It Doesn't Pay.

[Special Telegram to Chicago Times.]
OIL CITY, PA., April 29.

The operators and speculators in
the Pennsylvania oil regions have
become disgusted with the prices
which crude petroleum, have been
commanding, and, in order to bowl
up the figures and make production
remunerative, have determined
upon a very decided programme.
A few days ago a special meeting
of the Oil Producers' Association
was convened, and the demoral-
ized condition of the market
discussed. There seemed to be only
one path to relieve the over-
stocked market, and that was to
suspend for a while, at least, the
opening of new wells. A resolution
to quit work upon new borings for
the space of ninety days was car-
ried, and has accordingly gone into
effect. This action of the associa-
tion has kicked-up considerable ex-
citement, but it seems to be very
generally approved by almost every-
body throughout the oil country.

By the suspension of boring opera-
tions, about 2,000 drivers and derrick
riggers have been thrown out of
employment; but the operators are
showing their liberality by al-
lowing these people one half the
price of their labor while the trouble
lasts.

The petroleum market, the world
over, is terribly swamped with over
production, and it has become a
serious business with the operators
of this region that the consumption
does not keep better step with the
supply. The daily average produc-
tion for March was 24,629 barrels.
The stock on hand at the beginning
of the month was 2,283,032 barrels.
The stock floating at the end was
2,528,210 barrels which left an in-
crease over sales of 245,178 barrels.

In Butler County 120 out of 130
wells now drilling have ceased opera-
tions, and the same rate will ap-
ply to other localities throughout
the region. Speculators are buying
up great quantities of floating oil
and storing it, in anticipation of a
rise in prices, which will undoubt-
edly be the sequel of the suspen-
sion of drilling. The price of crude
petroleum sank as low as \$1.50 per
barrel during the last ten days,
days, which figures would not pay
for the next thirty days the price
is expected to jump lively up to \$4
per barrel. Such at least is the
opinion of reliable authorities here.

A Young Woman Unconscious for Five Days.

The New Haven Journal, of Mon-
day, records as follows the case of
young lady in that city, about nine-
teen years of age, who had been lying
in a cataleptic trance since the
night of Wednesday of last week:
"She retired on that night in full
possession of health, and in the
morning she was found, body and
limbs perfectly rigid, and has re-
mained so ever since, last evening
showing no change in her situation.
Respiration and pulsation are regu-
lar and natural, but she has been
unconscious and has taken but a
very trifling amount of nourishment.
The lady has been subject to cata-
lepsy for eighteen months past, and
has, at times, without a moment's
warning, become perfectly rigid and
remained so for longer or shorter
intervals, sometimes for hours,
sometimes for only a few moments.
She has been seized when about
reaching her hand for any object,
and in a moment would lose all con-
trol of her muscles. Another sin-
gular circumstance attending this
case is that about a year ago she
lost all power of speech for twenty-
four hours, but being at the time
conscious, making known her wants
by signs. When regaining her
speech she could articulate nothing
but the German language which
she had not been in the habit of
using, and which her parents were
not aware she could speak, except
simple words. Her parents are
both of German birth, but the
daughter has not been in the habit
of conversing in the language, but
while in the state she spoke it with
great fluency, greatly surprising her
parents, who had never heard her
use the language to any extent. The
disease of catalepsy, or trance, it is
well known to medical men, is a
disease of the nervous system rarely
met with, but not necessarily
fatal. The patient is under the
treatment of Dr. M. F. Linquist, of
this city."

Accidentally we got hold of the State Gazette containing strictures upon the Express and the article concerning the Lunatic Asylum which we perused with a great deal of enjoyment considering the source from whence they come. HALL OF THE ALAMO LITERARY SOCIETY,
San Antonio, Texas, May 5, 1874.

Called Meeting of the San Antonio Agricultural, Stockraising and Industrial Association of Western Texas.

The meeting having been called to order the President, Major J. T. Brackenridge, stated that the object of the call was to consider the practicability of holding an Agricultural and Industrial fair next fall. In his usual happy manner he compared the present with the past condition of our State, and in a glowing, but practical light, pictured her fair future if we but do our duty as citizens, and that duty will fall lightly on each. He supported his remarks by quoting from his own life experience which bore strongly on the progress of Texas. Our country is, he said, comparatively young and possesses within herself the resources of a nation; awaiting development—that the vitality exists and should be aroused to action, and this is the channel through which it should be escorted. He accepted the position which he has the honor of filling, from the confidence felt in, the love done by this association, and the greater good yet to be done, and pledges his personal efforts, asking the hearty co-operation of the citizens generally, in carrying out its object.

Ed Braden Esqr., in his honest, energetic manner coincided. He had talked with many of our citizens who favored the movement and would give it their support. He thought the association ought not to be taxed for the use of a room in which to hold their public meetings, and felt confident that there was sufficient liberality in Fire Company No. 1 to grant the use of their hall, and in the Gas Company to furnish the necessary light, without charge.

In his opinion it needed but a determined effort to meet success, and promised his aid in any way it could be made available.

Col. R. W. Peay was of opinion that we were as well able to hold a fair as our neighboring towns, New Braunfels and Gonzales, and could make a perfectly satisfactory show; and that if we decided in favor of a fair we would receive the support of the whole community.

Squire Judson declared that means could be provided, and that a fair must be held; that this was not only an Agricultural display, but embraced every industry, and was entitled to, and would receive general support.

Judge Robinson cordially coincided in the probability of a successful result, and urged that a fair be held, and that the "Board of Trustees" be instructed to take the necessary steps to carry out that object.

Dr. Kingsbury fully appreciated the necessity of a fair. He referred to the last fair held in our city, and related the experience of one of our merchants, who, during the days of the fair, was obliged to engage several additional clerks, and after business closed, for the day, it kept all hands busy until 12 o'clock at night, restoring the goods to the shelves. The customers were mostly strangers—many from neighboring eastern towns. He remarked that a fair not only brought money to our city, but, through our visitors, gave a better and more appreciative idea of ourselves, and our surroundings, than could be disseminated in any other way.

He referred to the result of the unabated efforts of this association, and showed what great good it could effect for the country if aided by the general public. Drawing attention to the recent heavy snow storms in Ohio and other States, at a time when our farmers were preparing to reap their oats and wheat, he saw that Texas, with a climate unsurpassed for health, and rich in every resource, need only be known to be appreciated and receive an animate emigration, and thought that an annual fair was a strong effort in that direction, and hoped that it would be warmly supported.

H. Grenet Esqr., expressed his warm sympathy in the efforts of the association, and became a member, pledging his personal assistance in making the proposed fair a success.

T. A. Dwyer Esq., enrolled his name on the list of members, and promptly accepted his nomination on a working committee.

On motion of G. W. Caldwell Esq., a committee of three was appointed by the chair to solicit additional membership, and the chair appointed the following gentlemen on said committee: G. W. Kingsbury, Ed. Braden and T. A. Dwyer Esq.

Ed Braden Esq., offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved that this meeting adjourn to meet again on Tuesday evening next, at 8 o'clock, at the hall of Fire Company No. 1, and that the secretary be requested to address a note to the chief of Fire Company No. 1, soliciting the use of their hall for the occasion, and inviting the members of said company, to the meeting.

The following gentlemen were added to the list of members: T. A. Dwyer, H. Grenet, Ed. Braden and J. T. Briggs.

Telegraphic.

LETTLEROCK, May 5.—A special says: After the arrest of Judges Bennett and Searle by the Baxterites, they were taken across the river in a skiff, and then to St. Johns College, on the outskirts of the city. They spent the night there, and yesterday morning were put on horses and placed in charge of a band of cavalry and taken into the country, and will probably be kept in the woods.

On the heels of this event, at 5 o'clock yesterday morning, State Auditor Wheeler was awakened by a knocking at the doors of his residence. He jumped out of bed and went down stairs, where he saw a hack at the door. The driver said that Gen. McCavary wanted to see him. Wheeler got thinking of capture, asked him to come in. McCavary answered back for him to come out. He went out and some men who had been stationed with guns on the other side of the house rushed up and put him by force into the carriage. He was driven down to the Anthony House; where they took him to Baxter's rooms, woke Baxter up, and McCavary said, "I beg pardon for acting without orders, but I thought it my duty to capture Wheeler, bring him to you, and make him acknowledge you as Governor. I will do the same with the State Treasurer, Page and Brooks, if you say so." Baxter gave orders to release him, much to McCavary's discomfiture. There is some talk of moving his government to Arkadelphia, and making that his capital.

A son of Judge Bennet received a letter last evening from his father, saying: "I suppose you know Judge Searl and I were captured at Argenta last night. We are well treated, and in no bodily danger. Don't know when we will be released. The letter was received through Gen. Blocker, of Baxter's forces.

Baxter has again practically seized the telegraph office. There are guards posted 100 yards away, and they allow no one to enter.

LETTLEROCK, May 5.—Baxter denies that he authorized the arrest of Judges Bennett and Searle; but when St. John's College was searched this morning by a squad of regulars acting as police, an unfinished report of their arrest, addressed to Baxter, was found on a table, where it had been left in the haste incident to the departure, which effectually refutes his statement.

Writs of habeas corpus have been issued for the missing judges, and Baxter, Newton, Churchhill, Blocker and Williams are reported to have left town to avoid its services.

BERLIN, May 5.—The Car to-day received a letter from Gens Von Moltke and Manuefel.

Prince Gortschakoff held a conference with Prince Bismarck. The betrothal of the Russian Duke Vladimir and Duchess Marie of Mecklenburg, was promulgated yesterday.

LONDON, May 5.—There is a great strike of the Durham colliers. Fifty thousand persons are out of employment.

MADRID, May 5.—The main body of the Carlists is at Rypoll, under Prince Alfonso. Don Carlos is at Burango.

Marshall Serrano is expected at Madrid Saturday next.

MAJOR R. J. MOSES, of Columbus, Ga., has commenced suit against Mr. W. H. Young for \$100,000 libel. It is based upon the publication of a late pamphlet, in which Mr. Young charges Major Moses with unprofessional conduct as a lawyer, and of acting dishonestly in a transaction between a northern client and the former Columbus Bank. The suit promises to be a long and expensive one, and will excite great interest on account of the high standing of the parties.

Victor Emmanuel at the Opera.
 An incident of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the accession of the King of Italy to the throne of Sardinia is thus described by a correspondent of the *London Times*:—"In the evening at the Apollo Theater, the elite of all Italy was in attendance at the gala performance, with a fair representation of the wealth, the rank, the beauty and intelligence of the whole country. The house was crowded at an early hour; the performance, which was to commence at half-past 8, was put off to 9 o'clock, and half-past 9, to wait for what was to be the event of the evening—the arrival of the King. There were gentlemen in black, looking grave and wise in the pit; grayly dressed ladies, all abuzz with dimonds, in the boxes. There was a glare of gas, and a stifling heat in the theater, an oppressive air, in which the ladies' flowers drooped and faded. Yes, an unbearable stifling and oppressive atmosphere reigned over that expectant audience; they had come with a purpose, and they were determined to accomplish it. That purpose was to give the King such a welcome as in his twenty-five years reign he had never met with; and, as the house became instantly hushed, and the orchestra struck up the first notes of the *Savoy Fanfare*, a burst of applause broke forth the like of which neither Rome, nor, perhaps, any place in the world, ever heard. The King stood up in the middle of the *Crown* box as if taken aback by the vehement demonstration of loyal enthusiasm; but at every attempt he made to acknowledge the popular greeting by that stately bow for which, in spite of his bulky figure, he is renowned, the cheers and plaudits rose again and again, with unabated vigor, so hearty and so fast and furious that it is scarcely an exaggeration to say that its din might in the stillness of that night hour be waited across the river far and wide, till it reached the solitude of the Vatican numbers.
 "The King was at last allowed to sit down, and the curtain rose; but every eye and eyeglass had for a long time no other focus than the box at the back of the house; the box where the King sat, with the Princess Margherita on his right, and on his left Prince Humbert, the ladies in the Princess's suite being allowed seats, while the Ministers, the Presidents of the Senate and Chamber, and a few officers of the King's military household stood in a row in the rear. The ballet—all of the evening's performance that the King could be prevailed upon to sit through—was over in less than an hour, and then, as the royal party rose to depart, the audience once more gave them such an uproar of cheers as no gold can purchase and no clove enslave. The opera, "I Goti," was then sung to a thinned and inattentive audience, even the least fashionable and fastidious only remaining till they had discussed the King's looks and the Princess's toilet to their hearts' content, commenting especially on the grand diamond tiara and necklace which, as it was becoming to the rank, so did it set off the peculiar loveliness of the gentle and benignant Star of Italy."

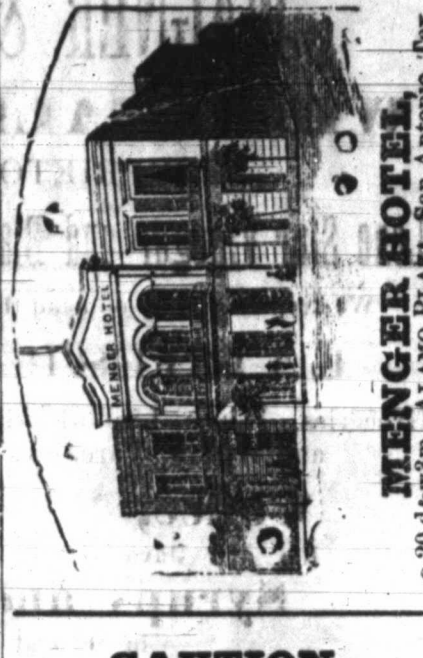
