An Interview with Rochefort.

CHICAGO, May 28.—Henri Rochefort  
arrived here this afternoon from  
San Francisco, and two hours later  
left for New York. No reception  
was given him by the Communists.

An Omaha special to the Even-  
ing Post, gives a report of an inter-  
esting interview with Rochefort in  
that place. He stated that he left  
New Caledonia on the 20th of March  
having been there three months.  
He gives a fearful picture of the life  
of prisoners confined there, particu-  
larly those sentenced for crime. The  
condition of political prisoners was  
more tolerable, as they were not  
obliged to labor, and those who had  
money were allowed to purchase  
such comforts as were obtainable  
there.

Rochefort and several companions  
were permitted to build a small  
house, which added much to their  
comfort.

Of his escape and that of his  
companions he would only say, that  
they engaged an English bark of  
400 tons burden to sail around the  
coast, and that they swam off to the  
vessel, being in the water from 8 p. m.  
until after midnight before they  
were picked up, in nearly an ex-  
hausted condition.

In regard to political matters in  
France, he expressed the opinion  
that the prospect for the Republi-  
cans is very bright; that McMahon  
cannot sustain himself more than  
three months, and that it is more  
than probable that Thiers will be  
again at the head of the government  
within that time. Thiers, he thinks,  
though shabbily treated, deserves  
great credit for his unswerving fidelity  
to the republic, and he (Rochefort)  
will do all he can to sustain  
him, but he thinks Gambetta the  
best man for the republic.

R. W. Lougheny, formerly of the  
Marshall Republican, is about to es-  
tablish a Bourbon Democratic daily  
paper in Galveston.

The Denton Monitor says:  
I. P. Sublett bought, last year, on  
credit, forty acres of land, at three  
hundred dollars. He raised upon  
one acre of land fourteen bushels of  
wheat, from which he realized \$17.  
50. After the wheat was harvested,  
however, the same season, he plant-  
ed the same acre in sweet potatoes,  
and raised therefrom 160 bushels,  
which brought one dollar and twen-  
ty-five cents per bushel, aggregat-  
ing two hundred dollars. So he re-  
alized from one acre of ground, in  
one year, two hundred and seven-  
teen dollars and fifty cents. And  
that acre cost but seven dollars and  
a half. Upon both crops but ten  
days were bestowed on this acre of  
land. Now, who says he can not  
get a home in Texas?

The Harris county court has or-  
dered the County Attorney to bring  
suit against A. B. Hall, late sheriff,  
and J. E. Whittlesey, late county

treasurer, if they fail to make settle-  
ment for all school moneys which  
have been in their hands by the 11th  
of June.

Lord Clarence, who has been the  
lion at Houston made several hand-  
some presents during his stay. In  
driving over the Fifth Ward he en-  
countered a man who had lived on  
his father's estate in Limerick, Ire-  
land. Recognizing him as being the  
former occupant of a "cabin"  
which he often visited in his youth,  
he had a social chat with his old  
Irish acquaintance. Finding that  
he had not realized his "dreams" of  
America, he quietly slipped into his  
hand a \$50 note for the old man,  
whose gratitude found expression  
in tears.

NEW YORK, May 28.—Capt. Tyler  
of the London Board of Trade, com-  
missioned to come to this country  
to inspect the Erie Railway and re-  
port to his principals in London,  
has arrived. He was met by Mr.  
Kieley, one of the English represen-  
tatives in this country, and convey-  
ed to the Fifth Avenue Hotel. Soon  
afterward he went to the Erie office  
at the Grand Opera house, and  
made arrangements for his tour of  
inspection. He is accompanied by  
his son, a lieutenant in the English  
Engineer Corps.

Cadet Smith, of West Point,  
though no less black than when he  
first began, has faded from the pub-  
lic view of late; but we are glad to  
learn he is progressing well with  
his studies, and will leave quite a  
number of his white classmates to  
attend to the safe keeping of the  
last class members." Smith is the  
first colored cadet, and considering  
the abuse visited upon him for that  
reason his success can only be men-

THE war continues in Spain, without prospect of an early settlement. The issue is between the Republicans headed by Marshal Serrano, and the monarchists headed by Don Carlos, the claimant of the throne, and former opponent of Queen Isabella. It is now possible that the Republicans will leave the question to a vote of the people, and, if monarchy is in the majority, give the throne to Isabella's son, the young Prince of Asturias.

HON. JOHN IRELAND, Chairman Central Democratic Committee, publishes a call for money to pay the expenses of the campaign last year. He also warns the party against "a good many men in the State calling themselves Democrats without knowing what Democracy means, and who are now attempting to disintegrate the party." Now, to whom does he allude? Why not speak out? Is it the Galveston News, Houston Telegraph, and the great crowd of democratic journals, and public men who denounce Coke's printing conspiracy? Judge Ireland is afraid of the Grangers, and says a kind word to them. Now, everybody knows that every principle of the Grangers is opposed to Democracy. The Grangers vote for the best men, without regard to party; Democracy votes for the nominee, good, bad, or indifferent—angel or devil.

SENATOR STEWART of Nevada has proposed an amendment to the Constitution providing that where any State fails to provide a common school system for all children between the ages of five and eighteen, Congress shall provide such a system at the expense of the State. The New York Herald, in relation to this, says:

This is one of the most important amendments that has ever been submitted to Congress. The constitution imposes upon Congress the guarantee to every State of a republican form of government. Now there can be no such form of government, either in form or in spirit, without education. We are rapidly coming to the doctrine that ignorance is crime, and certainly it is a crime against the State. It is more necessary to build school-houses than jails, and quite as important to send children to school as to preserve the quarantine at our ports. We trust the Senator will press this amendment, or one similar to it in spirit, and that it will commend itself to the prompt and intelligent consideration of Congress.

THE Herald of this city mentions the arrest in St. Louis of Rev. H. C. Hovey, of Kansas City, a delegate to the Presbyterian General Assembly, and assumes his guilt. The St. Louis Globe of May 29 explains the matter as only a "technical violation of a city ordinance," and not at all calculated to criminate Mr. Hovey. He is pastor of an infidel church in Kansas City, and is held in high esteem by all who know him. He has many warm friends in the General Assembly. So says the Globe, and if that paper feels warranted by the facts, with which it is familiar, in defending Mr. Hovey, surely those at a distance, unfamiliar with the facts, are not warranted in publishing the mistake and misfortune of a clergyman as a matter of guilt and shame. The press should protect the sanctities of society, as well as criticize its evils. "Charity thinketh no evil."

AS WE expected, the secular press of the country generally express surprise and disappointment at the action of the General Conference of the M. E. Church, South, in relation to the visit of the fraternal messengers of the M. E. Church. The two churches are precisely alike in history, doctrine, government, and worship. They are, indeed, but separated branches of one church. The question that divided them, slavery, has passed away. And now, after thirty years of separation and non-fraternization, the M. E. Church sends messengers with proposals, not of organic union, but of cordial fraternization. The M. E. Church, South, declines even the fraternal relations common between all churches until the alleged grievances of a thirty years' quarrel are settled to Southern satisfaction.

From this time forth the responsibility for this unseemly and unchristian hostility between two branches of the same church will rest upon the shoulders of the majority of 103 in the General Conference who voted against fraternization. It will not rest upon the 65 delegates who voted for unconditional fraternization, nor upon the rank and file of the members of the Southern Church. The sentiment of the majority of the members of the Southern Church is in favor, not only of fraternization, but of immediate organic union. The action of the General Conference will cause that sentiment to grow, and the Southern Church will be weakened in proportion. Had fraternization been adopted, organic union would have been patiently waited for. But now the hope of a united Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States, felt everywhere, will not be in the Southern Church.

### Telegraphic.

A young man named Grimm was killed by a fall from his horse last Sunday near New Braunfels.

The Galveston Cotton Exchange has appointed five delegates to the Cotton Exchange Convention at Augusta, Ga., on June 10.

The Secretary of the Treasury has directed the Assistant Treasurer at New York to sell one million and a half of gold on the first and third Thursdays, and one million on the second and fourth Thursdays, or five million during the month of June.

NAVYVILLE, May 31.—A man named Murphy went to a farmer's house in Tipton county and cut Mrs. Melton Donaldson's head open with an axe, killing her instantly. He also cut two great gashes in the head of a negro servant girl, who subsequently gave the alarm. Murphy was chased and caught, and confessed the cutting of the negro, but denied the murder of Mrs. Donaldson. The negro, however, identified him as having committed both deeds. He was shot last night by citizens, his guilt being fully established. He committed the deed with a view of robbing Mrs. Donaldson's safe, which he supposed contained \$7000. The negroes can not survive her wounds.

NEW YORK, May 31.—Rochefort keeps his room to-day, until after making up his correspondence, and absolutely refuses audience to any parties who wish to speak with him. Later in the day he visited the house of M. Pettelier, where he was hospitably entertained and waited on by four members of the French society, Refuge de la Commune. He still refuses to be entertained by any society. He has a reception to-night. He publishes in the Herald to-day a letter justifying the rise of the Commune in view of evident monarchial intentions of the Assembly and the Government, and approves of the execution of the hostages as acts of reprisal. He describes as terrible the sufferings of the Communist prisoners, during their trial and transportation to exile in New Caledonia. McMahon is bitterly assailed as having been placed in power through the deserters of France. His term, Rochefort predicts, will be brief, and the speedy dissolution of the Assembly will surely usher in the republic.

PARIS, June 1.—At a meeting of the Left to-day it was resolved that the motion for a dissolution of the Assembly be pressed, and that overtures be made to the other side of the Chamber to secure their co-operation in the movement.

GROESBECK, TEX., June 1.—Mr. Alford, keeper of the bridge across the Navasota river, near Springfield, Limestone county, was shot dangerously wounded and robbed last Friday night, by three negroes. Yesterday one was captured by Deputy Sheriff Beon, and put in jail at Springfield. Last night he was hung by a mob. One of the others, with the money, is reported this morning as having been captured at Corsicana yesterday.

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEX., June 1.—About 8 o'clock yesterday the smoke of the steamship Gambia being observed toward the Pass hundreds gathered on the wharf, to which she was made fast about ten o'clock. This was the consummation of the hopes of the people, which, as one old man remarked, he had looked for over 30 years.

The Gambia had not the slightest difficulty in passing through the channel. She has been visited by at least a thousand persons to-day.

Gov. Coke has offered a reward of \$250 each for the arrest of the four murderers who assassinated Chas. M. Webb, Deputy Sheriff of Brown county, on the square of Comanche City, on the 24th of May.

### General News.

ST. PAUL, MINN., May 27.—A dispatch from Gen. Stanley, dated Fort Sully, May 29th, received at Fort Lincoln to-day, says four hundred Sioux left here to-day to be joined by more at Grand River Agency

and Cheyenne. They will try to intercept Custer's expedition when it starts. A hot time is anticipated.

ALBANY, N. Y., May 27.—To-day a young lady named Hopkins and a Mr. Barton fell from a boat on the river and were drowned.

LINCOLN, NEB., May 27.—Last night a man was attacked by three men in the vicinity of Seward, stabbed three times, beaten over the head, and left for dead on the prairie.

A shooting affair occurred last night, a well known gentleman putting a ball through the neck of another. The wounded gentleman will recover.

SEDALIA, MO., May 27.—An assault was made last evening by the police of the Missouri Pacific Road on the porter of the Ilgen House, while handing out Ilgen House cards to passengers. As he was in the act of receiving baggage he was struck on the head by a slung shot, and dangerously hurt. He will likely die.

WICHITA, KAN., May 27.—A few days ago a colored man named Charles Green got into a fight with a couple of Texas cow boys, and it was said had the best of the fight. To-day one of them named Ramsey rode into town, hitched his horse, walked up to the negro, who was attempting a mason, and without any previous notice shot him twice. Ramsey mounted his horse and rode out of the city yelling and flourishing his revolver. A party of his friends followed him to the bridge across the Arkansas, and with drawn revolvers prevented mounted officers from crossing the river in pursuit.

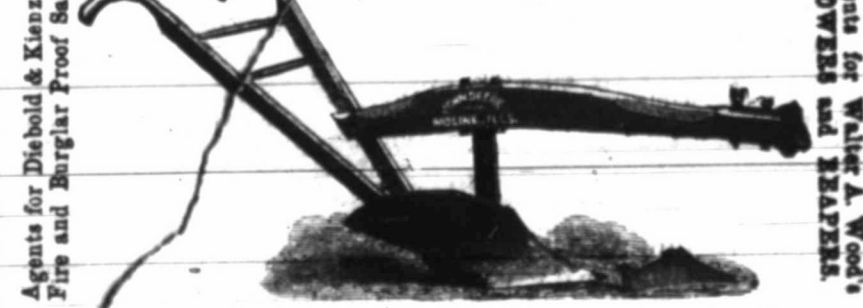
