An Austin Democrat on Coke.
 [Special Correspondence S. A. Herald]
 AUSTIN, June 22d.
 The International Bond decision "still hangs fire," but to-day it is announced that the Governor has appointed a new gunner to make it go off, and I suppose, in the course of the year, the explosion will be heard. His Excellency is evidently in no hurry about the matter, or he would not have gone so far off for a special judge to sit in this vexatious case. There are supposed to be some very good lawyers at Austin, but the Governor is in such a awful dread of the terrible "Ring," out of which so many small demagogues have made capital enough to get into the Legislature, that he would have gone to Lapland before he would have appointed an Austin man.

I must confess that I am not very hopeful in the matter. I have seen no occasion for the long delay since the question was submitted to the Court, and I have no idea that it has taken the judges a month or more to find out they did not agree. I cannot help thinking his Excellency has had a "finger in the pie" somehow.

I have heard it whispered that he might have desired the case held up until the new State bonds were sold in New York. Now, as the State Agent and State Treasurer have both returned without any money, though the Governor "meant what he said," when he announced to the world that it would be here within "hundred days," some decision of the case may be expected in the course of time and, probably, unfavorable to the Road. I do not suppose that the court will undertake to say that the bonds are illegal and the charter a nullity, but the case will be thrown off on some technical objection, such as, that the Court cannot mandamus the Comptroller, he being declared by our deligent Radical Constitution a part of the Executive Department, or that a mandamus against Bledsoe will not hold against Darden, or something of the kind. I shall be glad if I turn out to be a false prophet, but I have learned to distrust men in high station, and doubt whether they always "mean what they say," or know, half the time, what they are saying.

I voted for Gov. Coke with a great deal of pleasure, believing him perfectly sound on the Railroad questions, as upon all others of vital interest, but my faith in his infallibility is somewhat shaken.

The Democracy of Texas, who so triumphantly elected him, must give him their support in all things right, but they must not attempt to shoulder any of his short comings or misdoings. They cannot afford this. If the Governor attempts to play the role of Davis over again, and to imitate his interference in any and every thing, small and large, he must be checked on his "high horse" and reminded that he had better go slower and surer, or he may break down before he gets half way over the four-mile track.

I hope he will take it kindly that one of his old Democratic friends, who wanted him nominated and vouched for his soundness, has the courage to point this out and give him a timely warning.

England has now 36,000,000 spindles in her mills, with nearly 400,000 looms, and 650,000 workmen. Next comes the United States, with 5,000,000 spindles; France, 5,700,000; the German Zollverein, 4,300,000, of which Alsace possesses 1,700,000; Russia, 2,000,000; Switzerland, 1,800,000; Austria, 1,400,000; Spain, 1,400,000; Belgium, 600,000; Italy, 500,000, and over 2,000,000 for other countries. According to the report of M. Alcan made in 1867, the number of spindles used in cotton spinning was 58,850,000, which number has increased now to 63,700,000. Estimating the amount of capital invested at \$10 in gold per spindle, we find that \$637,000,000 is invested in the industry, and some \$160,000,000 is annually paid to 1,200,000 workmen.

 LONDON, June 25.—Count Bis marck summons the King of Bavaria to renounce against the separation tendency of the Bavarian policy. If he continues obdurate, a

convention of German royalty will be called with a view to deterring him.
 PARIS, June 25.—At a banquet in commemoration of the birth-day of Gen. Hoche, Gambetta gave the toast to the Republic and made a calm and moderate speech, he urged all to give their sincere support to the Conservative Republican policy, which was opposed to Cesarism at home and to the adversaries of France abroad. Jules Favre spoke of the frequent victories of the republican party, and declared that the whole of France had become republican. A toast to ex-President Thiers, was drunk with enthusiasm. The Count of Montalivet who was a minister under Louis Philippe, has written to Casimir Perrier, declaring that the salvation of France imperatively requires the loyal acceptance of republican men.

The Coke Financial Collapse.

The Austin Statesman of the 25th instant presents the financial condition of the State in a truly alarming light. Treasurer Dorn who left for New York some weeks since to deliver the bonds and bring back the first instalment of money arising from them, has returned without a dollar, and undoubtedly looks upon the prospect for relief as very gloomy. State Financial Moody, also left New York on the 19th instant, without having effected one thing for which he was appointed. He has neither been able to sell bonds or borrow money upon them.

The Statesman says that the result of this matter is truly alarming. Not a dollar in the Treasury, except what is immediately taken up to pay some of the force of the administration. In fact there has not been money there to pay such dues in full, and the school fund has been drawn upon to meet the necessity. The revenue is now indebted to the school fund over one hundred thousand dollars, and the immediate danger presents itself, under the appropriation of five hundred thousand dollars to be paid out of the school fund, that all the money is not there to meet the demand. If money does not come in immediately, and the counties make their requisitions at the same rate as they are now making them, the school money will give out before four hundred thousand dollars of it is distributed.

The Statesman also says: Had some leading financial man of New York city been entrusted with the sale of bonds, it is possible the Governor's promise might have been made good. Difficulties were in the way, and it required a man of weight in the right quarter to carry the negotiation through to a success. Col. W. J. Hutchins of Houston, to whom the financial agency was first offered, refused to take it, for private reasons, but said that the very bill which authorized the sale of bonds also contained a feature—that of legislating against certain State creditors—which would prove a clog to the sale of the bonds.

SAN ANTONIO HYGIENIC INSTITUTE.—We commenced in the EXPRESS to set forth the importance and value of such an institution before we knew that anybody else had ever entertained the idea. Afterwards, Dr. Bille, of New Orleans, and formerly from Paris, came along, and seeing the suggestions of the EXPRESS, and observing for himself the suitability of this vicinity, resolved, before leaving, to engage in the enterprise. The following is from the Austin Statesman.

We learn, that it is the intention of Dr. Bille in a month to return to San Antonio to open there a hygienic institute for the reception of invalids from all parts of the country. It is, as recently very ably argued by the San Antonio Express, an institution much needed there, and we sincerely congratulate our sister city, that they have been fortunate enough to secure permanently for them a physician as distinguished and as well known for skill and success as Dr. Bille, under whose management there is no doubt but what such an institution will be prosperous, and both a blessing to the afflicted and of great value to the commercial interests of San Antonio.

Dr. Bille writes that he is in earnest about this institution. He says that he will go from Dallas to Cincinnati and New York to select the furniture and apparatus. He will build of lumber, in the pavilion style, many small cottages, containing a bed room and parlor, with a nurse-room in the attic, so that each family can have its own house. In the main building there will be only offices, three Russian baths, dining room, ball room, and batheless bed rooms. He intends to engage in New York a band to give concerts every evening, and a *soiree dante* once a week. The grounds will be handsomely laid out, and gradually

ornamented. He hopes to open by the first of November next.

We shall be proud of the success of this enterprise, especially as it was first suggested by the EXPRESS. We have long desired to see an institution where invalids could be properly nursed and treated, and where the latest discoveries of medical science could be effectively applied, especially in the case of consumptive persons. There is no such an institution in all this country, and ordinary medical practice does not cover these cases at all. If such an institution is properly established and conducted here, invalids of all classes will flock here from all parts of the country by scores of thousands, much good will be done, and San Antonio advantaged.

Telegraphic.

CORSICANA, June 24.—Alb. Love was shot at by some unknown person on Sunday night. Love returned the fire, but without effect. Alb. Love is the son of the late Col. W. M. Love, who was shot and killed at his home in this county, by a man named A. Barrackman, last year. It is supposed that the attempt upon the life of A. Love, on Sunday night, was made by the friends of this man. Barrackman and his brother-in-law, Ham Anderson, were killed a few weeks since in Comanche county.

John Wesley Hardin, a cousin of both Hardin and Anderson, was in this county last week. He was chief in command of the Comanche county desperados, but escaped the fate of some of his comrades. Joe Parker, the 2d in command, and a man named Taylor, were here with him.

This is the third time that Alb Love has been shot at, and much excitement prevails in consequence of this last attempt to murder him.

DENVER, June 24.—There was a meeting held at Puebla last evening, at which Houston was represented, where an important discussion was had in reference to narrow gauge railroads. This question is intimately interwoven with the commercial future of the country, and attracts large attention here.

Some of the delegates started on an excursion to Pike's Peak last night, and are expected back to-night.

The Colorado Springs have been visited, and important notes taken of this feature of this very attractive section.

Brownsville, June 24.—Deputy Hide Inspector Rock is in the northern part of Cameron county with a small party. He has seized 265 stolen hides, and asks for help from the military to prevent the thieves from recapturing them. He reports much thieving and a large number of hides secured in the woods.

MANITOU, Col., June 24.—The delegations, excepting two members—Messrs. Evans and Luckelt, who returned home yesterday morning—arrived at the foot of Pike's Peak yesterday afternoon all well, and, enjoyed sight-seeing they never dreamed existed on earth, one being the Garden of the Gods, through the gate of which they safely passed. Several members of the delegations intend taking a view of the surrounding country from the summit of the Peak. We reach Denver to-night, Kansas City on Friday.

AUSTIN, June 25.—Col. Baylor and other frontiersmen are here. The appointment of Jones to the majorship of the frontier battalion does not appear to give satisfaction to the frontier people, and the first appointment of Quartermaster was also considered mal apropos. The feeling among the veterans, who desire to cash their hard earned warrants, is not particularly encouraging either. Fifty cents on the dollar is not much to boast of. Heavy shower to-day.

CINCINNATI, June 24.—The Cincinnati Cotton Exchange has decided to join the National Cotton Exchange, and will send two delegates annually to the Convention.

BREILIN, June 24.—Ten Prussian bishops are in attendance upon the Roman Catholic Conference at Fulda. The sees of Cologne, Posen and Traves are represented by deputy bishops, those bishops being in prison.

MADRID, June 24.—A band of Carlists made an attack upon Bell Mount in Tarragona, yesterday, and the garrison, to avoid the burning of the place, surrendered. The insurgents made a demand upon the authorities for \$6000, and took off several persons, stating that they would hold them as hostages for the payment of the money. They were followed by a force of Republican troops, who overtook them and killed twenty.

Texas News.

The Midland Railroad delegation from New Orleans has arrived in Waco. The annual meeting of the denomination of Christians in this State, will be held with the Church at Waco on the Friday before the second Sunday in July.

Dr. B. Hahn, a representative of a leading German paper of Chicago, is in Galveston.

Mrs. Anna Dimmock has arrived in Galveston, and is a guest at the Cosmopolitan.

The President has nominated A. G. Mollo to the office of Postmaster at Fort Worth, Texas. J. H. Lawless was killed by horse-thieves, ten miles of San Saba. Mr. Lawless had his horses stolen by them, and one of his neighbors saw them with the horses and reported to Mr. L. He with

other parties took their stand across the Colorado river, waiting for them to cross, as they learned they would during the night. When they arrived at the top of the hill Mr. L. halted them, at the same time firing at them, three in number. One of the party wheeled his horse, firing his pistol at Mr. L., the ball taking effect in his head, killing him.

Street preaching is about to be commenced in Austin by several well known clergymen.

Considerable excitement exists in Austin about the election for city marshal. The Democrats have made it a party matter.

The Galveston and Houston delegation have had a grand time in Denver City, Colorado.

Gov. Coke has been up to Waco, and on his arrival there he was of course called on for a speech, which he made, much of it being devoted to defending himself from the strictures of the press on his course up to the public printing. The Governor claims great credit for his achievement in the matter of saving money for the people, and blows considerably about what he has done generally—all of which we think in rather bad taste. His acts should speak for themselves, or at least not be applauded by himself. The Austin Statesman criticises the Governor's speech with sharpness, but we think with justice.—*Pleasanton Stock Journal.*

MR. ALFRED H. KEAN, formerly of Virginia, died of consumption at Pleasanton a few days since.
