SHAD TURNED LOOSE IN KEARNE

Forty thousand young shad were turned in the Colorado on the 4th of July 1874, by Professor James W. Milner, who is acting under the United States Commissioner of Fish and Fisheries, established by Congress in '71 to protect and restore the fisheries of the United States. Professor S. F. Baird, of the Smithsonian Institute is the Chief Commis-

sioner. The appropriation for carrying out the objects of the bureau in stocking the water of Texas was \$12,500, but, through the watchful attention, and at the instigation of Judge John Hancock, our Representative in Congress, the amount was raised to \$15,000. Professor Milner the deputy commissioner, assisted by Messrs. J. Mason and F. Clark, ex perts in fish culture brought the consignment for the Brazos and Co lorado rivers in twelve caus, with capacity of afty gallons each. About 25,000 were placed in the Bra zos on the 3d inst. They descend to the sea every year but return to their old haunts to spaw. When a stream becomes stocked, millions come up annually in schools. Then the fishermen are in their glory; and the people are farnished with luxury, which one tasted is never forgotten, so delicious are they that dealers pack them in ice and send them by boat and cars in every di-

Stocking the waters of Texas with shad is a matter of more consequence than man may suppose. So soon, however, as they shall become numerous and well known, the good work which has been accomplished

will be fully appreciated. The waters of Australia have been stocked with choice varieties from England, where they do well But the young fishes should be

protected till they arrive to maturity; and it is to be hoped that all good citizens will preserve them till the waters of Texas teem with this most delicious fish .- Statesman.

tune which promise boundless prosperity and lead to ruin. This limited monarchy admits of the existence of two chambers one nominated by the King and the other elected by the nation, accord-

ing to legally established suffrage. The union of the people and the King enabled the ancient menarchy to frastrate for centuries the calculations of those seeking to domi neer over the people by contending against the King It is untrue that my policy is at variance with the aspirations of the country. We both desire the strong reparative powers which a durable alliance with the monarchy alone can give. I wish the representatives of the nation to be vigilent auxiliaries for the examination of questions submitted to them, but will not have barren parliamentary struggles, from which the sovereign often issues powerless

In rejecting the foreign and imported formula with its King who reigns, but does not govern. I feel myself in harmony with the immense majority. I am now, as before, ready. The House of France is sincerely reconciled. Let their be a truce to our divisions. Is it not time to restore presperity and grandent to France with the venerable royalty?

THE PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM OF Texas is in a most unsatisfactory condition. It is a source of general discontent throughout the State. It is one of the greatest hindrances in the way of the overwhelming tide of immigration that is ready to flow into our territory. We now have assurance of bountiful crops and an abundance of cheap food. We have railroad connection with all parts of the Union. We have a genial and healthful climate, and an im mense body of cheap and fertile land. And recent commercial combinations between Texas ports and St. Louis, Chicago, Kausas City, Denver and other important trade centers, have added vastly to the reputation of Texas, and wonderfully increased the tendency of immi gration thitherward. But it has gone abroad, and truthfully too, that our free school system is lame and inefficient. The hard-working farmers that seek to come to us, and who compose the class of population that we most need and desire, cannot afford to emigrate to a country where they cannot educate their children at the public schools. This disadvantage counterbalances all the great advantages we offer. They can do better in a less tayored country where free school privileges are Navarre. within reach of their children; for, in this day, all other advantages are as nothing compared to the advantage of being able to thoroughly educate our children. In the race and battle of life at the present day education is the prime equipment and the indispensable armor. Tex as, and no other State, is a fit home tor the masses of American citizens without an efficient free school sys-

Moreover, the party now in power should remember that it is on trial before the people of Texas, and before the whole country, on this this question. It is worse than that; that party is already morally condemned on this issue. It is known throughout Texas; and throughout the Nation, that under the previous administration a good and successfal public school system was put into successful operation. GENERAL NATURE-No. 25. AN ACT relative to private contracts or agreements made with Indians prior to May twenty-first, eighteen hundred and seventy-two.

Sec. 3. That the Secretary of Commisioner of Indian Affairs is hereby empow ered to require, in writing, any additional facts or proofs that may be necessary to aid in determining the true character of the contract or agreement, or assignment

SEC. 4. That no such contract or agreement shall be recognized by any officer or employee of the United States until the Secretary of the Interior shall, after full consideration of any such contract or agreement, together with the proofs and papers in this act required to be filed, and such as the Secretary of the Interior or Commissioner of Indian Affairs may require in addition thereto, the Secretary of the Interior shall consider to be just and reasonable, and not tainted with fraud, and not exorbitant in its demands: Provided, That the Secretary of the Inte-terior shall in all cases enter, in writing,

on such original contract, on the record in the office of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs wherein such original contract is recorded, an official statement, showing that the contract or agreement and proofs have been filed in accordance with the provisions of this act and considered by him, and in his opinion said contract or agreement or assignments thereof are not fraudulent, and that they are just, the same shall be valid.

But if, in the apinion of the Secretary of the Interior, such contract or agreement, or the assignment thereof, is fraudulent or exorbitant, he shall officially enter his rejection, in writing, upon the record of such contract or agreement, and they shall not be considered of binding force by any officer or employee of the

SEC. 5. That it is hereby made the duty of the Secretary of the Interior to cause an investigation to be made of all existing contracts or agreements, within the purview of this act, now on file in his office, or of the office of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, or any other office or bureau under his control and by special notice. under his control, and by special notice to the party or parties in Interest compel, se of each such contract or agreement so found on file, the same strictness of official examination, and indorsement, record and sworn statement of facts, as is required by the several provisions of this act: Provided, That the investigation of facts touching the character of any contract or agreement contemplated by this act was be made by a commissioner and act may be made by a commissioner ap-pointed by the President for that purpose, who shall report all such facts to the Sec-retary of the Interior in writing.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of American in Congress assembled, That the thirteenth section of the Act entitled "An act teenth section of the Act entitled "An act to regulate the carriage of passengers in steamships and ather vessels." approved March third, eighteen hundred and fifty, See, be, and the same is hereby, repealed; and that hereafter each and every collector of customs to whom shall be delivered the manifests or lists of passengers prescribed by the twelfth section of the act of creatil approved March third, eighteen aforesaid, approved March third, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, shall make returns from such manifests or lists of passengers to the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, in such manner as shall be rescribed by that officer, under who direction statements of the same shall be Approved, May 7, 1874.

(GENERAL NATURE-No. 27.) AN ACT to amend the thirty-first section of act entitled "An act for enrolling and calling out the national militia, and for other purposes," approved March third, eighteen hundred and sixty-three.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all officers on duty at any point west of a line drawn sorth and south through Omaha City, and north of a line drawn east and west upon the southern boundary of Arizona, shaall be allowed sixty days' leave of absence without deduction of pay or al-lowances: Provided, That the same is taken but once in two years: And provided further, That the leave of absence may be extended to three months, it taken once only in three years; or four months, if take once only in four years. Approved, May 8, 1874.

GENERAL NATURE-No. 28. An Act in relation to the contoms duties on imported fruits.

Be it exacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby directed to suspend the repayment of all duties herotofore paid on imported fruits until further legislation by Congress authorizing the same, or until the final decision of the Supreme Court, except in cases where suits in court have been discontinued by instructions of the Secretary of the Treasury. And the error in the punctuation of the clause relating to not plants in the fifth section of the act approved June six, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, entitled "An act to reduce and taxes, and for other purposes," of inserting a comma instead of a hyphen after the word "fruit" is hereby corrected, and said clause shall read as follows: Fruit-plants tropical and somittopical for the purpose of propagasemi-tropical for the purpose of propaga-tion or cultivation: Provided, That the duties imposed by virtue of this amend-ment shall not be levied or collected upon fruits entered for consumption at any port of entry prior to Jaly first, eighteen hundred and seventy-four. Approved, May 9, 1874


