AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 14, 1873.
Editor San Antonio Express:
Having now found out whatever is to be found out at the Capitol, I shall proceed to give you the result of my investigations.

The constitutional question, raised in regard to our late unpleasantness—election, is the all absorbing topic in political circles. The "State Journal" takes strong ground, though not going quite so far, as the "EXPRESS," and the "Staatszeitung" also brought out an iron-clad leader yesterday, while the "Statesman's" frantic appeals to the Governor, begging him to hide under a bushel the light of "his organs" are tremendous and fierce to behold.

In all this the Governor is in a very delicate position. Like Cesar's wife he must be above suspicion. While he has sworn to the very Constitution, so grossly violated in this instance, any steps taken by him, an interested party, might furnish a handle to silly accusations, to the effect that he wished to "perpetuate himself," and the "Statesman" would get a chance to double his subscribers by publishing spread- eagle articles upon "Cesarism" a la N. Y. Herald.

To escape from this dilemma it is rumored the Gov. Davis intends to resign, but I cannot believe it, for my part. His abdication would bring the State into "Chaos, worse confounded," and it seems impossible that a man of such high sense of duty, could think of leaving the helm at this juncture.

I believe in "being non-committal" at present, he has chosen the wisest course.

I have interviewed Gov. Davis, as well as all the other State Officers, but you might as well bore for oil on the Military Plaza, as to extract for them any information as to what they are going to do.

The Governor looks well and received me very kindly. He appears in no wise disheartened by a defeat, the peculiar causes of which are well understood, and in no wise can dim the lustre of his sterling merit. I suppose, were it not from pure and high-toned patriotic motives, Edmund J. Davis would retire from an executive Chair, which has proved to him by no means a bed of roses.

There is no doubt, notwithstanding his defeat that Gov. Davis can count to-day, a thousand friends where Barne's elephant cannot count one. Cokey was voted for under the party lash, and thus obtained a majority of ignoramuses. His record shows too clearly that he is unfit for the position he aspired to, and unfit to be trusted anyway.

While Gov. Davis, as well as the other State officers, appear to take no stock whatever in this contest, yet I doubt not, they will abide by the decision of the Supreme Court, and our brave old Governor will, as ever, be found "true to the core."

I found Col. DeGress at his post, but complaining that his old wounds have caused him acute sufferings. It is a good thing that he has only 77 schools to superintend now, that being the sum total brought forth by the monster engendered by the 13th. Verily the mountain has produced a mouse.

A DOUBLE murder was committed on Tuesday, December 2, about twenty miles east of Fredericksburg, on the road known as the "Miller Creek" road, from Austin to Fredericksburg. It appears that three men—Headspeth, Nell and Peter Deil—had been to Austin, and returned home on Monday, the first instant, P. Deil stopping about ten miles back, at James Johnson's ranch, until Tuesday afternoon. He started for home, and his body was found the same day about one-half mile from his house, he having been shot and robbed. It is supposed that he had several hundred dollars on his person. The other two, Headspeth and Nell, on the same morning, had taken their guns and said that they were going to the Perdido river to shoot ducks. Sometime during the day, Headspeth returned, and stated that he had killed Nell, but had to do it in self-defense. The two bodies were found within half a mile of each other. The suspicion is that Headspeth and Nell were joint perpetrators of the first murder, and probably quarrelled over the division, which resulted in the death of Nell. A horse was tracked to the body of Deil which was shot on only three feet, and Headspeth's horse had lost a shoe, hence the suspicion that he was implicated in the murder of Deil, together with the fact that he was one of the few who knew that Deil had a large sum of money with him. These facts are obtained from a gentleman just from that section of the State.—Statesman.

TELEGRAPHIC

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.
HAVANA, Dec. 17.—The proposed draft for military duty of all men between eighteen and forty-five years of age, a fourth of whom are to be conscripted for active service, is going on.

The Advocate Diario says we are now at the fifteenth of December, and have raised no muzzes and done nothing new to crush the rebellion. Let us give a fresh impulse to this winter campaign, if we would advance on the road to the pacification of the island. The enemy will gain time and territory, and we will have cause to deplore our criminal vacillation. Without great and "swift" movement on our part, the war will drag on as it has to the present hour. It has consumed annually from 10,000 to 15,000 soldiers and \$40,000,000. When we find ourselves fallen, never to rise again, we will bitterly regret our short sighted lack of preparation.

The Vox de Cuba says that Cuba shows a prolonged resistance, and that Carthage, is drawing the resources of Spain and weakening her power. Castelar is not strong enough now to oppose the pressure of foreign governments, which nearly all tend to the destruction of Cuba, and the longer his declining power is respected and obeyed in Cuba, the greater is the probability that the object of these foreign demands will be accomplished.

Several letters appeared in the evening journals addressed to the Captain General, calling on him to declare the island in a state of siege, and to enroll the citizens.

A steamer from Cadiz arrived to-day with 800 soldiers and 150 seamen on board.
HAVANA, Dec. 17.—The slavery question is now seriously discussed among the slave owners. According to telegrams from Spain, the government has determined to bring this question before the Cortes for action, but desires the slave owners to propose some plan making the abolition of slavery a certainty, but without seriously injuring the agricultural prosperity of the island.

Many slave owners are in favor of treating slaves like contracted-for Chinamen, but it is doubtful whether the Cortes would sanction such or any similar plan. The number of members of the Havana Abolition Society is increasing.

DOMESTIC NEWS.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—House.—Mr. Wilson of Indiana, from Judiciary Committee, reported a resolution authorizing that committee to send for persons and papers, in the inquiry as to the official conduct of Judge Busted of Alabama, and a resolution instructing that committee to inquire into and report, whether Judge Durrell of Louisiana should be impeached for high crimes and misdemeanors; with power to send for persons and papers. Adopted.

The special naval appropriation bill of \$4,000,000 was passed in the House to-day. Mr. Stephens said if he had been present yesterday he would have voted for the repeal of the bankrupt act and against the repeal of the salary bill.

Mr. Stephens presented the memorial of the Cuban meeting held in New York, requesting the recognition of Cuban liberty, which was referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs.

The bill for the redemption of the loan of 1868, with the Senate amendments thereto, was passed; also a bill to amend the laws in relation to the internal revenue, so as to allow distillery warehouses to continue business after a change of the managers thereof.

There was a long debate in the House on an amendment to the salary bill, striking out the words "during his present term of office," as applied to the exception made in regard to the President's salary.

Senate.—The proceedings this morning show little probability of the passage of the bankrupt repeal law before the holidays.

Senator Morton is speaking on the Finance. This chokes off the Louisiana question to-day.

In the Senate to-day, senator Ramsey, reporting a bill from the Committee on Indian Affairs, took occasion to severely criticize the administration of Indian affairs and pronounced its whole legislation a farce from beginning to end.

The bill increasing the number of enlisted men in the navy to 10,000 was reported; but Sherman, opposing the bill, it went over.

There was a long debate on the House bill to repeal the bankrupt law. Mr. Edmunds moved to refer it to the Judiciary Committee. He was satisfied of the impolicy of an absolute repeal of the bill, but thought the committee would be able to prepare a bill which would relieve the present law of its obnoxious features, and would at the same time protect the interest of the creditor and debtor.

Mr. Fenton made a long speech on Finance, arguing in favor of the immediate contraction of currency and the reduction of government expenses.

New York, Dec. 17.—The coal barge Upland, which was accidentally sunk in front of the dry dock at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, peopled the Spanish iron clad steamer Anapolles from going out, was surveyed to-day by divers, preparatory to commencing the work of raising her. The contractor for supplying the coal will have to bear the expense of raising the vessel, as she was sunk through carelessness.

In the General trial to-day, John Melville Davidson testified that he applied to Tweed in 1871 for a contract for supplying the iron work to the Harlem Court House, and was referred to Ganey, who directed him to make out a bill, and he did so. Never saw the bill afterwards; never got any money or supplied the goods.

Ex-Mayor Hall identified his signature to the warrants for the money.

There is great activity in all departments of the Brooklyn navy yard. An order was received from Washington, directing that every ship now preparing in the yard be finished within ten days.
