The Row with the Catholic Bishops in Brazil.

[Correspondence N. Y. Times.]
RIO DE JANEIRO, BRAZIL,
March 20th, 1874.

The sentence passed upon the Bishop of Olinda by the Supreme Tribunal of Justice has been commuted to simple imprisonment for four years. This was the result of long and exciting discussions in Cabinet Council, and was reached only on the 12th inst., and when the public, already beginning to notice the delay in the execution of the sentence, imagined a Ministerial crisis was at hand. It was well known that the Minister of War and Justice were strongly opposed to the trial, and were desirous, after it was finished, that the Emperor should interpose with a full pardon. But Don Pedro does not appear so anxious to interfere in this case, and all the Ultramontane organs have been declaring "he certainly would." So, while there is an abatement of the "hard-labor" clause—by which no one seems disposed to object—the "illustrious martyr" goes to prison. The fortress of Sao Joao, situated on the bay of Rio de Janeiro, has been chosen as the place where the sentence is to be carried out. Indeed, I learn from the journals of today that the condemned Bishop was transferred from the Arsenal of Marine to that fortress two days since.

POSSIBLE CONSEQUENCES.

At this result of the struggle between the civil and ecclesiastical powers, the friends of true liberty everywhere must rejoice. That Brazil has thus vigorously and impartially applied the law will astonish the clergy at Rome, no doubt can exist. But shall we have any form of a letter, as that of the Emperor of Germany I may here say that the letter published in Europe, and already copied by the press here, professing to have been written by the Pope and addressed to Don Pedro, is a forgery. It would be seen that we have not yet reached that point of open resistance to Rome which necessitates so vigorous and direct a remonstrance from the Holy See. Besides, the Papal Nuncio is still here in all his pristine glory, officiating exactly as he has done for the past fifteen years, granting dispensations and occasionally leading in the religious ceremonies, on some public feast day—apparently all unconscious that anything has occurred out of the usual routine. Indeed, if I were to select the one of all the public functionaries at the court who seems the least concerned in the present struggle between this government and Rome, I should declare at once that official to be no other than Monsenor Sanguini, the Papal Nuncio. Lookers-on here thought this strange. When the Bishop of Olinda was arrested, it was thought he would certainly act. But no. Then came the conviction and sentence to two years' imprisonment, and then every one declared that now certainly he would declare himself. But no again. His Eminence wore the same calm look as before, and at the public audience with the Emperor and Empress on the 14th instant he did not fail to appear and express the feelings of "exaltation" supposed to animate his colleagues on that happy occasion. It is no thought that Nuncio will not consider the mere imprisonment of a Bishop a sufficient cause for calling for his passports; but that, when all the Bishops have been ousted from their sees—including the venerable Archbishop of Bahia—now in his eightieth year—and when the Pope has written directly to the Emperor, and rebuked him on account of the attitude of his government, and a schism has been made in the Church, and finally a bull of excommunication has been hurled at the head of Don Pedro—then Monsenor Sanguini will doubtless begin to seriously consider whether his usefulness in Brazil, as a representative of Pio Nono, has not pretty nearly ceased.

An Account of the Catholic Brutalities in Mexico.

New York, April 27.—The Rev. Daniel F. Watkins, Protestant missionary at Guadalajara, Mexico, has addressed a letter to the Secretary of the American Board of Foreign Missions, giving an account of the murder of Mr. Stephens. He says Mr Stephens had been in the bay loft but a few minutes, when a furi-

ous throng entered the place where he had taken refuge.

Seeing soldiers in the crowd, he ran to meet them, thinking they had come to his help, and when he cried out "Protect me! protect me!" they replied, "They come, they come," and at the same time the soldiers and others discharged their muskets and other firearms on the beloved brother, killing him instantly. One shot entered his eye and several his breast, and as soon as soon as the villains reached him they used their swords, cutting his head literary to pieces, and taking his brains out, it is said, with sticks.

They afterward robbed his body of every article he had on, and the house of everything he had. They took all his books and burnt them in the public place. A small English Bible that was in the martyr's hand when he died shared the same fate, and, lest the awful crime should fail to prove the utmost barbarity, they entered the church and announced the deed, well done by ringing twice a merry peal of bells.

A basket full of human bones, found by a roadside, was enough to set Newport wondering. It turns out, however, that two boy bone-gatherers had found them on the beach and filled their basket, but had fled with rising hair when they saw a human skull grinning at them.

He was fined \$5, which he paid with a \$50 note, the justice giving him the change. The next day it was discovered that \$50 was bogus.
