DOMESTIC NEWS.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—The House is discussing the bill for the repeal of the bankruptcy law.

The Senate proceedings are unimportant. Senator Morton's resolution seating Pinchback is now up. Senator Stockton is speaking. No early result is expected.

The motion to reconsider the confirmation of Shepherd was voted down, and he is now governor. No other action in the Executive session transpired.

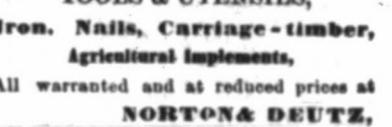

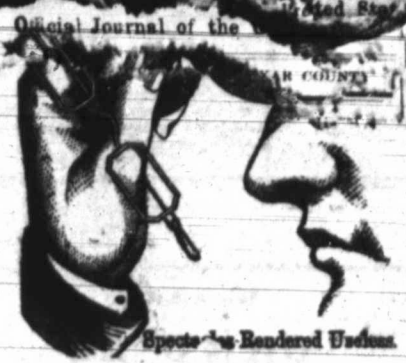
