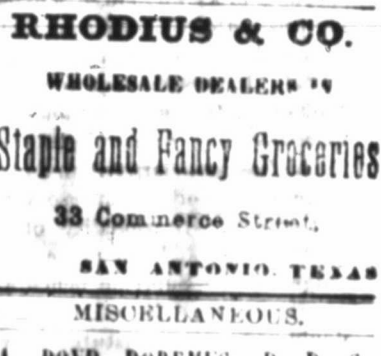

LOCAL AFFAIRS.

ANOTHER fire occurred in Austin, doing but little damage.

MR. TRACY of Houston, has contested the election of Wm. R. Baker.

A WHITE man hanging to a tree has been found near Austin. No particulars are given.

HARDIN HALE, District Judge at Denison, refuses to sign the bonds of the newly elected officials in his district.

HON. B. C. FRANKLIN, Senator elect from the Galveston District, died on Dec. 25th, 1873. The immediate cause of his death was congestion of the liver and stomach.

On Sunday last and yesterday the weather, although a little fresh, was delightful. The coldest night of the season was that from Saturday last to Sunday, and it is reported that in some parts of the county standing water was covered with a crust of ice. There has been no frost yet in San Antonio.

We learn from Chief Justice Klocke, that Mr. Radloff gave the full number of votes cast for the two candidates, stating that so and so much therefrom had been cast for the Republican candidate leaving it, as he undoubtedly thought proper, for the counting officer to make out the amount of the votes cast for the best candidate. Mr. Radloff is by no means a radical. In 1872 he worked hard for the Democratic ticket, and in the last election was beaten by the Radicals as a candidate for Justice of the Peace. These facts may satisfy the Austin Statesman, that Mr. Radloff had no intention whatever to assist in the election of the Radical candidate for the Legislature.
