LAW

OF THE UNITED STATES, PASSED AT THE FIRST SESSION OF THE THIRTY-THIRD CONGRESS.

CONVENTION BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND THE REPUBLIC OF SALVADOR.

[Concluded.]

ARTICLE 5TH.

In no case and for no motive shall the high contracting parties be obliged to deliver up their own subjects. If, in conformity with the laws in force in the state to which the accused belongs, he ought to be submitted to criminal procedure for crimes committed in the other state, the latter must communicate the information and documents, send the implements or tools which were employed to perpetrate the crime, and procure every other explanation or evidence necessary to prosecute the case.

ARTICLE 6TH.

Requisitions for the surrender of fugitives from justice shall be made by the respective diplomatic agents of the con-

tracting parties, or in the event of the absence of these, on the part, or its superior consular officers. If the person whose extradition may be asked for shall have been convicted of a crime, a copy of the sentence of the court in which he may have been convicted, authenticated under its seal, and an attestation of the official character of the judge by the proper executive authority, and of the latter by the minister or consul of the United States or of Salvador, respectively, shall accompany the requisition. When, however, the fugitive shall have been merely charged with crime, a duly-authenticated copy of the warrant for his arrest in the country where the crime may be committed, or the depositions upon which such warrant may have been issued, must accompany the requisition aforesaid. The President of the United States or the President of Salvador may then issue a warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive, in order that he may be brought before the proper judicial authority for examination. If it should then be decided that according to law and the evidence, the extradition is due, pursuant to the treaty, the fugitive may be given up according to the forms prescribed in such cases.

ARTICLE 7TH.

The expenses of the arrest, detention, and transportation of the persons claimed shall be paid by the government in whose name the requisition shall have been made.

ARTICLE 8TH.

This convention shall continue in force during ten (10) years from the day of exchange of ratifications; but of neither party shall have given to the other six (6) months' previous notice of its intention to terminate the same, the convention shall remain in force ten years longer, and so on.

The present convention shall be ratified and the ratifications exchanged at the city of Washington within twelve (12) months, and sooner if possible.

In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the present convention in duplicate, and have thereunto affixed their seals.

Done at the city of San Salvador the twenty-third day of May, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and of the United States the ninety-fourth.

And whereas the said convention has been duly ratified on both parts, and the respective ratifications were exchanged in this city on the second day of March, 1874: Now, therefore, be it known that I, ULYSSES S. GRANT, President of the United States of America, have caused the said convention to be made public, to the end that the same, and every clause and article thereof, may be observed and fulfilled with good faith by the United States and citizens thereof.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington this fourth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and of the Independence of the United States of America the ninety-eighth.

An interesting balloon ascension has
recently been made in France. M. Croce
Spinelli and M. Sivel embarked on the
balloon Polar Star from La Villette at 11
minutes past 11 on March 29th, in the
presence of a large gathering of scientific
men. The aeronauts took with them in
struments constructed specially for the
purpose of making observations at a great
altitude. The descent of the balloon took
place at 6 o'clock in the evening of the
same day at Bar sur seine. The altitude
of 7,400 meters was attained, which has
never been equaled save by Gay Lussac in
France and Glaisher in England. At that
point the thermometer was 22 deg. above
zero and owing to the extreme rarefaction
of the air the aeronauts would not have
been able to breathe if they had not car-
ried some oxygen with them in bags.
