RUBY AND PATTEN

In the weekly *Post* of Dec. 18th, a German paper published at Galveston, we find a very serious charge against Ruby and Patten, which we hope these gentlemen will be able to refute. The *Post* states as follows:

"In the colored church, on Church street, between the 14th and 15th street, a meeting of the colored people was held on the evening before election day for the purpose of ascertaining the true policy for the election day. One-half of those present were willing to support the nominees (of the Republican party,) the other half opposing; they declared that they were compelled to stay away from the polls, because Ruby and Patten had advised them to do so. Patten was present and by his silence endorsed the statement. By this double dealing of Ruby and Patten, Sabla and Ogle have been beaten. At the same time it has come to light that the Clark Republicans have not yet abandoned their game. Ruby, caring as much for the Republican party as for his own race, but exclusively for himself will evidently by his obligingness to Grand cousin secure to himself the presidential favor in the distribution of federal offices. Patten's motives cannot yet be accounted for. But we are forced to the conclusion that for purposes concerning the next national election an offer is to be made, by order from Washington to the southern Democracy and that Clark and Patten are selected to organize the colored men and to lead them at the command given over into the democratic camp."

As far as Patten's treachery is concerned, there is nothing to be wondered at. This responsibility rests on those Republicans who hold the evidence in their hands, that Patten together with Clark has defrauded the federal treasury by means of contracts obtained from the government, and who in spite of this evidence have at Dallas and later in the 12th District intrusted into his hands the management of the last campaign. As Patten has become a traitor to his friend Clark, he ought not to have been offered the opportunity of betraying the Republican party.

These are grave charges, gentlemen, and we are not inclined to believe them; being satisfied that the allusion to the Washington policy concerning the leading over of the colored people into the democratic camp, is entirely groundless and illusory. We sincerely wish Messrs. Ruby and Patten will be able to satisfactorily explain the facts stated in the above article.

A CHILLY JUDGE.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Dec. 24, 1873.

Editor Express:
I would have written before, had I not
hoped to report some distressing proceed
ings in the Rodriguez habeas corpus case.
The Court having adjourned to-day
without doing anything whatever, I have
ever, deem it my duty to give some signs
of life.
Taking "the thing" as a whole, there
can be no doubt, that, after having ac
knowledged a "lost case" the "Cokey"
lawyers, are trying their best to save off
the "head" by clinging to the wheels of Jus
tice as much as they can, and, unfor
tunately, they bid fair to succeed.
After having unsuccessfully attempted
to represent the case as "botched," pro
posed as "State Attorneys" to postpone it,
and to "release the prisoner," their argu
ment yesterday "capped the climax" when
Judge McAdoo even had to tell them that
the "frankification" was novel, and Gov.
Hamilton that they had better "change
sides." "Anything to beat Grant" and
"anything to save off that case" are their
mottos. As "State Attorneys" they are
emphatically "lucra non lucendo." To
morrow the question whether they will
be allowed to introduce testimony must
be decided. If they are I tremble for the
result, as the second Tuesday in January
will, in that case, bring us a new Legisla
ture, a new Governor, and a partisan Na
tional Court. It is a serious thing to see
the State Attorney laboring to free a pri
soner, accused of a criminal offense, and
doubtfully curious to see him attempt to
evade the plea of the prisoner, urging his
release under a specific allegation of "no
cause of action." But, I suppose, you
have heard enough of this.

A business except as regards "Christmas

I sent you a prospectus of the new
"Dental College" established at Austin,
and hope you will recommend it in your
columns. Dr. Cole, one of the professors,
handed it to me, and he is certainly a man
of high standing in scientific circles. He
ought to be able to support a "Dental
College," even under Democratic rule.

"Uncle Groves" has been here and had a
"serenade" upon his arrival. Whether the
"performers" were expecting births in the
"Land Office," I certainly am not in a po
sition to know, but I do know, that a cer
tain gentleman was appointed to a promi
nent position in that office, a few days
ago by the Democratic Committee.
To the pure, everything is pure. Judge
Cosley of Fredericksburg, well known in
San Antonio, is stopping at Austin at this
moment, and says, he is, as ever, "Repub
lican to the core," but don't believe in
Gov. Davis, and is in favor of Bell and the
constitutionality of the election. I con
sider him, notwithstanding his acknowl
edged legal capacity, as somewhat of an
anomaly.

I suppose this will be my last from this
place, as I propose starting for Fredericks
burg (which I mean to visit before my
starting on my "tour") on Friday morning
—whence I mean to write a few lines.
Our old friend Col. W. D. Carey has
been appointed Postmaster at Gonzales
and just furnished his bond.

DOMESTIC NEWS.
AUSTIN, Dec. 24.—The *ex parte* Rodriguez
case was up again to-day. Judge McAdoo
filed a motion to dismiss the case, not
withstanding the return made. In other
words, it is a motion to bring up the con
stitutional question, on the ground that
the warrant recites no offense known to
the law. This motion, if granted, would
prevent the investigation of the facts. On
account of the indisposition of Judge
Walker, the case was adjourned until 10
a. m. Friday.

A destructive fire occurred at the Favari
ite (Frooman's) Saloon, at five o'clock this
evening. It originated from an accident to
a kerosene lamp which was being filled.
The entire building was burnt, and Potom
ky's tobacco store next, and also the
ten-pin alley adjoining it.
The Favorite Saloon building belonged
to J. D. Berrin. Another building per
taining to Berrin, the Favorite, was a
brick structure, the two others being
frame buildings. A strong north-west
wind was blowing. Total loss from \$25,
000 to \$30,000.

FOREIGN NEWS.
MADRID, Dec. 23.—Advised from Cuban
sources relative to the military movements
of the Cuban army, state that in an at
tack on Manzanillo, on Nov. 26th, the in
surgents captured twenty-six rifles, eight
thousand cartridges, a quantity of gold
and Spanish bank notes, cloth, provisions,
etc., besides destroying one million dol
lars worth of property and capturing one
hundred prisoners, who were paroled.
The losses of the Spaniards were esti
mated at over 300, while the Cuban loss
was 13 officers and 60 privates killed and
wounded. On November 25 the Cuban ar
my went into camp at Sanja, having far
ther captured 15,000 cartridges, 70 rifles
and a number of horses. The Cuban agents
state that orders have been received that
no more rifles are needed by the Cuban
forces, as they have captured more than
sufficient to arm all the force they can at
present put in the field.

The city of Geneva is decidedly in luck. It is but a few months ago since it fell heir to the princely legacy of the crazy Duke of Brunswick, and now one of its citizens, Mr. P. P. Boucher, has left the bulk of his large fortune, bringing in an annual revenue of some \$10,000, to the city, to be used for furnishing free lectures and instruction to the poorer classes and laborers. He has left \$1,000 to the Geneva Public Library, \$20,000 to the Protestant National Church, \$2,000 to the City College, and \$2,000 to the Public Hospital.

In Belgium they have founded an odd society for the collection of waste paper, which is to be sold for the benefit of the Pope. In its prospectus the society requests all owners of "bad and worthless works," like those of Voltaire, Rousseau, Diderot, Volney, &c., to send them to the Secretary of the society, so that they may be used for this waste paper collection, and sold as such.

The new census of the German Empire has just been finished. It gives Germany a population of 41,656,542. The latest census for Austria-Hungary totals up 35,000,000; for France, 36,100,000; for England, 31,000,000; for Italy, 6,700,000; for Spain, 15,000,000; for Turkey and Servia, 16,000,000; for Sweden and Norway, 5,500,000. Russia is at the head of all, with a grand total of 71,200,000 inhabitants.
