European Breadstuffs.
As the year wears nearer and nearer to its close, the statisticians of Europe are enabled to obtain more accurate statements of the breadstuffs supply for the year ending August 31st, 1874. It is now stated that the deficiency in the home crop is much greater than has hitherto been stated; that in no country of Europe was the wheat crop up to the average. In England, France and Sweden the deficiency will be greater than usual, and in those countries where a surplus has heretofore existed the crop is not much above the wants of the home population. Hitherto Algeria has sold largely to France and Spain, but now Algeria is bad off as any of them, her harvest being so light it is feared she too must buy bread. The Danubian principalities and Russia have proven immense granaries in the past, but the surplus they will have this year is said to be sadly diminished; and besides, England, the populations of Belgium, Holland, Switzerland and Austria must very largely feed from American granaries for the year to come. To what extent is it probable we can spare wheat to supply the demand? The spring wheat crop of 1873 was the largest ever produced in this country. The crop of 1872 was second to it. Of the crop of 1872—Michigan and Chicago received 29,000,000 bushels from September 1st, 1872, to August 31st, 1873. Suppose we accept the general estimate, fixing the gain this year at 30 per cent, over the crop of 1872, then the receipts of Chicago and Michigan would show a gain of something near 16,000,000 bushels. It is true that wheat is available for exportation from all the ports of this country, still it would be seen that we could spare very near supplying all the demand likely to be made upon us out of our actual surplus without the necessity for advancing prices much above their present range. The United Kingdom of Great Britain, Ireland, Scotland and Wales consumed somewhere near 75,000,000 bushels of wheat more than they produce; therefore, if they were compelled to buy all of their supply from us, we could spare it and have plenty of wheat left. Yet, beyond all question, there will be a good demand for spring wheat throughout the entire winter, and our dealers cannot do better than to make immediate arrangements for moving fast quantities of spring wheat from Iowa and Minnesota to St. Louis this winter and shipping it to Liverpool. The tendency of the market is upward; the river is full of water, and will be open all winter; and no better opportunity will ever occur than this of moving wheat from the Northwest to Europe via the great water route. We presume that the St. Louis, Kansas City and Northern road and the Illinois Central road will make special tariffs with any parties desiring to engage largely in bringing the spring wheat of the Northwest to St. Louis, or of passing it forward to Europe via the Mississippi and Gulf.

When we published the magnanimity portion of Mr. Cook's speech at Waco, we gave our reasons for doubting his ability of controlling the democratic press and the democratic masses. Since then, certain events have occurred, proving that our misgivings have not been amiss and that there is a lawless spirit uprising, instigated by the radical democratic press, the most vindictive of which is the official organ of the 13th Legislature, the Austin Statesman. From its utterings it appears that the democratic ring-leaders have made up their mind to ride rough shod over our constitution and laws, if allowed to do so, and to bully and frighten all, opposing their revolutionary measures, into submission. From facts ascertained it seems that the new registration and election laws have been adopted for the purpose of giving the widest range to illegal voting, and it would not be astonishing to us if the legal count should cypher up a greater sum of votes than there are legal voters in the State.

The census of 1870 fixes the number of male citizens from the age of 21 years and upwards at 169,258. Suppose the number has since increased to 180,000, which is a fair estimate, and suppose 20 per cent of the registered voters have kept away from the polls, which is another fair estimate, the count ought to show no more than 144,000 votes. But we venture to say that this amount will be exceeded at least ten thousand votes. So well prepared was the Democracy for the fight and so determined were its singleaders to carry the election.

It is now known that the constitutionality of the election law was discussed in the Committee rooms and objected to by such prominent Democrats as Senator Platt; but the younger and more careless blood prevailed and saw no danger in disregarding the provisions of the Constitution. They have run the risk and must now abide the consequences.

But instead of quietly awaiting the decision of our Supreme Court, they attempt to throw all blame on the shoulders of the Republicans; they threaten Republican papers and slander the Judges of the Supreme Court. They do not stop here even! They try to intimidate the Courts of the Country and encourage a lawless spirit. No democratic paper had as yet to say a word of reproach concerning the mob-proceedings of the two Justices of Harris County; no democratic paper, except the Mercury, has as yet dared to condemn the palpable election frauds in Houston! It is only a few days ago that the Statesman threatened the EXPRESS for publishing an opinion on the election law, and lately it has advised the Supreme Court that radical Judges can no longer set aside the will of the people. In its edition of Sunday last it goes even farther and styles our present Courts, political Courts, charging that the most of our judges have become completely subservient to party and dare not give honest, legal opinions, even if their inclination prompts them to do right, which is now seldom the case; and all this in the face of the fact that our Supreme Court has lately, in the Honey case, rendered judgments exactly to the hearts content of the Democracy and strictly against all reasonable expectation of the Republicans; and all this in anticipation of an unfavorable decision of an election law, which is now known to have been passed in intentional violation of the Constitution.

We have experienced the fruits of such teachings in 1860 and 1861, and if this mob spirit will not be
