**SEVERE STORM.**

WASHINGTON, July 9.—About  
 half past 7 o'clock Saturday evening  
 there was a severe hurricane, the  
 wind and dust blinding those who  
 were in the streets, therefore ren-  
 dering travel very difficult. In a  
 few moments the entire city was  
 enveloped in a mass of hurriedly  
 moving dust, which forced its way  
 into open doors and windows, cov-  
 ering everything on which it fell  
 with a thick coat of dirt. Inside of  
 ten minutes the rain began falling,  
 which had the effect of settling the  
 dust in the streets. The results of  
 the storm are seen all over the city.  
 Large signs from business houses  
 were blown down. The flagstaff of  
 the National Hotel fell with a crash,  
 near several persons who were  
 standing on the pavement.

The steeple of the Metropolitan M.  
 E. Church, at least 100 feet high,  
 was much shattered, having been  
 moved five feet from its perpendi-  
 cular. It is now in a dangerous  
 condition, and may have to be re-  
 built. In addition to the destruc-  
 tion of street lamps, heavy plate  
 glass in show windows were broken  
 in several large show windows, and  
 several large show windows swept  
 from their fastenings. In a number of  
 cases trunks of trees were snapped by  
 the hurricane, and ornamental and  
 shade trees all over the city, includ-  
 ing a number in the Capitol and  
 President's grounds, and in public  
 parks, were either entirely destroyed  
 or shorn of branches. Five houses  
 in a row were completely stripped  
 of their roofs—not a plank or a  
 shingle remained. The roofs were  
 carried a distance of several hundred  
 feet.

Other similar incidents occurred.  
 Several carriages passing along the  
 streets were completely overturned,  
 one of the Lady occupants sustain-  
 ing a severe injury. The telegraph  
 wires to all points were prostrated.  
 While a number of colored children  
 were enjoying themselves in a hall,  
 the roof fell in caused by the wind  
 straining the rafters; although great  
 excitement ensued, only four of the  
 children were injured, and these  
 slightly. A Pennsylvania avenue  
 car was blown ten feet of the track.  
 The number of shutters ripped from  
 dwellings is innumerable. Great  
 anxiety was expressed for the river  
 excursionists, about 3000 in num-  
 ber, but the steamer arrived safe.  
 Several sail-boats were capsized on  
 the river, but no loss of life is report-  
 ed anywhere.

**Our New Minister in Berlin.**

The retirement soon to take place  
 of Mr. Bancroft, the generally re-  
 spected United States Minister, will  
 leave behind him a void most sen-  
 sible in the diplomatic world of Ber-  
 lin. As the hour of departure  
 draws near, his loss is more and  
 more felt—a loss impossible to be  
 replaced. With all deference to  
 the departing, we are obliged to  
 make known that our misgivings,  
 whether his nephew, Mr. Bankroft  
 Davis, will be the person most ap-  
 propriate among those named his  
 successor. Mr. Davis is the author  
 of the Alabama memorial, full of its  
 immense demands and claims, which  
 together with his conduct before the  
 Geneva Arbitration—as we are  
 bound frankly to declare—did not  
 meet with favorable response from  
 the European diplomats.—Cologne  
 Gazette.

The Herald learns that Harvey  
 Andrews, aged ten years, son of a  
 widow lady, living three miles and  
 a half east of this city riding in  
 company with Mr. Bankhead to a  
 neighbors, when the mule, upon  
 which the boy was riding, became  
 fretted from a stroke it received  
 from a halter strap in the hands of  
 its rider, and furiously pitched,  
 throwing the boy from its back with  
 one of his legs entangled in the  
 trace chain, the mule being in har-  
 ness as it had just been taken from  
 work. The mule started in a mad  
 run toward home kicking in every  
 jump and almost every kick being  
 received by the boy. When within a  
 hundred yards of the place the mule  
 stopped, and when the child was  
 picked up by its heart-broken moth-  
 er, and friends, every particle of  
 clothing had been torn from his body,  
 and on an examination of the  
 body, the back was found to be  
 broken in two places, the neck dis-  
 located, the skull fractured in sev-  
 eral places, one arm almost torn  
 from the shoulder, and the ribs of  
 the right side literally crushed in.

HARPER'S WEEKLY comes out very strongly against the Third Term Gov. Kemper, of Virginia, a Democrat, comes out in favor of it, as a choice of evils.

COL. GUSTAVE COOK, a lawyer of ability in Houston, is to succeed Judge Dodge as judge of the Criminal Court of Harris and Galveston counties. We hope he will not, hereafter, be so lenient to the men who engage in mob law murders.

THE Grangers have called a meeting of the farmers, of the fourth Congressional District to nominate a candidate for Congress. The Austin Statesman does not like it. Wonder how the Waco Examiner, Coke's organ, will take it.

THE Corpus Christi Valley truly says that the West is very generally claimed for inflation, but that a careful count shows that a majority of the western papers sustain the President's veto. It is only in the South that the majority want an increase of paper. And no people will suffer more than the South if they succeed.

Baker of the Galveston Mercury, speaks of having denounced some one's "potty meanness." A professional corruptionist is a nice man to set himself up as a corrector of "meanness."—Waco Register.

Yet, to that man's "meanness" was mealy sacrificed the principal Republican daily newspaper we had in the State—the Houston Union. "To what base uses" etc.

It was Washington, a Southern man, that led the army to victory. It was Jefferson, a Southern man who was the author of the immortal Declaration of Independence, and it was Patrick Henry, Lee, Carroll, Pinckney and others from the South, who sustained him in carrying it through the Continental Congress.—Marshall Age.

How wrong it is that those great patriots and statesmen should be belittled by sectional appellations. They were more than "Southern men"—they were Americans.—Waco Register.

The fiction of sectionalism has always been the base of the South. In the insane pursuit of sectional power and triumph, she has cast away her legitimate share of national greatness and glory. This tendency, born of the pride of the local aristocracy, fostered by the extreme doctrine of States rights, and aggravated and intensified by the slavery interest, has now, happily for the South and the country, nothing to sustain it. Sectionalism is dead, thank good, and the Nation will now take up her line of march abreast with the American Nation, and in harmony with Christian progress and cosmopolitan civilization.

The Galveston News says of Coke, that he should "come forth, in the full equipment of his high office, like an incarnate expression of the laws, with an arm swift, resistless and unrelenting to strike down evildoers and law defiers, and equally strong and unflinching in the protection of the weak, the peaceable and the law abiding."

That is exactly the way Mr. Coke

does not come forth, and exactly the way Gov. Davis used to come forth, but he had no such majestic writing as that, in the News, to sustain him in it, if our memory serves us.—Waco Register.

It is now as clear as the shining of the sun, that had Governor Davis received the support and co-operation of the press and people of the State in his honest efforts to suppress lawlessness and crime, the State would never have been cursed as it now is with bloodshed, murder and lynch law. These things now are but the harvest the State is reaping from the seed sown by Democratic newspapers and politicians during the Davis administration. The State is suffering the punishment decreed by retributive justice for supporting those who have broken down the laws and degraded the courts, and have put the apostles of desperadoism in the seats of law and justice.

CORPUS CHRISTI, as we are glad to learn from the Nueces Valley, is growing city. That paper says, that the Postoffice in Corpus Christi was opened after the war, September 1, 1865. The first quarterly returns were made Dec. 31, of that year, eight and a half years ago. The office was of the fifth class. The salary of the Postmaster \$87,50. The income of the office in that quarter and fraction of quarter, four months, was \$1,75, box rent. Postage on newspapers \$3,54; stamps sold, \$63.25—in all \$68,54, of which the Department had \$56,67 and the office \$21,87.

In contrast with this "day of small things," which determined the salary in 1865, take the report on which the salary for the coming two years is based, viz: Box rent, \$193,73; newspapers \$105,06; stamps sold \$1,641,18. On this report the office passed on Wednesday, July 1, to a second class office. The amount of salary decides the class of an office, and it requires an addition of \$1000 to change the class in all above the fourth.

Since Corpus Christi has got her ship channel in working order, and ocean steamers can come up to her wharves, her growth will become more rapid than ever. We are glad to note every indication of the development of Western Texas, which is ultimately to become the most desirable region of the whole South-West. Let San Antonio, Indianola, Corpus Christi, Brownsville, El Paso, and other Western towns, work together for the good cause.

### Telegraphic.

CHICAGO, July 7.—The grand jury found a true bill against Dr. Earl, the abortionist, for murder in the first degree.

ST. PAUL, July 7.—A courier from General Custar's expedition, telegraphing from Bismarck, reports the command to be twenty miles out on the fourth. At noon the weather was exceedingly warm, five soldiers and teamsters were sun struck.

AUGUSTA, Ga., July 7.—Hon. Alexander H. Stephens announces that he will not be a candidate for re-election to Congress, on account of his health.

NEW YORK, July 7.—A spark from a rocket exploded a pile of fire works at Washington square. Five thousand people were panicked and four seriously injured by rocket sticks. Many were bruised by the rush.

LONDON, July 7.—The Earl of Dalhousie died yesterday: aged seventy-three years.

PARIS, July 7.—Dispatches from Spain report that 4000 Carlists attacked Terrel last Saturday, and after twelve hours' engagement they were obliged to retire with a loss of forty killed, sixty wounded and 200 prisoners. The Republicans lost nine killed and fifteen wounded.

MADRID, July 6.—The Pope has not yet replied to the congratulatory message of the Captain-General of the Carlist army, sent on the anniversary of his elevation to the Pontificate.

MERIDIAN, July 4.—The passenger train on the Vicksburg and Meridian Railroad ran off the track this morning, near Edwards' depot. Two children were killed and three persons dangerously wounded.

PATERSON, N. J., July 6.—During the storm in Bergen county the hall that fell was of extraordinary size, and crushed through strong roofs. Van Rider's ribbon mill, at Pascoek, had a thousand window panes broken.

BROWNSVILLE, July 6.—Consul Wilson says that the Legislature of Tamaulipas reinstated Cortes as Mayor of Matamoros. The news caused considerable excitement to-day.

Cortina's friends are jubilant. There was a man killed in Matamoros to-day.

Governor Canales opposed the re-instatement of Cortina.

STONEY CREEK, Conn., July 6.—The train from Connecticut River for New Ha-

ven Run was thrown off the track below this place this morning, through the carelessness of a switchman. Superintendent Wilcox was killed in jumping from the train. Several passengers were injured, but no other lives lost. The baggage car and five passenger coaches went off; three of them are bottom up.

General Custar's expedition to learn the topography of the Black Hill country has started. Every expedition heretofore sent there has been fought back. The following was received to-day:

ST. PAUL, July 2, 1874.

Asst. Gen. Military Division of the Missouri: Custar's expedition got off this morning. Custar reports the new arms received and everybody much pleased with them. He says it is the best equipped, armed and organized expedition ever sent on the plains. We shall probably hear from him in eight or ten days.

Belknap has gone to New London. NEW YORK, July 6.—Ex-Judge George M. Curtis, formerly of the Marine Court of this city, was fatally beaten at Bath yesterday while attempting to protect two ladies from insult.

A special dispatch to the Kansas City Times, from Wichita, Kansas, dated July 1, says:

Two men direct from Medicine Lodge this morning, report that that town had been burned, and that eighteen men have been killed and scalped by the Indians. They have driven off 800 head of cattle belonging to a Texas man. The Indians are 3000 strong, and well armed. The story is very generally believed to be true, and creates considerable excitement throughout the country.

The French and English papers generally consider that Chambord's manifesto makes it impossible for him to become King of France.

PARIS, July 5.—Le Union, which first published Chambord's manifesto, is suspended for a fortnight.

In the Assembly Lebraun asked why Le Union was suspended. The Ministry replied, partly because it had opposed the septennate and partly because of the publication of the manifesto. The Ministry further stated that the power of MacMahon was irrevocable. Lebraun said he would submit the interpellation, which will be discussed Tuesday.

Gould died to-day.

A CORRESPONDENT from Munich speaks of steps having recently been taken to convert or re-convert Dr. Doellinger, to induce his separation from the Old Catholic cause, and lead him back to the bosom of the infallible Pope. The way of his return is every possible way to be made easy to the renowned theologian, yet all in vain. Mr. Von Doellinger has most positively rejected any and every overture.
