Hydrophobia and Pet Dogs.

[From the New York Express.]

Thirty years ago a room-mate of the writer died of this disease. He was renowned maker of rifles. His weakness was the dog; he would pick up fancy canines without masters—had ten to twenty ownerless animals in his kennel. In sportive moments, we said: "Brunker, you will yet die of dogs—mad dogs!" He laughed. One Sunday afternoon, in his rambles, he picked up a stray little "King Charles spaniel," in Lockport, New York. The dog bit him in the wrist; he threw him down in disgust, and thought no more of the incident. After the lapse of six weeks, he complained that the right wrist failed him. Soon after he had repugnance to water, but could drink cider. Next day he could not drink cider, but craved vinegar. On Sunday evening he came to the hotel and said to the waiter: "I am going mad!" The waiter, laughing, said to him: "Brunker, I will give you a glass of water; take it—drink it." And when he placed the glass of water in his hand an involuntary spasm came over him, and the contents went into the fire. Then I knew he was mad, and became very nervous, and called upon others to assist to take care of this man. While the writer was absent he went to his room and tore the bed clothes in all shapes. A window was above the door. Stepping upon the shoulders of an assistant, and opening the window, we shouted to Brunker: "Here I am; what is the matter with you?" Meantime the door was held firmly at the outside. Soon Brunker regained his composure, and told us to enter the room, as the fit was off and all danger over. Stalwart men beside us wavered; but we entered. We went to a drawer and took a sash or face muffler, and pinioned his arms with it, as he requested. Soon another and another spasm succeeded. He said the involuntary muscles had become involuntary; and if he did injury he could not avoid it. This lasted twenty-four hours, during which poor Brunker had lucid intervals and knew his forlorn condition; but the rational moments, between spasms, became less and less till he died.

This was the most developed case of hydrophobia the writer ever witnessed. Since then he has two dogs mad, but chained. Pouring water from one dish into another to witness the effects, in all respects they exhibited the same repugnance to water as did friend Brunker—a shudder followed by a spasm! Yet it is now asserted that this rabies in dogs creates no antipathy to water. And this is so asserted in London journals. It may be so, but experience is to the contrary.

It seems now to be conceded that, while men in this disease abhor water, dogs with hydrophobia court it and drink it. The two dogs the writer saw in the midst of their madness would rave when water was poured from one dish into another. Ought not science to settle this mooted point?

What Might Have Been.

The Pope had his Joke about a Dead Cardinal.

[Rome Correspondence N. Y. Times.]

By the death of Cardinal Tarquini, the past week, one of the dozen porporati created at the last consistory, the present Pope has lived to bury more than 100 members of the Sacred College, who have died since he entered upon his reign. Cardinal Barnabo, created 15 years of age, and now 73 years old, is ill of the gout, and is not expected to hold out much longer. This Cardinal is now entirely blind. Cardinal Antonelli, who has also suffered with the gout, is now much better, but begins to feel the weight of years, as he has nearly reached the age of 70. The Papal Senate is a circle of old gentlemen, as about half have passed the age of 65 years. The Cardinal De Angelis is of the same age as the Pope, and holds the title of Archbishop of Fermo, in which town he passes the greater part of the year. Pius IX is as much disposed to joke as was President Lincoln, and a story is told of one of his utterances of good humor the past week:

"The death of Cardinal Tarquini so soon after he was created," said the Pope, "is a proof that the Romans will have nothing more to do with the Tarquins; and here is Cardinal De Angelis, who is most of the time in Fermo (*inferno*) and holds out to the last." The Cardinals standing by, as they were bound to do, laughed at the Pope's lively humor, which he will frequently indulge, no matter who is hit. Pius IX is in good health, and on the 13th of the coming May he will have completed his 65th year, for he was born in 1792. His long reign as Pontiff is frequently spoken of as something remarkable, and by some is accounted nothing less than as a sign of the special providence of God. But if the Pope lives 10 years longer, we shall find nothing in the fact except what is perfectly in the order of nature. If most of the other members of the Mastal-Farretti family live to the age of 90, there is no reason why this brother Giovanni, with his regular mode of living, should not have allotted to him an equal number of years.

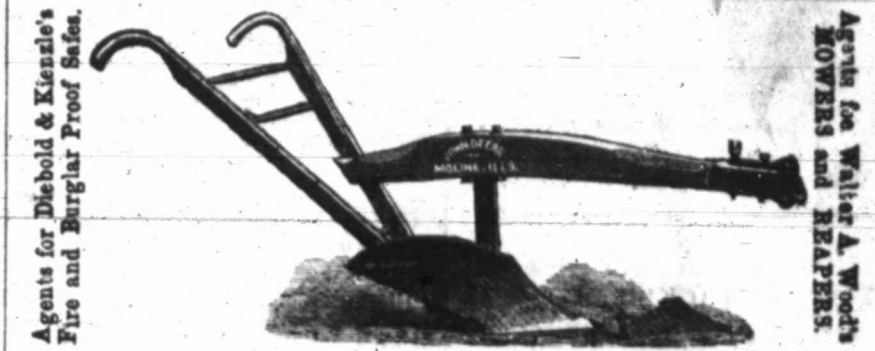

| Peddlers of tobacco, third class (one horse) | 15.00 |
| Peddlers of tobacco, fourth class (on foot or public conveyance) | 10.00 |
| Brewers of less than 500 barrels | 50.00 |
| Brewers of 500 barrels or more | 100.00 |

Any person, so liable, who shall fail to comply with the foregoing requirements will be subject to severe penalties.

Persons or firms liable to pay any of the Special Taxes named above must apply to Henry M. Taylor, Collector of Internal Revenue at Austin, Texas, and pay for and procure the Special Tax Stamp or Stamps they need, prior to May 1, 1874, and WITH-OUT FURTHER NOTICE.
