THE editor has been attacked with violent fever, and this must be our excuse for the paucity of editorial and local matter. He has walked too much in the sun in the heat of the day.

JUDGE JAMES H. BELL made a great legal argument in behalf of the International Railroad before the Supreme Court a few days since.

The Fourth of July was finely celebrated at San Pedro Springs, and, although we were present, are not able to give the particulars, as we have a burning fever to day.

SECRETARY BRISTOW is justifying the good opinion of his friends in the recent changes he has made with regard to leading officials. Mr. Charles F. Conant, who is named for Assistant Secretary, has been at the head of the warrant division for some years. He is still a young man. Probably no man in the department understands its relations with Congress better, or comprises more clearly the action pro and con of the money market and Treasury.

COL. DAVIDSON, commanding at Fort Sill, in reporting the late night attack by the Indians on the fort, says: "Now that I have received the authority to punish the Indians, under certain restrictions, for acts of certain aggression, I trust not to annoy the General with these details, but to be enabled to show some results."

THE CHURCH QUESTION IN GERMANY.—Time is not healing the ecclesiastical difficulty in Germany. The "blood and iron" policy has not been successful up to the expectation of its author. The Fulda bishops adhere to their old platform; and we have the promise of a document which may give Bismarck some trouble. The Bavarians cling to their old love, and indications are not wanting that the policy of persecution is defeating its purpose and strengthening, rather than weakening, the Catholic cause throughout the reconstructed Empire.

SLAUGHTER OF THE TREASURY CLERKS AND OTHERS.—The news from Washington is that about four hundred clerks and other employees in the Treasury Department, had one-half of those in the Bureau of Printing, are to be discharged on the 1st of July. They are to receive, however, two months' extra pay. The civil force of the War Department is to be reduced also about a hundred. The Department of State is to have a small increase. There was, and still will be, room enough for retrenchment in the departments and bureaus crowded with employees put in to accommodate Congressmen and leading politicians.

CANADIAN IMMIGRATION.—Some patriotic French Canadians have held a convention at Montreal with the avowed intention of inducing the Canadians who have found a home in the United States to return to their native land. Strong inducements were held out, but our

naturalized citizens felt themselves too well off in the enjoyment of liberty to desire to return to a land where a man may not express freely his opinions. Under these circumstances the Convention came to an end without practical result. If the French Canadians are really desirous of keeping their friends at home there is a very simple means at hand. Let them come into the Union. We shall be delighted to have them, and then their young men will not be forced to abandon their homes in order to enjoy liberty under the Stars and Stripes.

REPRESENTATIVE HALE returned to Washington and called on President Grant to thank him for his mark of confidence and friendship in tendering him the appointment of Postmaster General, but at the same time to respectfully withdraw his acceptance of that office. The President expressed his regret that Mr. Hale had come to that conclusion, as he had anticipated with him pleasant official relations.

Mr. Hale has been in Altoona for a few days, and thought that he would be able to enter on the duties of the position to day, as Creswell had made his arrangements to retire yesterday. He had recovered in a slight degree from the fatigue incident to the long session of Congress, but the excessive heat of the few days past has so weakened him as to compel him to decline the honor.

Telegraphic.

PLANO, July 3.—A negro was shot and instantly killed yesterday evening by one of his own color; jealousy was supposed to be the cause. The murderer is now in the hands of a justice of the peace.

ORANGE, July 3.—Judge Wm. Smith, one of our most valued citizens, and an old resident of this county, and formerly Representative from this district, in the State Legislature, was buried here yesterday with Masonic honors; he died the day before of congestion.

AUSTIN, July 3.—The Supreme Court has adjourned to meet on Monday, when a decision may be looked for in the International case.

The celebration of the Fourth will mainly consist of the Hibernian Benevolent Association Picnic and the banner presentation. The Germans celebrate also.

Prof. Millier arrives on to-night's train with 60,000 young shad for stocking the Colorado. A committee has been appointed to receive the Professor, and to assist him in selecting suitable places for the deposit of the fish.

The Hon. John Hancock has arrived at the Capital.

HEMPSTEAD, July 3.—Deputy Commissioners Mulliner and Mason, of the United States service, in charge of 60,000 shad from the Smithsonian Institute, arrived here this evening en route to Austin, to experiment in stocking the waters of Texas with this delicious fish. Twenty-five thousand were put in Clear Creek, a beautiful tributary of the Brazos, one mile east of Hempstead.

ST. LOUIS, July 3.—One hundred thousand visitors are in the city to witness the grand opening of the St. Louis and Illinois bridge on to-morrow. The hotels are overflowing, and the streets packed. The business places are magnificently decorated.

The procession will be the longest one ever known in America, and it is thought will extend over fifteen miles.

President Grant will not be here. Mayor Brown makes the opening address.

The first train went through the tunnel this evening.

NEW YORK, July 3.—Evan Randolph, of Philadelphia, holder of the four notes of Hoyt, Sprague & Co., having made application to have that firm declared bankrupt Judge Benedict granted an order to show cause. The order will be returned in a few days.

SALT LAKE, July 3.—The Montana stage was robbed at half-past eleven o'clock last night, at Big Dry Creek, 25 miles south of Pleasant Valley, by four masked men, armed with shot guns. The south coach was stopped first, and run into the brush on the side of the road, and held till the north coach came along. J. Jackson and a passenger by the name of Billings on the north coach were robbed. Billings lost \$360, and the robbers recognizing Jackson returned him his money. A passenger named Jones, on the south coach, was robbed of \$60. The treasure box of Wells & Fargo was broken open and everything of value taken out. The loss is not known.

JACKSON, July 3.—The customs authorities here are now exacting tonnage dues of two pence per ton upon vessels clearing for America, and one pence per ton upon all crafts sailing for European ports. No warning was given that these dues would be imposed, other than the decree published in the official gazette.

PHILADELPHIA, July 3.—The trustee for Jay Cooke & Co., has received a check from the President of the Oregon Steam Navigation Company for \$37,500 in gold, being the dividend on \$1,500,000 of stock. Other dividends will follow as the season

advances, as the company pays the surplus to stockholders monthly.

WASHINGTON, July 3.—The President has gone to Long Branch, N.J. leaves this evening. Bristow has gone to Kentucky to attend the funeral of a member of his family. Avery has assumed the functions of Chief Clerk of the Treasury.

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TEXAS NEWS.

GEN. STEEL.—Among the passengers on the stage from Gonzales Thursday evening was Adjutant-General Steel, who has come to De Witt county to investigate thoroughly the unhappy condition of things existing in this county. He has interviewed the citizens of this place, and will visit Clinton and other parts of the county, also Victoria and Indianola, to get a true expression of public opinion as regards the remedy to be applied to the case. We will not preoccupy the General's decision in the matter, but present indications tend to the assumption that State troops are to be stationed in this county to preserve the peace and assist the civil authorities in enforcing the laws. Gen. Steel has made a favorable impression so far, and it is generally presumed that he will pursue a judicious and effectual course in the premises, although he will be prevailed upon in many instances by contrary, injudicious and injurious counsils. The people of this county expect much good from the General's mission, and they look to its results with great solicitude.—Cuero Star.

COTTON WORM.—We have heard during the week that the caterpillars had already made their appearance in some sections of the county. Farmers should use the cotton worm destroyer and provide in time for Paris Green, etc. The weather is rather favorable for the growth of the insects.—Cuero Star.

The government will have to do something to preserve the administration building and guard-house from being destroyed by the river cutting away the bank along the front. A little work promptly done will save thousands of dollars to the government. Longer neglect will insure loss, and the total destruction of the property fronting the river. The old Bravo has no respect for the persons and property, and goes where it chooses if not combatted.

Our farmers cannot complain of a want of rain, for nearly every day for the past two weeks refreshing showers have fallen to different parts of the valley. We here are getting our share.

The grass out on the stock ranges is reported good. We have no doubt of it, for there is very little stock left now to make grass scarce, owing to the benevolence of our Mexican neighbors, who relieve the ranges from time to time of what they suppose to be surplus stock.—Brownsville Sentinel.

The Comanche Chief, published in the town of Comanche, 21st ult., says: The troubles which have existed in our county for some time seems to have all passed away, and the usual good order and quiet of the county restored. Some of the reckless band have crossed the dark river which separates them from a reckless life here, and the mysteries of the great hereafter; others have been lodged in jail and still others have fled to parts unknown. In justice to our section we should like that parties at a distance, and especially those contemplating a removal to this section, should understand that the parties who have been degrading in this section do not live here, and consequently it was more accidental than otherwise that the difficulties occurred at this place. Previous to this affair no county in the State could show a clearer record for law and order than ours. By a determined effort of the citizens the power of despotism has been broken, peace and order restored, and the prompt united efforts of the people will insure this happy state of affairs in the future.
