The Telegraph and the Express.

We have alluded to what appears to have been an arrangement effected by the leading Radical politician of the State, whereby the Austin Gazette and the Houston Age simultaneously attacked the Telegraph, and have kept up their hostile utterances without cessation ever since. It now appears that the tactics of this party extend still further. We last week called attention to his making use of the Houston local of the Galveston News, who is also local of the Age, as it has since appeared by the confession of that paper, to bring the National Democracy into disrepute so far as it was possible, by giving in his commendation, well knowing that to very many in Texas nothing would so soon cause offense as the favor of the Radical politicians. It now appears that the San Antonio Express, edited by Mr. Siemering, a former business partner of Mr. Tracy, and the only out and out Radical paper in Texas, has been taken into the plot, or has naturally fallen in, and it has added its favorable expressions for the same purpose, which the Age repeats day after day, with exceeding delectation. — Houston Telegraph.

The Telegraph, under the new regime, was intended to have been an entirely independent paper. We know whereof we affirm. Its present so-called Democratic crusade was inspired by the unexpected bait of the public printing. What the Telegraph says of the intrigues between Mr. Tracy and the Houston Age, Austin Gazette, and Galveston News, may or may not be true. We neither know nor care. But the Telegraph knows that the San Antonio Express is, and long has been, opposed to the whole Tracy-Austin ring, and that it has repeatedly so expressed itself within the last few weeks. The Telegraph knows, also, that the EXPRESS is National Republican, just as that paper claims to be National Democratic, and that the EXPRESS is as much opposed to the ultra-Radical Republican corporation of this State as the Telegraph is to the ultra-Radical (backwoods) Democracy now ruling Texas.

The Telegraph wilfully falsifies the position and purposes of the EXPRESS, and, while quoting from all other papers, is afraid to quote from the EXPRESS last its disingenuousness should be made manifest. As to the so-called Democracy of the Telegraph, it knows we have no respect for it. The Telegraph and Tracy have both called a certain series of national principles, involving the very essence of Republicanism, "national democracy," and have both agreed to support. There may be no concert between them, but the co-incidence amounts to the same thing.

Galveston and San Antonio Railroad.

In consequence of the rumors in our city that work had been suspended on this road, and the anxiety of our citizens to know the truth in relation to the matter, we telegraphed President Pierce to let us know the facts by return telegram. The following is the reply:

There is no truth in the rumor. The work is progressing vigorously.

The road will reach the San Marcos by the first of August, and so on. As the Ireland amendments are determined the road will go beyond.

So, all Western Texas is to suffer to please Ireland. We shall see. The railroad will come ahead anyhow.

French Revolution Imminent.

As we have frequently stated heretofore, the serious issue in the French National Assembly at the present time is the Republic or the Empire. The various parties with their various wings and sections have now fallen into line under one or the other of these standards. It seems as if either the Empire or the Republic would be declared within a short time, or rather, that in the contest between the two a violent and bloody revolution might break out at any time. The imperialists, who wish to place the Prince Imperial, son of Louis Napoleon, on the throne, have the advantage of being in possession of the government. President McMahon is a staunch Bonapartist.

On yesterday, in the French National Assembly, M. Giraud, deputy from Nievre and member of the Left, read a document which he stated had been circulated during the election in that department. The paper urges Bonapartist officials to confer all appointments in their gift on retired officers who are in favor of the election of the Bonapartist candidate, and adds that the Minister of Finance, M. Magne, has furnished a list of such officers to the government. Giraud demands honest inquiry into the affair.

Rouher disclaimed any knowledge of the document, and insinuated that it was fictitious. He declared himself in favor of an inquiry and would discuss the subject when the results of the investigation were presented to the Assembly. Gambetta accused Ministers Magne and Cesare of complicity in this discreditable business. The Bonapartist members of the Assembly endorsed Rouher's offer to discuss the matter, when investigated; Rouher then reminded the Chamber of the charges in relation to the improper and fraudulent contracts and appointments reported by the commission, on the acts of the September government against M. Gambetta. A violent scene followed. Gambetta replied that he had always answered questions of the "commission," but did not admit the right of the wretches with which term he branded the Bonapartists, to question him. The tumult and shouting which this reply produced, rendered Rouher's rejoinder inaudible.

Buffet threatened a vote of censure on Gambetta for the words he had spoken after the sitting. Gambetta and his friends were followed as they were leaving the Chamber and insulted by Bonapartists.

It is evident, also, that the young Prince Imperial has the sympathy, and, at least, the moral support of most of the European courts. The Empress Eugenie is the most popular woman in Europe, and she and her son are treated with marked cordiality by all the royal families. The Czar recently went to Chislehurst and visited the Empress Eugenie. It might mean no more than that the Czar, being a gentleman, wished to be polite to a lady who, some years ago, had extended to him magnificent hospitality; but, on the other hand, it might be an intentional manifestation of the belief of the Czar that ere long the Empress would be living in Paris again. It happened that the Prince Imperial was not at Camden House when the Czar arrived there. His Majesty expressed regret at his misfortune. The fact is that Napoleon IV was at his military school at Woolwich and had not asked for leave of absence. The Czar said that he wished to see him, and the Empress promised that his wish should be gratified. The Prince went to town and the Czar received him at Buckingham Palace. They had a long private conversation. Who shall say what passed between them? When the Czar last saw the Prince the latter was a boy of eleven years, and his father was believed to be the most powerful of European sovereigns. The boy is now a man, and his father sleeps in the little chapel at Chislehurst. There is a rumor that the Czar was greatly affected at this interview, and that the Prince went away with a strangely excited air.

Telegraphic.

Thad. Swift and wife were found murdered in bed five miles from Refugio. The people are arming, and lynch law retaliation is expected.

Capital punishment has been re-established in the State of Tamaulipas, Mexico. The negro, Hiram Galloway, who raped a little girl of Maj. Barnett, twenty miles north of San Antonio, was arrested in Austin, started for San Antonio, and has not been heard of since. He was probably lynched. It is thought the child cannot recover.

The negro Galloway was two years ago concerned with another negro in outraging a white lady at Seguin. His companion was hanged by a mob, but he escaped.

Wheat crop in Collin county turns out twenty to thirty bushels an acre.

The Houston delegation to Kansas City leave to-day.

Ex-Governor Throckmorton has been announced for Congress in the Fourth Texas District.
Boston, June 8.—George Wm. Curtis delivers an oration to-morrow night at the Music Hall, on Chas. Sumner. There will be musical services on the occasion, Miss Kellogg and Adelaide Phillips taking part.
London, June 8.—It seems that the Earl

of Yarborough is addicted to drinking, and that on Tuesday last the Deputy Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Lords, believing him to be in a sound condition than usual, coaxed him into a private room and left him there, and upon the return of the Earl was gone, and has not since been seen.

NEW YORK, June 8.—The will of William Shakespeare Caldwell, the millionaire, was admitted to the Surrogate's Court to-day. He leaves \$20,000 to the Right Rev. James Gibbons, Roman Catholic Bishop at Richmond, for his personal use, and also leaves him all his furniture and chattel property. He leaves \$5000 to the municipal government of Fredericksburg, Virginia, for the benefit of the poor at that place, and \$5000 to help support the Female Roman Catholic Orphan Asylum at Richmond, Va.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Charles Francis Adams in a letter to Senator Windom expresses, in the light of his wisdom as Erie Railroad Commissioner, dissatisfaction with both the McCrary bill to regulate transportation by rail as going a great deal too far, and with Mr. Windom's suggestion of a simple measure for investigation, which does not go far enough.

Adams does not believe it possible for any nine men, no matter how honest and experienced, to properly revise the running railroad tariff in use in the United States; and even if they could, that they would not be able to reach the root of the present difficulty. The difficulty is the natural outgrowth of the whole system and theory of railroad construction, and it cannot be eradicated without upsetting the system of private ownership, regulated by competition.

THE INDIANOLA RAILROAD is to be pushed to Austin, instead of to San Antonio. The Austin Statesman is authority for this, and that paper gives the agent of the road as its authority. So, the Indianola Bulletin may now find the milk in the coconut, and tell us how it makes the change. To San Antonio it makes but little difference. By its intersection with the Galveston road, San Antonio will have the advantage of two railroads, and two Gulf outlets, anyhow.

THE ROMAN CATHOLIC PILGRIMS from the United States have arrived in Rome, and accompanied by one hundred American Catholics resident in Rome, have visited the Vatican, where they were received and blessed by the Pope. To-day (Thursday) the Pilgrims will receive the Holy Eucharist from the hands of the Pope himself.

THE CONVENTION of Cotton Exchanges, representing all the cotton exchanges in the South, is now in session at Augusta, Georgia.

Then the over-lasting, irrepressible circus was on hand, and was, of course, the attraction of the crowd. Nevertheless, a large number of tickets to the supper were sold, many buying tickets who did not attend. Moreover, quite a number of the solid men of San Antonio, several of them Catholics too, were not present. We lay it down as a safe rule that where any public enterprise, for the benefit, adornment, and reputation of the whole city, is concerned, the people generally, and especially the mened men, with out regard to creed or party, should give it their help.

But, despite all these drawbacks, a fine company greeted the ladies at St. Mary's last night. The magnificent dining hall of the Menager Hotel was admirably adapted to the purpose; though it would have been better had the gas lamps been protected by shades, to keep the breeze from blowing them out. The entertainment commenced at 8:30 o'clock p. m., and continued until 2:30 a. m. A splendid string band under the direction of Prof Strobeck discoursed delightful music, to the inspiring sounds and thrilling rhythm of which the merry feet and graceful forms of the dancers kept time during the whole entertainment. The supper tables were spread across the hall at the farther end from the entrance, and the refreshment and flower stands were ranged on the sides. Delicious ice creams, sherbets, lemonades, and wine punches tempted the thirsty throng on every hand, and the beautiful forms and faces, and the smiling eyes, of those who had them for sale, were more tempting still. Who could resist so long as he had a dollar, or could borrow one? And then there was a post-office filled with important correspondence, at penny postage rates. There were lottery tickets, raffles, grab-bags, and various other tempting ways to make a fortune. And about eleven o'clock came the magnificent supper, free for all, and just at the time when all were delightfully hungry.

The whole affair went off charmingly, and a handsome sum was realized, though we have not learned the precise amount. It is very creditable to the ladies of St. Mary's, and to the young gentlemen who principally sustained them—too many of the solid old gentlemen having kept away.

NEW YORK, June 2.—Private letters to the friends of one of the American students drowned at Lausanne, Switzerland, give some details of the accident. One of the Crane brothers was found sitting upright in a boat nearly submerged, wrapped in a sail and frozen stiff, his hands clenching the sides of the boat so hard that the skin was torn from his fingers. As the two days intervening between the departure of the boys and the discovery of the body has been stormy and cold, it is supposed the boys discovered the approach of the storm, and on attempting to lower sail the smaller of the Crane brothers fell overboard and William Woodbury, who was an excellent swimmer, sprang overboard to save him, but that both were drowned. The remaining boy it is supposed wrapped himself in the sail for protection, but became drenched and frozen to death in the long-continued storm.

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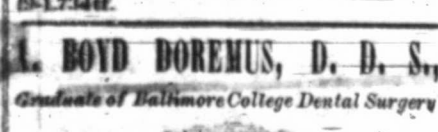

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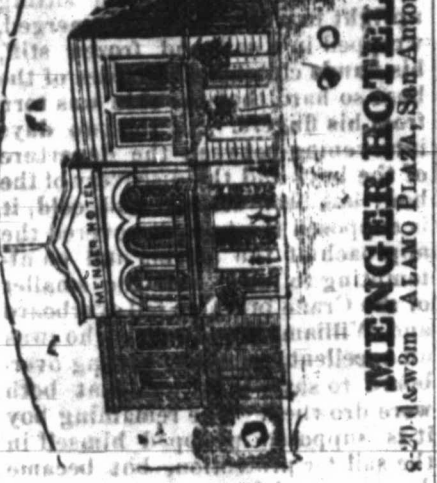
