COLONEL ROSE'S REPORT.

LIEUTENANT CUSHMAN ORDERED
TO REPORT THE SKIRMISH FROM
MEMPHIS—NO FIRING BY THE
REGULARS.

MEMPHIS, TENNESSEE, }
April 22, 1874. }

Lieutenant Cushman, of the Six-
teenth Infantry, stationed at Little
Rock, arrived here this afternoon
to communicate with the President
concerning the firing on Colonel
Rose last night, which he says he
could not do there in consequence
of the violent partisan feeling in
the telegraph office. According to
his statement, Colonel Rose had
secured an armistice between the
rival factions, which was to con-
tinue until nine o'clock this morn-
ing, but that last night Colonel
King White, with a regiment of
armed negroes, marched down to
the Anthony House, where he made
a violent and inflammatory speech
to them, calling upon Baxter to al-
low him to go ahead and clear out
Brooks, the federal or any other
d—d troops. Colonel Rose, hearing
the disturbance, mounted a spirited
horse and rode down to inform
White that he was not complying
with the terms of the truce in
marching his men to that point.
Colonel Rose was unarmed except
with a sword, and was accompanied
by an orderly armed with two hol-
ster pistols.

On reaching White Colonel Rose
asked him what he meant by break-
ing the truce, and ordered him to
disperse his men. White made some
reply not heard and fired his pistol
at Colonel Rose and shouted to his
men to fire, which they did, gener-
ally into the air, but several persons
were wounded. As already report-
ed Colonel Rose's orderly attempted
to draw his pistol, but his horse be-
came unmanageable and ran away
with him before he could draw it
from the holster. As soon as firing
commenced Colonel Rose rode back
to the engine house, where Com-
pany C, Sixteenth Infantry, was
stationed, and ordered the men to
run out a hook and ladder truck
and form a barricade, which was
speedily done, and the men placed
behind it. During the excitement a
private accidentally fired off his
gun, and the cry was raised, "The
regulars are going to shoot," and in
less than ten minutes the street was
deserted.

Lieutenant Cushman states posi-
tively that, with the exception
above stated, not a single shot was
fired by the United States troops or
by Brooks' garrison in the barri-
cades.

He states that many ludicrous
scenes occurred during the night.
Among others the Methodist preach-
er was standing in front of the An-
thony House when the firing began,
and jumping through a show win-
dow, he cut his head and bellowed,
"I'm shot! I'm shot!" and it was
with difficulty that he was con-
vinced that such was not the fact.

Lieutenant Cushman says that
Baxter has nearly 3,000 men under
arms, of whom some 800 or 900 are
from Pope, Johnson and Saline
counties. A number of these were
either in the Confederate or federal
army during the late war, and are
armed with superior weapons. They
can be relied on in a fight, and the
feeling towards the Brooks faction
among this class is very bitter and
daily growing worse. As a general
thing, Baxters forces are poorly
offered. On the other side, Brooks
has some 600 men behind the barri-
cades at the State House, of whom
two-thirds are negroes. They are
well commanded, and have two an-
cient 6-pounders in position. Bax-
ter's men are engaged in resurrect-
ing a 20-pounder siege piece, left
there during the late war.

Colonel Rose, with his handful of
soldiers, is master of the situa-
tion, but affairs are daily growing
uglier.

A GERMAN lady of Cincinnati
writes to the papers of that City
what she saw when reviewing the
temperance crusaders. She says:

"On last Friday afternoon, about
4 o'clock, I went to the place of Mr.
Henry Fasse, on McMillan street,
for the purpose of seeing the tem-
perance women, who, as I had been
informed, had taken a position be-
fore Mr. Fasse's door. The band
consisted of from 22 to 25 persons.
One of the praying women excited
my particular attention. She wore

soiled clothes, and was very red in
the face. She knelt, sang, and
prayed with the others, but during
the prayers she held her hands to-
gether and held them up in front of
her, which the others did not do.
Moreover, she was intoxicated, for
when she attempted to arise she fell
flat upon her back. I said to one
of the praying women; 'The woman
is as drunk as a fool; it is a shame
that you have such a woman with
you.' Upon this, she answered:
'Yes, we are very sorry,' and asked
me to sign the pledge. If I was at
first inclined to do this, it never
entered my mind to do it after such
an incident.

"The drunken praying woman
then reeled away. She was really
intoxicated. I did not know the
woman, and did not discover her
name."

SENATOR MORTON'S proposed amend-
ment to the Constitution, providing a new way
of electing the President and Vice Presi-
dent, has received the unanimous approval
of the Senate committee. It is very
simple and just. It gives the vote of
every Congressional district to the candi-
date receiving a plurality of votes, and
the votes of the two Senatorial electors
are to be given to the candidate receiving
a plurality of all the votes in the State.
This is a great improvement on our
present cumbersome and dangerous method,
and it seems to meet with universal
approval.

The latest project is to tunnel a small
experimental shaft under the Straits of
Dover, just to see if there are any bad
cracks in the ocean bed, and to serve, if
it should succeed, as a sewer or drift way
for a larger tunnel, railroad size, from
England to France. The small tunnel
can be bored in about thirty months, for
\$5,000,000.

IMMIGRATION. Although knowing the spirit of democracy concerning immigration and especially immigration from Europe, we had hoped the development and enrichment of the Western States by immigration from Europe would have opened the eyes of the Southern chivalry as to the needs of our country and that at least an effort would be made to induce sturdy laborers to come to Texas and till its soil.

Grand, President—On the 19th day of this month, as Governor of this State, I telegraphed you there was an armed insurrection against the legal government of this State, and made a requisition upon you for aid to suppress it, and to prevent domestic violence.

A similar call had previously been received from Brooks, claiming to be Governor, and two attorneys in his behalf reached here yesterday to urge a compliance with the call.

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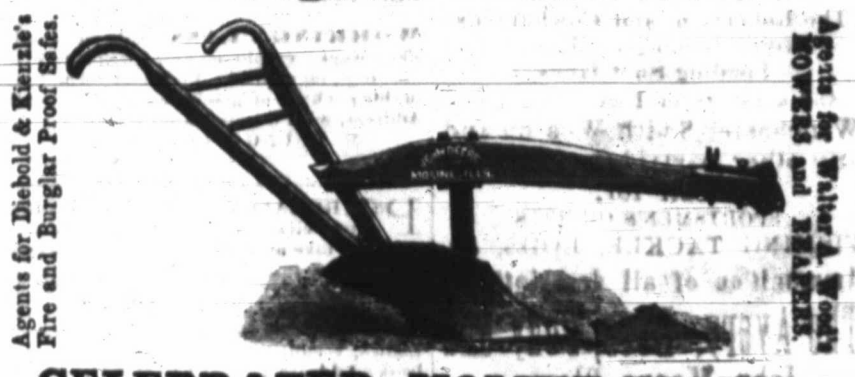
