General News.

QUEENSTOWN, May 31. — Steam-  
ship Baltic, from New York May  
23, with Mr. and Mrs. Sartoris on  
board, arrived at this port at 10  
o'clock this evening, all well.

MADRID, May 29. — General Loma  
has assumed command of the first  
corps of the Republican army of the  
North.

MADISON, IND., May 29. — Rev.  
Father Dupontaxer, pastor of St.  
Michael's Catholic Church in this  
city for over a quarter of a century,  
died this morning. His disease was  
a complication of disorders—drop-  
sy, gout and diabetes.

NEW YORK, May 29. — Kingstons,  
Jamaica, letters, give the particu-  
lars of the reception of the Second  
West India regiment on their re-  
turn from the Ashantee war. The  
troops landed on the afternoon of  
the 18th, amid salvoes of artillery  
and the general acclamation of the  
citizens of whom there could not  
have been less than 20,000 out of  
doors.

LOUISVILLE, May 31. — Lewis  
Tronuel and three boys, Willie Har-  
din, Charley Pitt and Robert Lloyd,  
all of New Albany, while in a skiff  
Saturday, were drawn under a coal  
barge and all drowned.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31. — At Reno  
today, Miss Lily Dancan, a pas-  
senger on the West bound train,  
fell under the cars and both legs  
were cut off. She died in a short  
time.

PARIS, May 29. — It is said that  
Prince Hohenzoln, the new German  
Ambassador, will request President  
McMahon to prevent the ultramoun-  
tane demonstrations, which tend to  
increase the bad feeling between  
France and Germany.

Several hundred Pilgrims left  
Marseilles for Paray-le-Monial. The  
American Pilgrims did not leave  
Paris to day, as reported in the  
previous dispatch. They will remain  
in the city until Monday, and then  
proceed to Lourdes.

SPRINGFIELD, ILL., May 29. — A  
farmer, Mr. John Baugh, living six  
miles south of the city, was killed  
by lightning, while ploughing in  
the field.

WICHITA, KAN., May 29. — The  
colored man, shot by Ramsey, the  
Texan, at this place on Wednesday,  
died this morning. The parties who  
prevented the arrest of Ramsey ap-  
peared in the police Court, plead  
guilty and were fined.

Two confidence men put up a job  
on a Texan at Great Bend, on Wed-  
nesday, and he drew his revolver  
and shot them both. It is thought  
one of them cannot survive.

LOUISVILLE, KY., May 29. — The  
Episcopal Convention of the diocese  
of Kentucky adjourned until some  
future time after the session of the  
General Convention, when it shall  
be called together by the senior  
bishop for the purpose of supplying  
the vacancy caused by the separa-  
tion from the Church of Cummins,  
the bishop to give thirty days' no-  
tice of his intent to call the conven-  
tion.

HUTCHINSON, May 29. — The ex-  
citement over the fraudulent issu-  
ing of \$50,000 funding bonds in  
Barbour county, Kansas, is gaining  
strength. Two hundred armed citi-  
zens are in pursuit of the renegade  
and fleeing County Commissioners.

OMAHA, May 29. — The Sheriff ad-  
vertises twenty acres of George  
Francis Train's land, near the city,  
to be sold for delinquent taxes and  
interest.

OTTAWA, ONT., May 29. — The to-  
tal number of signatures to the pe-  
titions to Parliament during the  
late session for a prohibitory liquor  
law, was 178,817.

QUANTREL AGAIN. — A reporter  
of the Nebraska City Press has late-  
ly conversed with a gentleman who  
lately arrived from Northern Texas,  
and who states that he has conversed  
during the past winter with Quan-  
trel at Sherman, Texas. It has re-  
peatedly been reported that he was  
dead, since compelled to flee from  
Kansas, some distance west or  
south west from Sherman. He is in  
the stock business. Many of his  
gang, and quite a number of other  
outlaws are also residing in the  
same section of country, and en-  
gaged in the same business since  
the war. Government detectives  
have frequently been on their track  
during the past two years, but sev-  
eral who have ventured into that  
country have never been heard of

since. Quantrel admitted to this  
gentleman who is a perfectly reli-  
able business man, that the greater  
portion of northwestern Texas was  
inhabited by a desperate class of  
men, and that anything that the gov-  
ernment might do toward arresting  
them would prove futile, as they  
are thoroughly organized and  
equipped for defense, besides, be-  
ing perfectly acquainted with the  
country could make their escape  
successfully into Mexico.

He says they are peaceably dis-  
posed but most of them are residing  
there under assumed names. They  
have men employed at all principal  
points of Denton, Clay, Cook, Mont-  
ague and other counties along the  
Kansas border, who apprise them  
of anything that may be going on  
tending to their apprehension. He  
also says there are some very bad  
men there, which may account for  
the base operations of various  
gangs of desperadoes operating from  
time to time in the States of Kansas  
and Missouri.

An English writer estimates that  
there are 17,000 hymns in the English  
language. Of these 16,000 are, or  
have been, used in the Anglican  
Church, and the rest are used by the  
dissenting sects.

The council of the Reformed Epis-  
copal Church recently adopted uni-  
formly a plan of federation  
(though not consolidation) with the  
Free Church of England, a body of  
seceders from the English establish-  
ment on account of their inability  
to obtain a reformation of the Book  
of Common Prayer. — Journal of Com-  
merce.
