**Romantic History of the Lady that Gen. Schenck is said to be Engaged to Marry.**

[Correspondence of the New York Sun.]  
WASHINGTON, April 16.  
It has been rumored for some time that Gen. Schenck was engaged to be married, but now it is formally announced who the lady is that is to be his bride. Your readers will doubtless remember the brilliant and handsome Mrs. Hicks, whose appearance in New York society in the winter of 1872 created such a furor; the lady whose elegant receptions in her palatial residence, 10 West Fourteenth street, drew the elite of New York together so frequently during that winter of gayety and business prosperity; the charming and wealthy widow whom the gossips declared had announced her resolution never, never to marry again. But the papers have contradicted the gossip, and they say positively that Gen. Schenck is to be the happy man.  
The history of the bride elect is romantic. By birth she is a South American. Her parents, North Americans and Northerners, were living in Brazil when she was born. Her name is Annetta, but her lineage is English, Spanish. She married an elderly, very wealthy man, but lived in retirement until after his death. Then her New York real estate increased in value, and she became immensely rich. She went to Europe, visited Rome, and became a devoted Roman Catholic, giving largely to the church. On her return to America she became a queen of society, traveled, visiting many persons of distinction, and was at one time the guest of Madame Le Vert in Mobile, Ala., in the prosperous days of that social celebrity. Mrs. Hicks is still young enough to be called "the admiration of men and the envy of women," but she has grown tired of freedom, and has determined to wear the pleasant chains of matrimony again.

The Arkansas trouble has culminated in a bloody collision. Baxter's intemperate harangue induced some of his cowardly crew to fire upon Col. Rose, who is in command of the United States forces, and who has been acting as a peace officer throughout the controversy. President Grant has given both parties to understand that they must abide the judgment of the courts, and that neither side should use force against the other. Col. Rose's command, two companies, is small when compared with the number of militia enrolled under Brooks and Baxter; but it is well understood that this little band of boys in blue represent the strength and authority of the nation, and that a blow struck at that force is an assault upon the national authority, and an insult to the national flag. Mr. Baxter's ragamuffins, who fired upon Col. Rose while he was simply looking on at the meeting which Baxter and White had been addressing, have deprived their leader of whatever sympathy well meaning citizens may have had for his cause prior to this act of violence. It was a cowardly act. Col. Rose was alone. His two companies of infantry were not with him. He was making no belligerent demonstration. He was simply obeying orders from Washington to keep the peace, and not to initiate violence. "Hands off, gentlemen, and settle this controversy in courts, without bloodshed," was the only word he had to say to either party. We may now expect something vigorous and decisive from Washington. If Baxter's men are composed of a lot of riff-raff who are subject to no discipline, and who can be induced by violent harangues, to fire at random into a crowd of citizens, killing friends and foes alike, they should be compelled to lay down their arms. They are a big mob, and nothing more, and the President should read the riot act to them without delay.—St. Louis Democrat.

Dr. Adler is a graduate of Columbia College, and of the University of Heidelberg, which conferred upon him his doctor's degree.

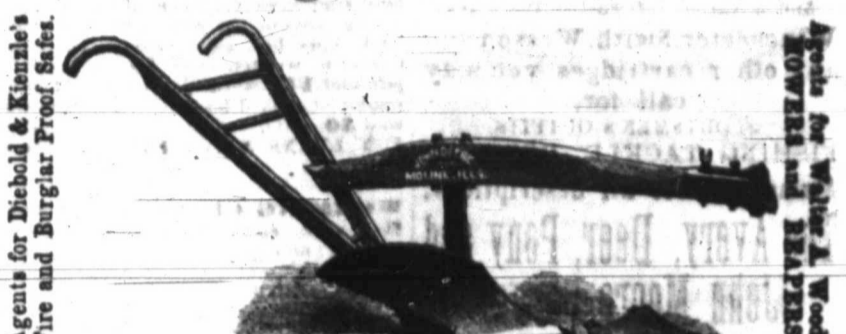
