[Charles Nordhoff, in Harpers' Monthly] The sea lions, which congregate by thousands upon the cliffs, and bark and howl and shrick and roar in the caves and upon the steep sunny slopes, are but little dis turbed, and one can usually approach them within twenty or thirty yards. The Mail Robbery.

The Austin Statesman gives us the following particulars of the robbery of the Austin mail.

On Tuesday evening, a most dar ing and outrageous robbery was committed on the passengers of the stage coming from San Antonio to this place, and on the United States mail. About sunset in the evening, when the stage was nearly two miles on this side the Blauco, three men approached and drawing their six-shooters on the driver, Bill Anderson, well known in this city, or dered him to stop, which he immedistely did. The stage had on board nine passengers, viz.: Messrs, Me Lemore, O'Neal, Waters, Brackenridge, Frazier, McDouald, Nette, Munroe, and one lady, Mr. Lloyd As soon as the stage stopped, all of the passengers were ordered to alight and sent themselves in a row; as none of them had any arms, resistance was useless, and they obeyed. After senting them selves, two of the robbers stood bein each hand cocked, and ordered them to give up their money, watch es and other valuables.

After having collected all they could from the persons of the pas sengers, they proceeded to cut open and rifle their trunks, taking such articles of value as they could get away with speedily; and lastly came the United States mails; after entting open the sacks and rifling them of their contents, they left them lying scattered around, with the exception of one, which they took away with them. After this they proceeded to cut the borses loose from the stage, and rode off, leaving the bewildered and fright tened to proceed on their journey as best they could. The driver returned to the nearest stand, about three miles back, (Joseph Vance's) and getting fresh horses proceeded on his way to this city, where he arrived about daylight Wednesday morning. No violence was offered to any of the passengers, and they all conceded that the robbers went to work like men who knew their
