A Texas Official Unknowingly Captures Two Notorious Kansas Criminals.

S. P. Wade, Sheriff of Shawnee county, Kansas, and C. L. Vanderpool, Deputy United States Marshal for the District of Kansas, arrived at Barnum's Hotel yesterday morning, from a professional trip to Kansas, connected with which is one of the most interesting stories ever told in connection with police affairs.

Over a year ago Samuel Ashmore, a physician doing business in Topeka, murdered his wife, and was incarcerated in the Shawnee County Jail, from which he escaped, only to be recaptured. Confined with him in the same institution was E. B. Place, who had been arrested by the United States authorities for passing counterfeit money, and in February last, they both managed to break jail, and proved successful in getting out of the country. During the latter part of May, information was received that Ashmore and Place had been arrested in Mexico by Cruz Carson, Chief of Police at Brownsville, Texas, who is evidently a shrewd and cunning officer.

It appears that Chief Carson was working up a murder case that had been perpetrated in Cameron county, Texas, when he accidentally ran across three Americans in Matamoros whom he suspected of being the men for whom he was searching. The Americans in question were Ashmore, who was following his profession as physician; Place, who was engaged in repairing sewing machines, and the perpetrator of the Cameron murder; whose name escaped Mr. Vanderpool's memory. Carson called upon Mr. Thomas F. Wilson, the American Consul, and represented to that gentleman that he had a description of some murderers which corresponded with the men in question, and asking for assistance to arrest them. The representative of the Mexican government in Matamoros was applied to, and he detailed two Mexican officers to aid Carson in effecting the desired arrest. Accompanied by the Mexicans, Carson visited Ashmore's room and found him alone. He informed the American that he had been arrested by the Mexicans for stealing a sewing machine, and understood that it was an instrument which at one time had been repaired by Ashmore's friend Place. Having purchased the machine, instead of stealing it, he desired his countrymen to help him out of the scrape by identifying it. Ashmore's reply was, "All right, as soon as they come in we will go with you. We don't like to see an American in the hands of the Mexican sons-of-a-bitch." Place and the third party shortly afterwards arrived, and as soon as the case was explained to them all hands started for police headquarters.

On arriving there Carson turned and said to Ashmore and Place, who were walking behind, "Murder will out, boys, won't it?" Ashmore appeared thunderstruck, and throwing up both hands ejaculated, "I know it," and ran off at the top of his speed. The other two men were retained. The Kansas murderer succeeded in escaping that night, and the next morning was found concealed in a sawmill. When brought before the United States Consul he stated that he had been going by the name of Henry Devitt Anthony, but that instead of murdering anybody in Texas, he was wanted for the killing of his wife in Kansas. Place was known by the name of Jones in Matamoros, but on being questioned acknowledged that his proper cognomen was E. B. Place.

"E. B. Place" soliloquized the detective, "then you are also wanted in Kansas, for passing counterfeit money."
 The third prisoner, as before stated, proved to be the Texas murderer. Ashmore stated that he was willing to return to the States without a requisition, but Place demurred, stating that, before deciding what course to pursue, he would like to see a friend. After a consultation with that individual, Place also consented to return without a requisition, and both men were taken across the river and incarcerated in the Brownsville jail, to await the arrival of the Kansas authorities.

On the 31st of May, Marshal Vanderpool and Sheriff Wade left Topeka for Kansas City. From the latter city, they went to Galveston. From Galveston, the officers went back to New Orleans, where they

took the steamer for Brazos Santiago, and, from there, a steamer to Point Island, Texas, 6 miles distant. Thirty miles more by rail brought them to Brownsville, where they found their men and at once started back.

Ashmore acknowledges having murdered his wife, and states that the least he expects is imprisonment in the Penitentiary. The case against him is said to be a very strong one.

NEW YORK, June 24.—A letter from London says the Archbishop of Canterbury's bill, for the better regulation of Church service, is likely to lead to very serious consequences. The bill has been prepared, it is rumored, under the direction of the Queen, and is intended to check ritualistic practices, now so largely prevalent. The ritualists are furious about it, and declare that if it is carried, the immediate consequences will be the secession of a large number, both of clergymen and laymen, from the Established Church, and the organization of a Church of their own, with one or two ex-colonial bishops at their head.

Stars and Meteors.
 At certain seasons meteors dart across the firmament between the earth and the fixed stars. But they quickly vanish, while the stars remain constant. AN INCIDENT occurred in the District Court this morning which is very significant and very instructive to all who are thoughtful enough to try to arrive at the philosophy of the present terrible state of immorality and crime now prevalent in Texas. Felipe Flores had been indicted for "keeping a disorderly house," that is a house of ill fame where low and bad characters congregate. The defense offered to prove that the place had been visited by men of the first standing and respectability, mentioning particularly the name of Judge, now Governor Richard Coke. The court ruled the evidence out. We had heard that during the canvass last fall, Judge Coke, when at San Antonio, had got so drunk that he pulled his coat off, and addressed the audience, including many ladies, in his shirt sleeves; but this midnight visit to a Mexican bagnio was new to us. This is the man who denounced all Republicans as scoundrels, who is defended by the pious Houston *Telegraph*, and to whom the pious pastor of the Methodist Church in Austin offered his house of worship last winter to hold his Legislature in.

The Treatment of Mr. Honey at Belton.

AUSTIN, June 27, 1874.
Hon. Richard Coke Governor, Austin, Texas:

Dear Sir—In response to your request through Col. J. W. Robertson of this city, I have the honor to make the following statement of the facts bearing upon the indignities to which I was subjected while at Belton, Bell county, on Sunday night, the 14th instant.

As the presiding elder of what is known as the Waco District, West Texas Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, a district comprising both white and colored churches, I visited Belton for the purpose of holding a quarterly conference with our colored church. Reaching Belton on Saturday, I put up at the hotel, and on Sunday morning held my meeting without any interference.

In the evening I visited and took tea with the family of the Pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and accompanied the family at night to their church service, leaving my umbrella at the house by mistake. After service, I returned with the family to the parsonage after my umbrella, and, on my way from thence to the hotel, I was attacked by some ten men, armed and masked, who, against my earnest protestations and resistance, dragged me about one half mile to the rear of the town, to a deep hole in the creek, where they attempted to take my watch and other valuables, but which they decided from my resisting them.

They then took me up bodily and threw me into the creek twice, after which they ran away and left me alone.

The only reason assigned for this act was the remark dropped by one of the mob: "We'll teach you not to come to Belton to preach to niggers," and "If you come again we'll kill you."

I ask, not so much on my own behalf as in the interests of the State, and the church I represent, that your Excellency take cognizance of this matter to the end that protection can be guaranteed to myself and others, prosecuting my calling, and that punishment may be visited upon all such transgressors of the law.

Now, we ask every honest and good man, of whatever party, who loves his State, and wishes to promote its prosperity, to consider the bearings of this outrage upon the reputation and welfare of the State and of the South. In the first place, the Bell county Democracy boast that theirs was "the banner county" for Coke. During the canvass and election a Republican could not show himself in that county without being insulted, and running the risk of being mobbed. During the canvass Coke delivered in Belton

the bitterest, most vindictive, and malignant speech we ever heard in the State, boiling over with the froth and fury of his hatred to the United States Government and its friends, and endeavoring to infuriate the mob against the Republicans of the State. During the canvass, Coke exulted, in his speeches, over the murder of a lieutenant of the State Police in his own town of Waco. His supporters in the Legislature, in the spirit of a furious vandalism, destroyed the measures and agencies adopted by the Republican administration for the suppression of violence and crime. "Let the people (that is, the Coke Democracy) get control of the government, and all will be right." That is what they said.

The result is what all far-seeing, wise and good men could easily foretell. The State is over-run with violence, lawlessness, bloodshed, murder, assassination, and the killing of helpless prisoners by bloody-minded mobs. Bell, Coke's "banner county," leads in this "rule of the wealth, intelligence, and virtue of the State," that is the rule of the Coke mob, for every desperado voted for Jim. They break down the jail door in Belton, and shoot to death nine helpless prisoners confined in the dungeon. War between rival mobs is being waged in various counties, men without number are being murdered, and mobs murder as many more, under the pretence of preserving order.

And now, to crown all, the Coke mob in Belton way-lay on Sabbath night the Presiding Elder of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, attended church with him, and returned home with him. They thus insult him, and intimate to him that he associates with a man only fit to be mobbed and drowned like a dog. What can be said against the Ku-Klux law now? What will be the opinion of the North and of Europe of all the clamorous assertions of the Cokeites of Texas that they are ready to receive all immigrants "with open arms"? What now can be said about those troubles "foisted upon the Radicals"? What now can be said about "Radical lies to injure the State abroad"? What now can be said about the infamy of "Radical calls for military protection"?

And last of all, what will be thought throughout the Christian world of the influence for good of the churches and clergy of the South? A reign of terror has come in with Coke, and no man's life is safe, if he freely utters his opinions.

Telegraphic.

AUSTIN, June 27.—The outlaw, John Wesley Hardin, was here three nights ago. Financial Agent Moody has arrived.

Houston, June 27.—The City Council appropriated \$1500 a year to keep the State Fair Park open, and is considering the purchase of the Eucalyptus tree from California, at \$40 a pound for the seed, or \$50 a thousand for the trees.

Removed that Col. Gustave Cook is to be made Criminal Judge.

Brownsville, June 27.—Tom Blanco, for forgery, was delivered, on requisition, to the Mexican authorities.

Deputy Inspector Rock returned to-day. The stolen hides captured are on the road escorted by soldiers. Three arrests were made for violation of the stock law.

KANSAS CITY, June 27.—The delegations have just arrived, all well. They will only visit Sedalia on Monday, and reach home Wednesday, though invitations have been extended by the officers of the different railroads to ride to Hannibal, St. Joe and St. Louis, Missouri; Chicago and Quincy, Illinois; Lawrence, Leavenworth, Atchison, and Topeka, Kansas; and Omaha, Nebraska.

This city was much aroused yesterday by the fact of three masked highway men robbing several citizens on the suburbs, making them stand and deliver in perfect Claude Duval style. It is believed they are the James boys.

A farmer named Earle, living about five miles east of this city, while driving in from a field with a load of hay Friday, was completely riddled with buckshot. No clue to the perpetrator.

SHERMAN, June 27.—Ex-Governor Throckmorton and Judge Hare, congressional aspirants in this district, spoke here to-day; Throckmorton only explaining his course as attorney for the Texas Pacific, as well as his railroad action generally. He referred to twenty-three years of his public record.

CHARLESTOWN, W. Va., June 27.—President and Mrs. Grant arrived at 3 P. M. A salute was fired, and a speech of wel-

come was delivered by Col. Benjamin Smith. The President, in response, said he had long been contemplating this visit, but affairs of State prevented him, and regretted his stay would have to be brief. He has quarters with his cousins, Col. and Mrs. Swan.

A large crowd met him at the depot. President and Mrs. Grant held a reception this evening at Col. Swan's.

CLEVELAND, O., June 27.—The business meeting of the North American Saengerbund has decided to hold a fest every three years, instead of biennially. The next fest is to be held at Loniaville in 1877. Tonight the last concert was given, in which the singing was by separate societies. The attendance was fair and the music good. To-morrow the Saengerfest closes with a picnic at the Northern Ohio Fair Grounds.

General News.

THE SYRACUSE HORROR.—The disaster at the Central Baptist Church festival, at Syracuse, N. Y., by which fourteen were killed outright, and one hundred wounded, is thus described: "The number in the supper room is variously estimated at from 250 to 500, mostly grown persons. At the time the floor gave way the children of the congregation were in one of the ante-rooms, being prepared for the 'Ancient Concert.' But for this fact the list of dead must have been very much larger, as many of the helpless little ones would have been crushed to death in the mass of humanity, crowded into the V-shaped vortex, formed by the falling timbers. At the moment of the falling of the floor the scene within the parlor was one of happy enjoyment. While all were pleasantly engaged, without a single sign of warning, the floor suddenly sank beneath them, and in a moment all were hurled into a struggling mass of humanity, intermixed with falling timber, furniture, etc., and in utter darkness. The gas having been extinguished by the crushing of the gas pipes. In an instant after the fearful descent had been made all was silent as a grave, but immediately after heart-rending appeals for help were to be heard from hundreds of those who were in agony. Immediately after persons were seen issuing from the doors and windows, which were smashed out by frightened people, and an alarm was sounded. The uninjured within the church who were able to free themselves from the mass, began at once to assist in rescuing others. The firemen and police were quickly at hand, and labored nobly in the work of rescue.

The scene within the building was terrible in its details, and that without the edifice heart-rending indeed. Fathers and mothers searching for their children, husbands looking for wives, wives inquiring for husbands, brothers for sisters, and children for their parents, of whose fate all were uncertain, and in dread. Quietly but rapidly the work of extricating people was carried on by the aid of lanterns. As fast as the living and dead were rescued they were passed out through windows and doors where ready hands assisted to convey the dangerously injured and dead to physicians, offices and neighboring houses. The excitement without the church was terrible, and as each body was being carried to adjoining houses the mass swayed back and forth, all terribly anxious to ascertain who it was, and whether dead or alive.

At the height of the excitement not less than 10,000 people were crowded into Montgomery and Jefferson streets, and in the adjoining premises.

At Columbia College, Mo., the great subject of comment is the taking of class honors and the law prize by the female graduate, Miss Julia F. Ripley. When she took a Greek prize, some years ago, her honor was surrounded throughout the land, but now that she has taken the valedictory of her class and the first law prize, and bids fair to carry off the Stephens medal in oratory on the commencement stage, her admirers and the advocates of equal female suffrage know no bounds for their joy.

[COMMUNICATED]

The adjourned meeting of the Agricultural, Stockraising and Industrial Association of Western Texas, held last Saturday night at Firemen's Hall, was well attended, and the proposed Fair very generally, and with much animation discussed. The following extract from the report of the Board of Trustees expressed the determination of the Association to hold a Fair next fall, and to make it a grand success.

"We, as a Board, have fully considered the matter, and sounded public opinion, and find this community nearly unanimous in favor of a Fair, and we have determined to carry it through, and make it a grand success. We are promised the co-operation of the Laborer's Association, Turners, Saengerfest, Literary Society, Fire Companies, Alamo Rifles, Irish American, and the Auxiliary Agricultural Association in the surrounding country, and with all these a failure is simply impossible. We have adopted the plan proposed by our warm friend, H. Green, Esq., which is, to hold the Fair on the grounds surrounding the Literary Hall, and to use the Hall for paintings, statuary, and other works of art, needle work, jewelry, and such other fair or fancy articles as require to be kept dry and perfectly secure. We propose to build temporary sheds around the entire lot, divided into apartments and booths in which merchants may display their goods and sell them either on the spot, or by samples from their stores; saloons, cigar stands, photographing, restaurants, Mexican suppers, ice-cream, candy shops, auction stand, etc., etc., may be opened by all who choose to participate. The field, orchard and dairy will be well represented; our merchants will also show their handy work. Many new mechanical and agricultural labour-saving machines will be here from abroad. The plan proposes to hold exhibitions at night as well as day; the place will be lighted by gas, and the articles to be seen, and amusements offered, will be sufficient to draw a crowded house, every night. The Fair will also be held at the San Pedro Springs, during the hours of day, where showing and testing horses and other stock, racing, trotting, hurdle races, best riding, and examining stock, etc., will make it very interesting. We propose to give sufficient premiums to secure a large attendance of the best stock in Western Texas. We shall require about 30,000 feet of lumber, etc., and we ask the Association to make an appropriation of two thousand dollars. A committee of three, consisting of Messrs. H. Green, Ed. Braden, and J. T. Brackenberg, was appointed to solicit donations towards defraying the expense of the Fair. Other matters of importance to the Association, and especially to Western Texas generally, were the meeting adjourned. Monday, June 29, 1874.
