A Semi-Queen.

One of the most familiar and popular personages of the Copenhagen society has passed away in the Countess Danner, whose death, at the age of sixty, has just occurred at Genoa. Her life was one of more than ordinary vicissitude and romance. Born of an humble parentage, her beauty and graces secured for her first the honest affection and then the hand in morganatic marriage of the Danish Crown Prince, who afterwards reigned as King Frederick VII, the predecessor and cousin of his present Danish majesty. Up to the period of her meeting with Frederick she had supported herself by the exercise of talents which nature had added to her personal charms; first as a schoolmistress and then as an actress.

Her marriage with the King of Denmark was publicly celebrated at Copenhagen in 1850, and although she could not share his throne she kept his affection, as well as the hearty good will of his people, down to the day of his death. Her little "morganatic" court was always the resort of the best blood and culture of the Danish capital; and this resulted from the modest grace with which she carried herself in her position, her active charities and her elegant hospitality. She accompanied the King on many of his journeys, and received all the social attentions, at least due to the sovereign's wife. After her husband's death and the accession of King Christian, Countess Danner made her chief residence at Genoa, but on her frequent visits to the scenes of her former social reign she was received with as much respect and welcome as if she had been officially the dowager Queen.

A Michigan Girl as a Wrestler.

It is undeniable that the young ladies of this city are lamentably deficient in their duty in the matter of furnishing local items for the newspapers. Their sisters in other places are more mindful in this particular. The Wyandotte Courier tells of the exploits of a belle of the village of Trenton as follows:

"While purchasing some goods of a dashing young clerk, she made some remark that implied doubts of his muscular ability, and was promptly challenged to a trial of strength. The young lady accepted banter and stepped out into the street, followed by the young man, who did not think that the challenged party was in earnest. The moment the young man cleared the sidewalk he was grasped by the young lady and a vigorous struggle followed. In defense the clerk exerted all his strength, but was thrown to the ground, where, with his head in a chancery, he got his face nicely washed in snow. The affair attracted a crowd of nearly 100 persons." If any of the girls hereabouts have any conceit as to their ability as wrestlers, and will notify us when they propose to put the matter to a test, we should be pleased to detail an impartial reporter to make notes of the tourney. We have an acquaintance with sundry clerks who would be fit subjects to practice on.

A French Tichborne Case.

The Paris correspondent of the Manchester Examiner writes: "I must now say a few words about a lawsuit just over in Paris, and which strangely contrasts with your famous Tichborne case. In spite of having been recognized by Lady Tichborne, who held to be his mother, the verdict of the jury was against the claimant. Here a young lady claims to be the daughter of a certain lady; this lady won't acknowledge her, and yet the finding of the tribunal is in favor of the young lady. The facts of this curious lawsuit may be thus briefly stated: A French lady, the Countess D'Yron, had married, in 1832, an Englishman, Mr. Samuel Smith, who died in 1836. A few years later she married a second time. At the time of her second marriage she had with her a little girl, not her own daughter, she said, but a girl she had fetched from a London Work-house, and whom she had adopted. In 1856 this girl, for the education of whom the Countess had largely provided, married, against her wishes, a certain M. De Tremogain, so she discontinued

paying her any provision. Mme. De Tremogain is now a widow, absolutely destitute, and she claims a pension for her mother. Mme. D'Yron resists the demand on the plea that Mme. De Tremogain is not her daughter, and in proof of it she presents a certificate, signed by four medical men, and from which it appears that she never had any children, and in fact could not have any. In spite of this certificate, and on a declaration made by an English medical man, Dr. Perkins, who attended the Countess when she was plain Mme. Smith, the tribunal has just ordered her to pay her daughter a pension of £120 per annum."

For some time past various persons living in the country here reported that during the recent heavy rains it had rained sulphur. At first it was thought that the parties had been deceived by the pollen from trees, which were just budding, but it was found in such great quantities and so far distant from any forest that it was examined more closely. The substance has every appearance of sulphur; it looks like sulphur; smells like sulphur; tastes like sulphur and burns like sulphur. Mr. John Howlett, who lives several miles from the city, brought to this office a number of lumps the size of a pea and larger, which he collected on his farm, which are sulphur beyond all question. They were picked up on the edge of a pond where a large quantity had fallen. He says that the lumps were not placed there by human agency and must have fallen from the clouds.—[Charleston Courier.

The Other Side.

It is becoming more evident all the time by the proceedings over in Austin that the object of the Democratic ring is not to find out the merits of the Asylum management, but only to crush Mr. Newcomb.

While heaven and earth is moved to convict Newcomb, on the evidence of Green, who admits he is a thief, nothing is done as to the firm of Stuart and Mair, who next to Green are the guilty parties. The last number of the State Journal give a few particulars of the proceeding of which we have heretofore been ignorant.

In regard to the charge against Newcomb for repairs on the roof of the capital the case rests almost entirely on the unsupported evidence of Green.

Judge Richardson on the application of Newcomb for a writ habeas corpus granted an investigation de novo, which will take place on Thursday.

In the famous "bacon case" it is Green again that furnishes all the evidence. In this case Newcomb is under a \$750 bond to await the action of the Grand Jury.

The third case against Mr. Newcomb was for embezzling some coin. This case was so frivolous that it was dismissed by the State Attorneys on Wednesday morning.

If the Democracy fail to establish the guilt of Newcomb, as well as that of Elliott, Stuart & Mair, and others whom they have accused it may safely be put down that there is nothing too vile for them to attempt.

The following is the card of Mr. Newcomb in the State Journal:

A CARD TO THE PUBLIC.

During the past two weeks I have been set upon by a pack of Coke's character blackers under cover of investigations made by a so-called Legislative Committee. I have been arrested and put upon trial upon trumped-up charges supported by the statements of an individual [W. H. Green] who had been promised immunity from punishment for his actual crimes if he would implicate me and others with himself, and who in carrying out his engagement testified to his own guilt of numerous felonies. This prosecution has assumed the nature of a prosecution and passed the bounds of patience. The latest infamy is a pretended report signed: "S. L. Chambliss, J. D. Stephens, Wm. A. Wortham, Ira B. Saddle," as a Legislative committee on the Lunatic Asylum and published in the Austin Statesman of the 3rd inst. I find in this report the following statement: "These goods were divided between Green the Steward, Jas. P. Newcomb member of the Board of Managers and A. S. Mair, of the firm of Stuart & Mair, commission merchants of this city, who received and forwarded the goods."

So far as the above statement refers to myself I denounce it as an unmitigated falsehood, and the association of name in particular, and insinuation made towards other members without naming them, is evidence of the mean and malicious character of the entire document. The men who have perpetrated this slander and gave origin to these infamous prosecution have left the city but their dirty work is to be carried on by Coke at the expense of the people, and whoever touches it becomes an accomplice in perjury.

A Marshal of France—Frolic of a Wild Fancy.

[From the Savannah Advocate and Republican.]

Two days ago a tall, spare made man, some thirty-five years of age, with long, light hair, that falls down over his shoulders in regular buccaneer style, and a huge beard that depended upon his breast, and mingled with his unshorn locks, reached the city by way of the Central Railroad, and took lodgings at a boarding house on Liberty street, between Jefferson and Montgomery. Yesterday the eccentricities of the stranger, who appears to be an Italian, culminated in his entering upon the role of a Marshal of France. Arraying himself in a dilapidated uniform, gaily trimmed with paper cut into epaulettes, chevrons, and the insignia of martial rank and military orders, the poor fellow stuck a feather in his hat, and brandishing a policeman's club for a general's sword, announced himself as Lawrence Emanuel, a Marshal of France and Chief of Napoleon Bonaparte's staff.

Information of this extraordinary personal transformation was lodged with the Ordinary, and about dusk last evening Deputy Sheriff Dooner and Constable Pollock took the maniac marshal into their custody, and committed him to jail for safe keeping, until the condition of the man can be duly ascertained by the Ordinary and Commissioners of Lunacy.

From a letter to the N. Y. Sun. A CHEST OF GOLD.

THE BURIED DOUBLOONS OF MEXICAN BANDITTI FOUND IN A BEAUTIFUL VALLEY BY A TEXAN BAPTIST.

Belton, Texas, April 30, 1874.

For several years past there has been a strange story published in many of the local papers of the State in regard to buried treasure in this part of the country. About 20 miles above Belton there is a large spring, whence issues one of the most beautiful streams in the world which for a distance of 20 miles, meanders through a rich and fertile valley, about two miles in width, surrounded by a range of mountains, on which there are cedar brakes almost impenetrable to man. This valley is known far and near as Noiland's Valley, and is celebrated for its springs of pure water, the fertility of the soil, and its many peculiarly-shaped mounds.

About 15 years ago an old Mexican greaser named Antonio came into this section of the country, and hired himself as a laborer to a gentleman of the vicinity. He was about 50 years of age, and one of the most eccentric individuals in the country. Every spare moment he could get he was prowling around through mountain and valley, apparently in search of something, but when questioned he gave evasive replies. At that early day this country was but thinly inhabited, and the citizens were troubled very much by horse thieves. The Mexican's conduct was so peculiar that the citizens began to look on him with suspicion, thinking he was a spy for some band of thieves, locating the whereabouts of the best horses, and finding gaps through the mountains to pilot the thieves in and out. He was frequently absent a day or two at a time, and when questioned would give very unsatisfactory answers. Suspicion with a Texan amounts to guilt, and a few of the neighbors arrested Antonio for the purpose of compelling him to divulge all he knew about the horse thieves. The party proceeded to administer lynch law. He was hanged three times, until life was nearly extinct, but not a word could be forced from him in regard to the horse thieves. When he revived sufficiently he told them the following story: He said that about 20 years ago he belonged to a band of Mexican robbers, whose retreat was about 20 miles from here, among the mountains on Leon river. One day, while the rest of the band were on an expedition, he and a comrade conceived the bold design of robbing them and hiding the treasure until the robbers were dispersed, when they would return and get the gold. He said there were four cedar boxes, containing \$100,000 each, all in Spanish doubloons, which they placed on pack mules and transported to this valley, and buried in four very peculiarly shaped mounds. His partner had been killed in Mexico at a fandango, and he had been confined in a Mexican prison until this time. He said he had been searching the valley over for the mounds where the money was concealed, but so many years had elapsed that he could not find the marks he had left to designate the place. Very few of the party placed any confidence in his narrative, and after a severe castigation he was allowed to go free, with instructions to leave the country forthwith. He has never been seen or heard of in this part of the country since.

Your correspondent was one of the party who arrested the old Mexican, and was inclined to give some credence to the story; but to turn out and seek for the money among so many mounds was like looking for a needle in a hay-stack. There are but few here now who ever heard the tale, and the oldest settlers have almost let it slip from their memory.

A day or two ago a citizen of this valley was in need of some clay to dab an old-fashioned stick-and-earth chimney, and as clay is a very scarce article here, he concluded to open one of the mounds and try

the earth for that purpose. He opened a hole about three feet deep where he found a strong cedar box with iron bands. The bands were almost eaten up with rust and were easily removed by the hand. With the sharp point of the pick the box was pressed open, and found to contain 6,250 Spanish doubloons, almost \$100,000. He procured a wagon and removed the treasure to Belton, and deposited it in the bank of Sinclair & Co. He made no secret of the discovery, and the greatest excitement now prevails. Adventurers are scattered through the valley, with spade and pick, digging into every mound and turning over every peculiarly shaped rock. The old Mexican's story is revived with a hundred variations. Some of the land-owners have stationed sentinels around their premises, while the laborers are searching for the hidden treasure.

The lucky finder is a man by the name of Brandon, who had never heard the old Mexican's story. He has a large family, and was already in good circumstances. He is a strict member of the Baptist church, and has already given \$10,000 to the church for the purpose of building a large church and school-house in his neighborhood.

Telegraphic.

LITTLE ROCK, May 9.—The railroads are interrupted to stop recruits. Four Brookite negroes were killed yesterday. The Baxterites are confident of success. A quorum in both houses on Monday.

The Brookites have captured the steamer Hattie. Frank Timmerkil and Capt. Sam Houston have died from their wounds, and John Myers, pilot, is mortally wounded.

MEMPHIS, May 9.—At nine o'clock and five minutes this forenoon, the wires to Little Rock went down, and it is now impossible to communicate with that city either by way of St. Louis or New Orleans. At last accounts fighting was going on and the supposition is that all the wires have been cut and the telegraph office seized.

Capt. Sam Houston who was killed yesterday above Little Rock, was formerly supervising inspector of steamboats at this port.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The Court of inquiry acquitted Gen. Howard.

Secretary Richardson is at home.

The river and harbor appropriation bill will be reported on Monday.

The Representatives of the Arkansas factions are in conference with the Attorney General. If they fail to come to an agreement, the Attorney General is authorized to issue orders. His office will not close until mid night. Seven millions of railroad bonds are involved, in which it is said the Arkansas officials have a slice. The source of the trouble seems that Baxter was refractory about issuing them.

MADRID, May 9.—In replying to the address, Marshal Serrano says he desires a week's delay to deliberate on the political crisis before constructing a Cabinet.

A dispatch from Bilbao says Gen. Concha's troops are throwing up fortifications. Don Carlos and Gen. Elcio are reported to be at Durango, thirteen miles southeast of Bilbao.

LONDON, May 9.—A Times special from Madrid says Marshal Serrano has declared that he will not solve the political crisis before the expiration of eight days. In the meantime he will study the question.

These Dear Little Feet

Among the many reforms for which women have come to be grateful, the shoe reform is one of the best. Fair weather is always given as an explanation of streets thronged with women, but in view of this spring's capricious atmosphere, that reason surely fails. It must be the prevailing shoe, broad soled, square heeled, and free than suffrage, that has driven forth the feminine pedestrian, for certainly a covering for the feet as "easy" as that of the present walking shoe has not been worn in a long time. Shoes of all kinds are notably plain; even fancy stitching is out of favor, and neatness only is imperative, provided the shoe is excellent in fit.

Buttoned boots, made of soft, lustrous French kid, are the kind preferred, heavy shoes of pebble grain being added to ward-robes now in preparation for the country. For sensitive feet, easily wearied by walking, uppers of French satin have foxings of kid, only high enough to give strength and protect the feet from dampness.

For carriage wear there are dainty boots of French satin, which lace upon the instep, and add a quilling of narrow black lace entirely around both eyes-rows. Such shoes, made of the same material as the dress, are provided with elegant dinner and reception costumes, while others of black satin with lace trimmed lappels upon the instep are preferred by some for the same purpose.

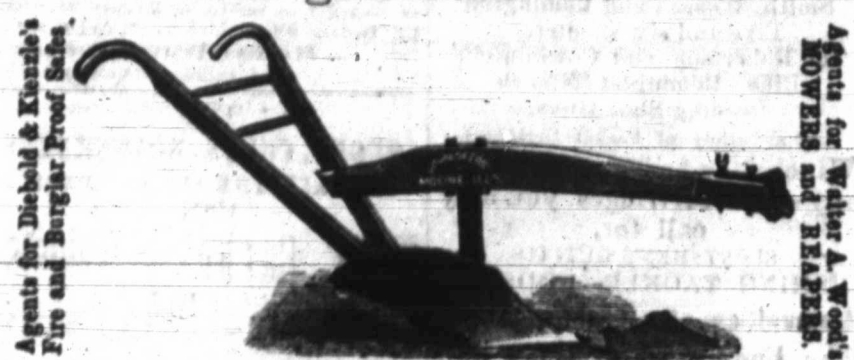

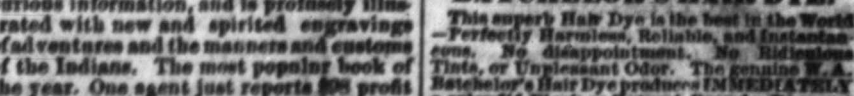
