[From the San Francisco Chronicle.] PIU NONO. Charles Warren Stoddard Interviews the Pope.

It is all very simple and very easily accomplished, especially if you are an American. You get a permit to enter the Vatican. This is the first step, and your banker can easily take it for you.

There is something remarkably magnetic in the atmosphere of this wonderful Pope. I defy any man who is a man to stand in that audience chamber and not feel an instinctive desire to go down on his knees, and, of course, the very next minute down he goes.

For half an hour we waited in this room, a score of us. The Holy Father is supposed to make his entire appearance between the hours of 12 and 1. Somewhere between 12 and 1 he came. Meanwhile we walked about, examined the rich and beautiful tapestries, looked out of the high windows upon the winding Tiber, amidst of a color with its many banks, saw a little prison, like a church, wherein the naughty priests are incarcerated; saw a little church like a prison, on the steps of which a half dozen beggars were sunning themselves.

There is something remarkably magnetic in the atmosphere of this wonderful Pope. I defy any man who is a man to stand in that audience chamber and not feel an instinctive desire to go down on his knees, and, of course, the very next minute down he goes.

We had some little conversation, as much as an Englishman could recall; it was all in French, but I should have enjoyed it in any language under the sun. He was glad to hear that I came from California; spoke of Archbishop Alemany; told me to be good and I shall enjoy staying hereafter, though it is rather a boring sometimes. Then he passed his magnetic hand over my rostrum and a little statuette of the Father, just like the big one which we all kiss and then he left me for the next to follow, and the supreme moment was over.

## To the Business Men of San Antonio.

J. G. HARDIN, W. A. and T. K. DIXON, in full of Comanche on charge of being accomplices in the assassination of Sheriff Webb, were taken out and hung in the night recently by masked men.

Cuba is fighting manfully for freedom, and will win it. A recent letter says that Bayamo has been in possession of Cuban forces since the 20th. In the neighborhood of Cienfuegos a fight took place, when Col. Santillo, in charge of Spanish forces, was killed and his columns cut to pieces. The Cuban forces are at the gates of Matanzas, and will probably soon attack that place. The Spaniards in Havana are much depressed, but angered against Concha, and say he is making money out of the Island's misfortune, but add that he shall not leave the place alive.

The Democrats in Congress from the South and West pretty generally favored the "inflation bill," and the Galveston News openly advocated that policy, so far as this State is concerned, had criticized the President for vetoing the bill. The decline in gold, or rather the appreciation of the currency since the veto is simple vindication of the President, and all the opponents of inflation. Gold is now down to nearly 110, and, with a proper course on the part of the Government, it will continue to fall until, with the increase of the wealth and revenues of the country, we can approach the resumption of specie payment. Grant is all right.

John Bright, the noted English Statesman, has made a noted speech on temperance. He said the friends asked for things to be done at Parliament which they know and all know, were impossible to be done; and if Parliament were to pass such laws as those proposed by many of the friends of temperance legislation, that very next week they would have to repeal them, and the whole city of London would be in riot, revolt and insurrection. Against public opinion Parliament could have no more power than the meanest citizen. He believed it would never be touched unless by thoughtful, serious men, beginning with the ministers of the gospel, and all those who went to places of worship for other reasons than fashion. The question of intemperance one of the great evils they have to overcome. He had come to the opinion that unless the religious portions of the country would take up this question, there was no hope for it whatever. At present, according to custom, wine must be on our tables to ornament them, and form the staple of conversation.

The Age fitness like a wounded bird at our random allusion to the political tactics of Col. Tracy, and condemn, though it is recalled for that it has contemplated an arrangement with that gentleman, whereby the business management of the Age would in part come into his hands.—Houston Telegraph.

We had heard before that Tracy was connected with the Age, a paper that speaks of leading Republicans by name in this wise: "So-and-so is a Radical, and therefore is necessarily a thief." Tracy accepts the description in all meekness. He is a Radical in that national democracy of the Telegraph, but he does not identify with the Bourbon demagogue of the Age. All right,

gentlemen; divide the thing between you. We suppose Gov. Davis, after this, will no longer take such men as his associates and champions, in spite of the remonstrances of his best friends, in his trips to Washington and elsewhere; nor allow his name reported in such company in caucuses and consultations. Bah! The folly is irritating, the shame is mortifying, and the whole thing is nauseating.

THE TELEGRAPH system of the United States is becoming a world's wonder. The Western Union operates more miles of telegraph line than all Switzerland, Sweden, Holland, Belgium, Hungary, Spain, Bavaria, Denmark, Norway, Portugal, Wurttemberg, Greece, and Great Britain combined. In area of territory Germany, Spain, Hungary and Great Britain nearly equal the United States, and they have a population nearly four times as great as that of the United States, and yet the Western Union alone operates more miles of line, and sends more messages annually, than all the lines in all these countries. The Western Union sends annually fifteen million messages, or one to two and a half persons in the United States, while all Europe, with seven and a half times the population of this country; or 300,000,000, sends only fifty million messages yearly, or one to six persons.

We have always believed, however, that the prices for telegraphing are entirely too high. The profits are out of all reason in comparison with the capital invested. The masses of the people are debarred the privilege of a frequent use of the telegraph. And yet more money would be made by cheaper rates, to say nothing of the great public benefit. The time is rapidly coming when the bulk of correspondence in this widely extended country, and, indeed, all over the world, must be done by telegraph instead of by mail, and the corporations must grant much cheaper rates, or the Government must control the telegraph lines as well as the mail lines. The telegraph monopoly is especially damaging to the spread of public intelligence by the prices they charge newspapers, thus increasing their price and decreasing their circulation.

THE DENHAM BULLETIN tells the Morgan railroad men that several of the principal merchants of that city have sent a delegation from each firm to the East with a view of establishing business houses on the line of the Pierce road near the San Marcos. This course they have deemed necessary to retain their business. The other darkness into which they are precipitated in consequence of their ignorance of the movements of the managers of the Gulf, Western Texas and Pacific Railway, and the delays of the progress of this road is detrimental to the best interests of its owners, who must surely have some cause to excuse themselves from the charge of not wanting of foresight and business sagacity in not rushing them with safety to regain what they have already lost by their tardiness.

The Bulletin further says that if Indiosola had been connected by rail with San Antonio two years ago, it would have now been the best paying road in the State; besides, the Pierce road never would have been built.

In another article the Bulletin says that all that San Antonio now needs to make her position secure is railroad connection with the bay, her nearest outlet to the sea. When her citizens have secured that important necessity, to her trade and commerce, the Antonio can bid defiance to all other interior towns in Western Texas. Without this connection the Bulletin thinks that her position will most with rival in other portions of Western Texas, who will endeavor to secure the trade of Northern Mexico that now centers in San Antonio.

"Does it pay to have a flag?" asks Harper's Weekly in one of its best cartoons, wherein Uncle Sam and Miss Columbia are represented as impugning, with evident disgust, a skeleton army and skeleton navy. The joke is all the better because our army has even now been reduced as it seldom has been since the Revolution for the support and training of skilled officers, who may form a nucleus of organization; if we should again come up to raise a real army, and get the bill which has passed the House proposed to reduce still further even this attenuated skeleton. Nevertheless, on the other hand, the people in European countries are ground down with taxation to support vast armies, the cause of Christian civilization, European peace with some regard to the world until great national armies are discontinued; but in war will not come while men wear hats.

THE DUCHESS OF EDINBURGH, daughter of the Emperor of Russia, and wife of the second son of Queen Victoria, Prince Alfred, Duke of Edinburgh, has had her position settled at last at the English Court, after much discussion. She is to be called Her Royal Highness (or Imperial Royal) Highness, and is to rank next to the Princess of Wales, except when the Royal Crown Princess of Prussia happens to visit England. The rule has hitherto been that the daughter of the sovereign took precedence over the wives of the sons, except in the case of the Princess of Wales. The Duchess of Edinburgh, however, is not only royal by marriage, but imperial by birth, and it is on this ground that a higher place has been assigned her. In Russia she was, after her mother, who is an invalid and lives in retirement, the first lady in the land.

THE Colorado and Brazos rivers have risen considerably, from far-off rains or melting snows.

It has not rained in the Indianola region for several months. Twenty-seven persons sailing on Lakes Ozoida and Ontadago were overtaken by a thunder-storm and drowned. The destruction of the Republic, or the dissolution of the Assembly, is now the programme of the Left in the French Assembly. Gen. Sherman goes to St. Louis in a few days. Congress decides that neither Pinchback nor Sheridan was elected to Congress from Louisiana. A great battle is about to be fought in Spain between the Carlites and the Republicans. All those engaged in the burning of alleged sorcerers in Mexico are in prison. Secretary Bristow is installed in the Treasury. The committee decides against any further appropriations for civil service reform. The National Republican Committee is soon to meet. The Grand Grove of Druids have just closed their session at Peoria Ill. The National Grove meets at Buffalo in August. There is apprehension of a general fight between whites and blacks at Memphis. The first order for shipment of corn from Kansas City to Liverpool via Galveston was 30,000 bushels. The Universalist Convention at Cleveland, O., was largely attended. The owners of the Durham colliers in England are evicting large numbers of their tenants who were of the striking miners. Two hundred and twenty-eight of these evicted families are camping in the fields.
