INDIVIDUALS, but principles
 live forever. A party may bury a
 host of leaders, yet if it adheres to
 principle its strength remains un-
 impaired. The principles of justice
 underlie the Republican party. They
 forced it into being; they sustained
 it through unequal conflict; they
 upheld it in the face of supreme
 trial. The people endorsed it be-
 cause it proclaimed freedom as the
 birthright of man, and because they
 saw in it the only power that could
 overthrow the despotism of human
 slavery and the corrupt party that
 stood between it and outraged lib-
 erty. If accomplished what it set
 out to do, the institution of slavery
 is no more. The chattels of yester-
 day have been transformed into the
 freemen of today. The Democratic
 party exists only in the traditions
 of the past. A new era has dawned
 upon American civilization. This
 glorious work has been the work of
 the people. They have recognized
 and followed leaders as long as
 those leaders showed devotion to
 the principles of the party. They
 abandoned them when they found
 them untrue; the trust confided in
 them. The leaders of the past are
 not the leaders of the present. A
 few have survived the temptations
 and trials of years, but the many
 have either fallen in honorable ser-
 vice or been left behind because
 they were found unworthy to lead
 the advance with the party lives,
 because its principles are as pure
 and strong as ever. That had men
 have been into its ranks and worn
 its honors cannot be denied; but
 when discovered they have been
 driven from power as unworthy of
 trust. We have an abiding faith in
 the Republican party. As long as
 the people of the nation endorse the
 principles of justice, the party will
 live and exert a controlling influ-
 ence on national affairs.

AT the Jardin d'Acclimation, in

 never having heard of Darwin, but
 having an old proverb, that when
 the mule shall produce young, men
 will become women and women
 men, undertook the dangerous in-
 vestigation. But the authorities inter-
 fered, and the birth of the foal was
 officially recorded. This young da-
 ward of Darwinism is about six months
 old, healthy, well formed, and a
 female. Now, we have only to wait
 and see if this phenomenon itself
 will be fertile; if so, we have a new
 species among animals. Nothing
 of the kind has ever been known
 before, and it is expected that the
 young creature will be cared for
 with extraordinary distinction. Dar-
 winism is modifying all modern
 methods of thought and investiga-
 tion, and gaining ground in the
 conviction of the best thinkers. But
 it is not logic alone that will settle
 the matter. The question is, is just
 such little eccentricities as we have
 recorded that will furnish the evi-
 dence to convince. We are not
 sure but that the French Academy
 should pass for the enterprising
 mule a vote of thanks, and then let
 the order of the Bath be conferred
 on the "What is it?"
