A French Tichborne Case.

The Paris correspondent of the Manchester Examiner writes: "I must now say a few words about a lawsuit just over in Paris, and which strangely contrasts with your tamous Tichborne case. In spite of having been recognized by Lady Tichborne, who held to be his mother, the verdict of the jury was against the claimant. 




