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TO DAY! The Republican Party expects every man should "DO HIS DUTY." "A LAST APPEAL"

To day the immediate future of Texas is to be decided. Have we not suffered enough from Democratic misrule? Have we not seen our frontier ravaged, our citizens murdered, in consequence of the INTENTIONAL failure of a DEMOCRATIC Legislature to reform its most solemn pledges?

Coke's Army of lobbying, speculation, thieving, Railroad monopolists?

Have we not seen all this to be the work of a "Democratic-Reform" Legislature, and do we not know what to expect, and do we not know what we deserve in the event of a repetition of such sorry experiments? Many of the Candidates, who now ask for our suffrages, upon the Democratic, Independent or Liberal Republican ticket, may be most worthy men, men whom we would support with pleasure under any other circumstances, but—the child once burned, fears the fire—we know from bitter experience, that whatever they may say to the contrary notwithstanding, they are bound to follow the road prescribed for them by their infamous party—and that road—does not precisely lead to a prosperous future for our State.

Therefore, and therefore alone, we must "stand fast" and not allow ourselves to be carried away, by either personal friendship, or personal prejudice. Principia non homines must be our motto. We cannot afford to condescend, at the ballot box, to the very men whom we may consider ourselves honored to shake by the hand as a genial, warm-hearted, worthy and honest gentleman. It seems hard to say so—but "business before pleasure"—we can not help it. We must not leave the Democracy a single peg to stand upon, if we would do our whole duty by our country and our countrymen.

The Democratic Party is, and has been for years, DEAD as a National Party—Thurman to the contrary notwithstanding—no good can come from supporting it itself, or any of its votaries. Whenever it has succeeded to worm itself into local power, it has always most emphatically "put its foot in it" (vide the 13th). Its "time honored principles" (so called) have been the laughing stock of the civilized world, it has not had, since the year 1860, a single living issue to stand upon; wherever it could get its foot into the stirrup, it has committed foul wrong upon the laboring man—the working classes—and we dare them to deny it. Remember the words of Secretary Newcomb on the Landlord and Tenant Bill. Remember their patent Jury bill.

While they deprive the poor of their public schools they authorize contemptuous challenges of all who cannot read and write. We dare them to deny it. The proofs are on record. That party is as dead as a door nail—and the people of Texas, so often accused of being asleep ten years behind the times ought, at last—by their votes, to recognize and acknowledge the fact, that the best doctors in the world are unable to resurrect the festering carcass, and that any attempt to do so should be promptly and sternly dis- countenanced, as prejudicial to the best interests of a free people. If Texas means to do so, by her VOTE she must accomplish it TO- DAY.

Let them try to persuade us upon the stamp that the Republican party is responsible for the misgovernment of the other Southern States. In Col. Dashiell's words we "repel the charge and own the lie upon their throats." The ruin of Louisiana—and the damaged condition of other Southern States is directly chargeable to the Democratic Party and their in- sane howlings are but the old saw- ing of the thief's saying "stop- thief." We strangle the Democratic Party of these States by being gail-

ty of perjury, duplicity, and the blackest fraud. For, dear friends, we've been there before. If, in Louisiana, for instance, the Democratic Leaders had kept their pledged faith with the Grant Repub- licans, much of the mischief com- mitted by the infamous horde of ravenous Greeleyite grasshoppers would have been prevented, and that state have a fairer prospect for a prosperous future.— In their own words "A compromise with infamy is infa- my itself."

That eager for office and spoil they did make that compromise they cannot deny, and "Out of their own mouths they are condemned." The outlook is bright, this time, brighter than ever before.
