BROWNSVILLE, July 8.
A paymaster stationed at Mата-
more has absconded with \$7,000.
Deputy Marshal Garland went to
Brazos Santiago in search of him.
Capts. King and Kennedy are
here.

It is said a move will be made to
build the railroad from Brazos San-
tiago to Brownsville.
NEW YORK, July 8.—The President
and Mrs. Grant, and Senator Jones
and family, arrived here from Long
Branch this evening.

BALTIMORE, July 7.—Right Re-
verent Richard Vincent Whelan,
Roman Catholic bishop of the dioc-
ese of Wheeling, W. Va. died at
St. Agnes Hospital into this city
this afternoon. His remains will
be taken to Wheeling to-morrow.

NEW YORK, July 7.—Thomas
Kemp, of New Brunswick, N. J.
who threw his three children into
the canal Monday morning, one,
and then attempted to drown
himself, died suddenly today.

FORT WAYNE, IND., July 7.—A
man named Evans living at War-
saw, Ind., who was bitten by a rabid
dog some ten days since, on
yesterday began to show symptoms
of hydrophobia.

NASHVILLE, July 7.—Henry Miller,
a young man committed suicide
last night by shooting himself in
the left breast. He attempted to
shoot himself through the heart,
but failed, and lived about 3 hours.
No cause assigned for the rash act.

NEW YORK, July 7.—Gen. Wm.
Uckeles, of the Confederate army,
and residing at Rutherford Park
New Jersey, for the past six years,
committed suicide yesterday.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 7.—Dr.
J. R. Jennings, a prominent physi-
cian of Nashville, Tenn., committed
suicide at his hotel at Narragansett
Pier this morning. His niece, the
daughter of Governor Wise of Vir-
ginia, was with him at the pier.

MEMPHIS, July 7.—Mr. Rockhold
was instantly killed by a rock falling
on him.

LINCOLN, NEB., July 7.—The man
named Wonder, stabbed in the ab-
domen at a dance at Dorchester,
is reported dead today.

ROSTON, July 7.—Capt. George S
Peach, while on a voyage from
Gloucester to Provincetown, struck
the cook with an oar, inflicting fatal
injuries.

MEMPHIS, July 7.—F. J. Boyle,
while drawing water from a public
well lost his footing, and falling
into the well, broke his neck.

LITTLE ROCK, July 7.—A constable
named Humphreys, colored, in a
personal difficulty near his city, on
Saturday, was shot and killed by
another man.

The verdict of the coroner's jury
in the Mill river, Mass., disaster in-
vestigation is published. It cen-
sures the Legislature for inadequate
and defective legislation on the sub-
ject of reservoirs; the mill owners
for their parsimonious disregard of
life and property; the engineers for
their ambiguous and insufficient
specifications; the contractors for
manifest delinquencies and want of
thoroughness in their work; and, finally,
the County Commissioners for
accepting a dam so shabbily
built, when they had the power to
order its entire reconstruction.
With the responsibility so much di-
vided, this would seem to be but
another form of the old verdict, "No-
body to blame."

A high compliment is paid to
Gov. Bartram by the New York
Evening Post, saying, "He rivals
Gov. Dix in the care with which he
scrutinizes all documents passing
through his hands." This is the
duty of every Governor, but too many
act on the announcement of Pres-
ident Grant, that they have no
views contrary to those of a major-
ity of the legislative branch of the
Government.

GEN. JOHN R. BAYLOR, we understand, is undoubtedly in the field as an independent candidate for Congress for this District. As Gen. Baylor is a Democrat, we have no right to give him political advice, but we have a right to speak of him as a personal friend, a fellow townsman, a fellow soldier during the late war, and a public man generally. In all these respects he has the warmest friendship of all who know him well, especially in Western Texas, and more particularly on the frontier, where he has often been a daring soldier and commander.

THE upper counties of the Fifth Congressional District, which includes Galveston and Austin, and reaches to Red river, are sorely dissatisfied that the Democratic Convention to nominate a candidate for Congress is to meet at Hempstead. The upper counties will have no more showing in that convention than "a stump-tail bull in fly time." The gerrymandering Democracy have made the Districts so long in the body and so slim round the waist, that they cannot stand straight.

THE silver mines of Western Texas are beginning more and more to attract attention, and, in addition to the agricultural and hygienic attractions of the country, are about to prove another great stimulus to immigration. The silver region seems to include the counties of Gillespie, Mason, Llano, San Saba, and Menard. The last issue of the Fredricksburg Sentinel says that the editor has seen specimens of ore taken from a mine on Babyhead creek yielding at the rate of one thousand dollars silver per ton of the ore. They are located in a country where water is plentiful, where timber is bountiful, and where roads can be built with comparatively little cost. The party who own the last named mines have negotiated in New York for a large amount of crushing machinery, which is being shipped directly to Austin for Llano county.

One great benefit in these which cannot be found in other argentiferous ores is that their smeltable heat is extremely low when compared with other argentiferous ores, bismuth being a large component part. There is no reason to doubt that these mines will yield a handsome quantity of the precious metal, and when the day arrives for the development, which certainly is not far distant, these counties will be as populous and wealthy as the valley of the San Joaquin, Cal., is at present.

Think, says the Sentinel, of ore yielding \$1000 per ton of pure silver not yet developed and only 100 miles from the State Capital. And it is a much shorter distance to San Antonio, where the railroad will soon extend.

THE SUPREME COURT DECISION in the International Railroad Bond case is given in outline in a special to the Galveston News of last Friday. We had supposed to give it entire in this issue of the EXPRESS, together with the dissenting opinion of Justices Reeves and Devine; but our space will not permit it. We give only the main points of both opinions. To night the opinion, complete and revised, will reach us.

The majority opinion says that a mandamus would lie only when the duty of the Comptroller is "ministerial," but in such a case as this the duty requires the joint action of the Governor, Treasurer, and Comptroller, involving the discretion of the Executive Department, and is an "official" act. The District Court cannot compel an officer of the Executive Department to do an official act. Case of Houston Tap and Brazos Railroad, etc., 18. In other State constitutions, supreme executive

power resides in the Governor; under our constitution, it resides in the entire magistracy composing the Executive Department, and the duties of each are separately defined. In the recent act of the Legislature in relation to this case, it provides that it shall not affect the litigation of it, and it does not recognize the State as a party in this suit. The court has no jurisdiction of the case.

Judges Reeves and Devine hold that the recent act of the Legislature make the decision of the Court a basis of settlement, and contemplate a decision of all the points involved on their merits. The case is properly before the Court. The jurisdiction of the Court to inquire into the power of the Legislature and the constitutionality of the enactment, has never been denied, nor regarded as encroaching on the other branches of the government. The question is, had the Legislature the power under the constitution to pass the act? If so, it is binding on all departments of the government, and the duty of the Comptroller is defined, enjoined, and "ministerial," and not discretionary. His refusal is a case for mandamus.

TELEGRAPHIC.

GEN. SHERIDAN STRIKES THE HOSTILE INDIANS—MAIL CAR BURNED—A BLOODY SHIRT—TUMBLE IN TEXAS WARRANTS—A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION—RESERVATION INDIANS ON THE WAR PATH—THE EMPEROR OF RUSSIA INTERVIEWED—ENGLAND GIVES UP CANADA—WASHINGTON FINANCIAL NEWS—CHIMES, CASUALTIES, MURDERS, HOMICIDES, AND SUICIDES—A LITTLE GIRL RESCUED FROM A VILLAIN—A RIOT BETWEEN LUMBERMEN AND A CIRCUS.

OMAHA, July 9.—Generals Sheridan and Ord returned from the West this evening, and telegraph advices from Ft. Laramie that reports received from the Spotted Tail agency say 75 lodges of Ogallala, under Black Tom, are moving toward that place, and that the Unspapas and Minnicogies are moving across the Yellowstone river. The Arrapahoes and Cheyennes are camped on the head waters of the Big Horn river, near Big Horn Mountain.

LOVE TREK, NEB., July 9.—In consequence of many depredations by the Sioux in Wind River Valley on white settlers and Shoshone Indians, one of the latest being the murder and horrible mutilation of two white women, Dr. Jayne, agent for the Shoshones, has made a request that the Sioux should be punished.

On the 2nd of July, while Gen. Ord and myself were at Camp Brown, Capt. Forney was directed to send Capt. Bates and Lieut. Robinson, with Company B, 2nd Cavalry, accompanied by 20 Indian ponies, under Lieut. Young, and about 150 Shoshone Indians, under their chief, Wassokyo, to attack a Sioux camp, lately established about 50 miles from Camp Brown.

The attack was made at 3 o'clock Friday, July 3, and resulted in 50 Sioux killed and wounded, and over 100 horses captured. Our loss was two men killed, and Lieut. Young and three men wounded, Lieut. Young dangerously.

(Signed) P. H. SHERIDAN, Lt. Gen. Nonpareil, Va., July 9.—The mail and express car attached to the eastward bound train on the A. M. & O. R. R. was entirely destroyed by fire 9 miles east of Petersburg. The mail car contained an unusually heavy Northern and Southern mail, which, with the express matter in the adjoining apartment, was entirely destroyed.

Route agents Jones and Jennings, the only persons in the car at the time, were badly burned about the face and arms. They were unable to give an alarm owing to the burning of the bell rope, and after an ineffectual effort to save the most valuable part of the mail, they both jumped off, and were afterwards picked up, much bruised.

NEW YORK, July 9.—Yesterday during the demolition of the Nathan mansion, a bloody shirt was found secreted in a dumb waiter, and was taken to the Police Central office, and on examination the name of Nathan was discovered underneath the collar, though covered with a large blotch of blood.

AUSTIN, July 9.—S. M. Swenson, of Swenson, Perkins & Co., New York, having telegraphed the Governor some days ago that if the court decided adversely to the mandamus, he could place the bonds previously attempted to be sold by Col. Moody at fair figures, it is hoped here that he will do so promptly, even if he has to buy them himself.

The bankers were offering previous to the decision \$2 for new and 70 cents for old warrants. Since the decision they have reduced them to 40 for old and 75 to 80 cents for new.

PARIS, July 11.—The Committee of Thirty, its constitution was held an important sitting to-day. Fourton, Minister of the Interior, appeared and presented the views of the government. He said the government would accept the bills drawn up by the committee which provide for the continuance of this President of the Republic; for the creation of a second chamber; and for the organization of a personal septennate to terminate with the expiration of McMahon's seven years' term, or sooner, in case of his resignation or death; but that it was desirable that certain provisions, which required immediate action, should be embodied in a separate measure for speedier passage by the Assembly.

WACO, July 10.—Bill Pacey the Tebancau Modoc, who was sentenced to the penitentiary for five years, started for Huntsville to-day, under a strong guard.

A Mr. Oden a school teacher of this county, was convicted to-day of brutally whipping a girl seven years of age, and was fined \$50 dollars.

The convention of the Christian Church in session, Judge J. H. Banton, of Huntsville, presiding. The attendance is large and much interest is manifested.

They are now selling in San Antonio for five and ten cents apiece. If we had the railroad extended to this point we could ship

them by the car load to Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago, New York, and all the Western, Northern, and Eastern cities, at great profit, and to the delight of those places. We find the following in the Galveston News:

Mr. J. E. Johnson, of Houston, addressed the News a note under date of the ninth inst., to the effect that he would leave the same afternoon for Kansas City, with two cars loaded with melons, belonging to himself and Mr. Stringfellow. This is the proper course to take, and evinces the true spirit of enterprise. The trip is taken as an experiment, and if it succeeds it will lead to shipments of other produce from this section. There is no reason why the far West should not be supplied with early fruits and vegetables from this region of country, with profits to the producers here and satisfaction to the consumers at the other end of the line. This simple interchange is but the beginning of the end—the agitation of this direct trade movement between the West and the Gulf ports of Texas, is bound before long to astonish the natives with its results.
