FOUR-FIFTHS of the cattle shipped to St. Louis are consumed there.

BRENSHAM has been chosen as the place for the Democratic Convention of the 5th Congressional District, because of its centrality. So says the chairman.

The stock reporter of the St. Louis Times gives, as the opinion of an experienced cattle man, the estimate that the Texas cattle drive this year will not exceed 125,000. This is attributed to the heavy drives of previous years and the inspection laws. He says that cattle shipped from Austin to St. Louis will shrink one hundred pounds, while from St. Louis to New York they will not shrink more than forty pounds. When taken direct from the pasture, they fatten and perspire freely, while from St. Louis to the East they worry less, because more used to travel.

THE Little Rock Gazette says the mail service was placed on the Cairo, Arkansas and Texas branch of the Southern Railroad Wednesday. Hereafter letters for Cairo, Louisville, etc., go direct by way of Poplar Bluff, and not by the roundabout of St. Louis. The amount of mail transported over the Cairo and Fulton Railroad is very heavy. The mail sent by the route to Texas consists principally of newspapers. At present the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad has the mail contract for this State.

BALTIMORE had shipped, up to the 1st of June, 5,227,000 bushels of wheat and corn. She claims cheap coal, low port charges and the best railroad facilities of any city near the Atlantic seaboard. In 1870 she shipped 486,875 bushels. Baltimore, through the completion of her ship channel in Patuxent river and bay, has placed herself in a position to rapidly assume a first rank. She has demonstrated, like Commodore Morgan, that a deep channel through an open bay is practicable. She now has twenty-five feet of water in her harbor.

A new alliance is about to be established between the cities of St. Louis and Dallas. The Times, of the former city, says that "at this peculiar juncture, the visit of that well-known and accomplished citizen of Texas, Gen. W. L. Cabell, to St. Louis, is a matter of more than ordinary importance." Gen. Cabell is Mayor of Dallas, and went to St. Louis to celebrate the fourth of July, with some other patriotic citizens of Texas, but, according to the Times, "this delegation was the agent courier of a larger one, having in view the business interests of the two cities," which will probably reach St. Louis about the 15th inst. The Times says:

At a time when Galveston and Kansas City have to use Gen. Cabell's language, "just shaken hands," the advantages to be derived from the visit of Gen. Cabell and his delegation should be seized upon at once by our merchants. It should be made evident to them that cheaper goods, and a less rate of freight, can be procured by direct trade with us, than can be obtained under the delusive prospects held out by our would-be rivals.

THE BRIDGE CELEBRATION at St. Louis on the Fourth of July was probably one of the grandest public demonstrations ever made in the United States. The St. Louis papers come to us with a half a dozen pages of close print entirely occupied in descriptions of it. It is estimated that the procession was fifteen miles long; those who joined in it were but a very small portion of those in attendance. One hundred and fifty thousand visitors from all parts of the Union, and from the old world, were present to witness the festivities. Among the speak-

ers were Gov. Beveridge, of Illinois; Gov. Woodson, of Missouri; Gov. Hendricks, of Indiana; Ex-Gov. B. Gratz Brown, of Missouri; and Senator Ferry, of Michigan; also, Capt. Eads, the engineer, architect, and master spirit in the construction of the Great Bridge.

We have never before seen the vast resources and coming greatness of the Valley of the Mississippi so lucidly, eloquently, and grandly set forth, as in the speeches on that occasion. Gov. Beveridge predicted that in fifty years from now both Missouri and Illinois, now united by the bridge, would each have 10,000,000 population, and that the Mississippi Valley would become so powerful in wealth and population that it would control the Union, and insure its perpetual integrity. And it was boldly uttered that St. Louis, having completed this one link in the highway of nations, and having now free access by rail to the Atlantic and Pacific, and by rail and river to the Gulf, and being in the heart of the greatest and richest valley in the world, would soon eclipse all other American cities.

### Telegraphic.

The dispatches from Madrid say it is supposed that active operations will be resumed by the Republicans in Navarre within a fortnight. The garrison at Bilbao having been much weakened by the departure of reinforcements to the army of the north has withdrawn from its advanced position outside of the town and the abandoned lines were immediately occupied by the Carlists.

LONDON, July 4.—A revolution has broken out in Tangiers. At the last accounts the rebels were masters of the official building.

PARIS, July 6.—The political situation is serious. The Legitimists have resolved to make an attempt to unseat the present Ministry on interpellation in regard to the suspension of La Union, which comes before the Assembly next Tuesday. They are negotiating with the Left to obtain its support. A counter coalition of the Left Centre, with the Right Centre in favor of Casimir Perier's constitutional bill, is also proposed.

There is ground for belief that Marshal McMahon has intimated to the Legitimists that he will not accept the resignation of the Ministry, even if it is defeated. It is reported that he will send a message to the Assembly on Tuesday.

The rumor is current that Count De Chambord has been in Versailles several days.

Le Francois says, passports are no longer required of Americans, who are placed on the same footing in this respect as the subjects of countries adjacent to France.

BYRONNE, July 5.—The Carlists have again invested Bilbao on all sides except towards the sea.

LONDON, July 6.—A special to the Daily Telegraph from Fulda says the Roman Catholic Bishop seeks a settlement of the issue with the Prussian Government in the total separation of the Church and State.

A special from Madrid says the Generals who resigned from the army of the North are well known supporters of the pretensions of the Prince of Asturias. Generals Marconis and Lezerman, Radicals, have been appointed in their places.

MADRID, July 6.—Gen. Zavala has taken command and held a review of the army of the North. He has informed his officers that he comes to fight the insurgents and intends to seek all political sympathies and opinions in the struggle. Generals Echague and Martinez Campos have resigned.

The Pope has telegraphed his benediction to the national army in response to Congratulations forwarded to Rome on the anniversary of his accession.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—General O. O. Howard is assigned to the command of the Department of Columbia, with headquarters at Portland, Oregon.

AMONG important ecclesiastical matters we notice that Bishop O'Griffin, of the Roman Catholic Church, died suddenly on the 5th at Cincinnati; that Bishop Whelan, of the same Church, is momentarily expected to die at Wheeling, West Virginia; and that Bishop Cummins, the founder of the Reformed Episcopal Church, has been formally deposed by the Episcopal Church.

Col. Andrew Neill, writing from Austin under date of July 3rd, to Justice Bradford Hancock, relative to securing certificates of pension, says:

I am sorry to say that there are no bonds here, and no telling when there will be, causing a great deal of dissatisfaction among poor applicants who have come great distances from home to prove their claims. The necessity, also, of proving the personal identity of the old veterans is, in many cases a severe trial and test, and many have to travel further. Be pleased to say to any one you know I represent that any delay in my return will not be to their detriment, as I could not relieve them with the bonds to which they are entitled.—Galveston News.

In San Antonio, though the days are pretty warm, the nights are always delightfully cool and breezy. And we have hardly any mosquitoes at all. We have not seen such a thing as a mosquito net this summer, and have not felt the least need of one.

The court room this morning was densely crowded to hear the death sentence pronounced on Jenkins. What basis of facts there may be to sustain his charges, we are not able to say, but as a specimen of rough-shod eloquence it ranks high, and made a most decided impression, not only among the spectators, but among the citizens generally.

SOME measures should be taken by the city authorities to secure water in the irrigation ditches in case of fire. If, for instance, when a fire is under way, at night or in the daytime, the property owners who are irrigating above where the fire occurs, were obliged, under penalty of a fine, to let out the water, such arrangement might prevent the spread of the devastating element.

THE COGZIA COMET is now viewed every night by our citizens as it sweeps westward through the clear July sky. It is now pretty nearly in the North-west, and seems to be approaching the horizon. It is said that it will disappear about July 20th, but it looks as if it would disappear somewhat sooner. Its tail is not near so large and long, as seen by the naked eye, as that of Donati's comet in 1858. The tail of that comet stretched across a vast section of the Western heavens, and it was exceedingly broad and luminous. It is said that there are now two comets visible to the naked eye, but we have not had the second one pointed out to us: The New York Herald says that the first of the present comets, which was detected by Professor Louis Swift, of Rochester, on the 8th ult., was previously discovered at Marseilles, France, on the 17th of April last, and has been called Cogzia's comet. Cogzia being the discoverer. It is now approaching the earth and sun with a constantly accelerated velocity, arriving at perihelion (nearest the sun) and perigee (nearest the earth) about the first of August. It was at first situated, at one o'clock in the morning, directly beneath the polar star, and about twenty-five degrees from it. It was visible all night, but will soon be only in the early hours of evening, setting in the northwest. Professor Swift says the comet will be brightest in the evening of August 3, being then 245 times as bright as at the time of discovery; and, as the moon will be absent, it will be subjected to spectroscopic analysis under circumstances more favorable than may occur again in many years. A cometary display may then be expected which may rival the transit of Venus in popular as well as in scientific interest. It will then be about five degrees from Denabola, the brightest star in Leo.
