Big Trees—The Yosemite
The Yosemite
The Briabane (Australia) Courier
of Dec. 30, 1873, publishes the fol-
lowing official telegram from Mr.
Walker Hill, the government botanist,
dated from Cardwell on the 27th,
and received by the Queensland
Land Secretary for Lands: "Since
the 20th of November we have ex-
amined the banks of the Mulgrave,
Russell, Mossman, Daintree and
Hull Rivers, and have been more or
less successful in finding suitable
land for sugar and other tropical
and semi-tropical productions. The
ascend of the summit of Belleuden
Kerr was successfully made by
Johnstone Hill, and eight troopers.
At 2,500 feet in height we observed
an undecomposed tree with eriu-
sion flowers, which exceeds the Poi-
ciana regia, Colvilia racemosa, Lager-
stronia regia, and the Jacaranda
mimosifolia. At 4,400 feet a tree
fern, which will excel in grandeur
all others of the Aliborensis class. A
palm tree at the same height which
will rival any of the British India
species in gracefulness. On the
banks of the Daintree we saw a
palm tree, which far exceeds the
unique specimen in the garden
of the same genus from Brazil in
grandeur and gracefulness. While
cutting a given line on the banks of
the River Johnstone, for the pur-
pose of examining the land, an
enormous tree stood in the way,
far exceeding in stoutness and
grandeur the renowned forest gi-
ants of California and Victoria.
Three feet from the ground it mea-
sured 150 feet in circumference; at
fifty feet, where it sent forth giant
branches, the stem was nearly
eighty feet in circumference.

By the Treaty between Queen
Victoria and the Emperor of Russia,
for the marriage of Prince Alfred
and the Grand Duchess Marie, it is
stipulated that the bride shall be
free to follow the worship of the
Greek Church, and to have chapels
for that worship in her palaces.
She will, however, accompany her
husband to Protestant churches, to
assist at ceremonies of a public na-
ture. Their children are to be
brought up as Protestants, and
educated in the same manner and
in the same rank in Great Britain.
The Emperor of Russia gives his
daughter a capital sum of 1,000,000
roubles (about \$750,000) for a mar-
riage portion; and another sum of
the same amount as a special mar-
riage portion. Both of these sums
remain invested in Russia, at five
per cent interest payable semi-
annually. In addition, as a mark of
affection, the Emperor gives the
Duchess an annual revenue of
75,000 roubles. She retains pos-
session of her own private fortune,
amounting to \$450,000.

CONVENTION
BETWEEN
THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA
AND THE REPUBLIC OF SALVADOR.
EXTENDING THE PERIOD FOR EXCHANGING
THE RATIFICATIONS OF THE TREATY OF
MAY 22, 1870.
Concluded May 17, 1873.
Ratification advised by Senate March 2,
1874.
Ratified by President March 10, 1874.
Ratified by President of Salvador Octo-
ber 28, 1873.
Ratifications exchanged at Washington
March 11, 1874.

A PROCLAMATION.
Whereas a convention between the
United States of America and the Republic
of Salvador, stipulating for and extension
of the period for exchanging the ratifi-
cations of the general treaty of com-
merce and consular privileges between
the two countries, signed on the sixth day
of December, 1870, was concluded and
signed by their respective plenipoten-
tiaries at San Salvador, on the twelfth day
of May last, the original of which con-
vention being in the English and Spanish
languages, it is word for word as follows:
The United States of America and the
Republic of Salvador, desiring to extend
the time fixed for the exchange of the
ratifications of the treaty between the
United States and that Republic of am-
commerce, and consular privileges, sig-
ned at San Salvador on the sixth day of
December, A. D. 1870, have resolved to
convene a convention for that purpose
invested with full powers, the Presi-
dent of the United States, Thomas
Minister Resident of the United
Salvador, the President of the

Salvador, Señor Doctor Don Darío Guzmán,
the Minister of the Interior and Public
Instruction, who after reciprocal com-
munication of their said full powers, found
in good and due form have agreed upon
the following articles, to wit:
ARTICLE I.
The time fixed for the exchange of the
ratifications of the aforesaid treaty be-
tween the United States and the Republic
of Salvador, of amity, commerce, and con-
sular privileges, signed at San Salvador
on the sixth day of December, A. D. 1870,
is hereby extended to a period not ex-
ceeding twelve (12) months from the
date of this convention, or sooner if pos-
sible.
ARTICLE II.
The present convention to receive the
ratification of the President of the United
States, by and with the advice and consent
of the Senate thereof, and by the President
of the Republic of Salvador, with the ap-
proval of the Congress of the same, and
ratifications to be exchanged within con-
venient time to facilitate the aforesaid ex-
change.
In witness whereof the respective plenipoten-
tiaries have signed the present con-
vention in duplicate, and have thereunto
affixed their seals.
Done at San Salvador the 12th day of
May, A. D. one thousand eight hundred
and seventy three, and of the United
States the nineteenth day of March, A. D.
1874.

And whereas the said convention has
been duly ratified on both parts, and the
respective ratifications were exchanged in
this city on the eleventh instant:
Now, therefore, be it known that I, THOMAS
S. GRANT, President of the United
States of America, have caused the said
convention to be made public, so that all
that the same, and every clause and ar-
ticle thereof, may be observed and fulfilled
with good faith by the United States and
citizens thereof.
In witness whereof I have hereunto set
my hand and caused the seal of the United
States to be affixed.
Done at the city of Washington this
thirteenth day of March, in the
year of our Lord one thousand
eight hundred and seventy-four,
and of the Independence of the
United States of America the
ninety-eighth.

 Peddlers of tobacco, second class (two horses)... 25.00
 Peddlers of tobacco, third class (one horse)... 15.00
 Peddlers of tobacco, fourth class (on foot or public conveyance)... 10.00
 Brewers of less than 500 barrels... 50.00
 Brewers of 500 barrels or more... 100.00
