RANGERS.—The Oakville *Tribune* mentions the passage through of Capt. Warren's ranging company, and warns the company, and also the home protective organization, to great care, lest good Mexicans be badly treated.

GEN. TOM HARRISON, the most popular of the old Confederate commanders now living in Texas, and and deservedly so, positively declines to be a candidate for Congress from the Fourth District.

GOV. KEMPER, of Virginia, Gen. Hebert, of Louisiana, and Senator Gordon, of Georgia, all Democrats, favor Grant for a third term. The whole third term idea and discussion are Democratic in origin.

THE Lockport Transcript is another paper that speaks out in favor of a Congressman for Western Texas who shall be best fitted to promote her development, instead of a mere party nominee. It seems to have but little faith in conventions and nominees. There is no nominee paper in this District, we believe.

THE account of the recent trouble between the whites and the colored people in the colored colony ten miles South-west of Seguin, which we publish on our first page, sounds very much like a truthful narrative of the facts as they occurred. What has Guadalupe county, the home of John Ireland, to say to such outrages? What will the Governor do? Shall this matter go abroad without investigation, to the great injury of the State?

AUSTIN FEMALE COLLEGE, Rev. A. G. Stacy, President, is, in our humble opinion, one of the best educational institutions for girls and young ladies to be found in the State. We have visited it, examined its arrangements, are acquainted with the President, his lady, and some of the instructors, and feel qualified to speak as we do. It is a school of high grade and first class character.

THE Herald thinks that, if the compromise with the International Railroad is not carried out, the company may recover the whole of the original subsidy granted, of \$10,000 a mile from Jefferson to the Rio Grande. We think it quite likely, and, if the company builds the road to the Rio Grande, we hope it will get the whole subsidy. It was to force the road through to the Rio Grande that the subsidy was originally given, and, if carried out, the original programme is vastly better for the State than the compromise.

THE Herald, in order to answer the question, how can a sovereign State be sued? says:

We were well aware, that a sovereign State could not be sued, but Texas is not sovereign, she is only reconstructed, and Congress, by its dictum, can order a suit maintained, and the mandate would be obeyed by the Federal courts.

That's all boss. Texas is as "sovereign" now as she ever was, and can no more be sued by the "dictum" of Congress than before the war. Congress is not going to help the "sovereign" Democracy out of the slough of repudiation by any dictum whatever.

THE INDIANS of the Kiowa, Cheyenne, Arapaho, and Sioux tribes, are murdering and scalping at a terrible rate in Kansas and Nebraska, and troops are hurrying to the seat of war, while the citizens are being organized into companies, and exposed families are being gathered into places of safety. Meanwhile 6000 Sioux have gathered in the Black Hills, the sacred ground of the Sioux nations, to resist the expedition of Gen. Custer. They claim that the expedition is in violation of the treaty of 1868, reserv-

ing the Black Hills exclusively for the Indians. We are glad that these vast complications of Indian troubles do not involve Texas. Let other regions appeal to the Government awhile.

WE agree with our neighbor of the *Herald* in deploring the condition of the State credit, and of the interests of Western Texas, consequent upon the refusal of the Supreme Court to decide upon the merits of the International Railway Bond case. And we will support the *Herald* in urging Gov. Coke to cut the Gordian knot by causing the bonds to be issued to the company, if it will show us that the Governor now has that authority, since the passage of the compromise of the last Legislature. But it would be useless to urge Gov. Coke. He is opposed to the issuance of the bonds. He appointed Judge Ferris in order to defeat the company. No reliance need be placed on Coke to get us out of the difficulty. He got us into it. And the Democrats made old Bledsoe refuse to sign the bonds. Gentlemen, it is your own broth; swallow it if you can.

STEAM LINES.—Professor Peirce's Estimate of Their Importance. Professor Peirce, in a recent paper on "Steam Lines," made some suggestions which should not pass unnoticed. His points may be stated thus:—

First—That "steam lanes" should be established, because collisions will be a hundredfold more imminent in the next generation, when ocean travel will have multiplied very largely; in fact, there must be one hundred collisions then where we have one now.

Second—It has been suggested that there should be a distinct "lane" for every month of the year, laid down with a scrupulous regard to marine experience.

Third—The meridian of greatest danger is 50 degrees west of Greenwich, on the banks of Newfoundland, with its dense fogs, fishing smacks and stranded icebergs. This is the vital point and may dispose of the whole question.

Fourth—That the systems adopted by the German lines and the Cunard line are opposing in their character, producing confusion and uncertainty.

Fifth—That the Cunard line now in force is the best one.

Sixth—That "steam lanes" might be compelled by a clause in marine insurance policies.

Lastly—That vessels should be compelled to observe a uniform speed—say ten knots on hour—during the continuance of a fog, if the lanes be established.

Texas News.

The Narrow Gauge railroad from Houston will be built by a company of capitalists, provided Houston will subscribe \$75,000, and she has already subscribed \$30,000 of it.

The *Texas Farm and Home*, published at Calvert, by Chas. E. Brown & Co., is an excellent monthly magazine, at \$2 a year. The *Galveston News* and *Austin Statesman* favor the election of Hon. John Hancock to Congress for that District.

Collin, Cook, and other counties go strongly for Throckmorton for Congress from that District.

The Deputy U. S. Marshal who arrested a Mr. Stallcup at Tyler for murder in Arkansas, was prevented from taking him off, because the warrant of Governor Coke had not the seal of the State. The Tyler *Index* deprecates the course of Judge Bonner and the citizens.

The *Waco Advertiser* is disgusted with the Supreme Court for refusing to decide the International railway bond case, and calls for a constitutional convention—trying to get out of the frying pan into the fire.

The *Waco Advertiser* says that a lawyer named Adamson was killed at Hamilton on the 7th by a man named Hughes.

The *Waco Advertiser* wants an extra session, in order to provide for the election of delegates to a constitutional convention this fall at the Congressional election. O dear! What next? Does this mean that Coke favors such a thing?

Democratic Congressional conventions meet at Goliad for the 8th District, Brenham for the Fifth and Waco for the Fourth.

Dr. A. G. Clepton of Jefferson, is a Democratic candidate for Congress in the First District.

Near Bushman, Mr. English, his wife and two children, in a two-horse wagon, broke through a bridge, and Mrs. English was killed.

The *Austin Statesman* says that when the notorious Wash. White was sentenced to Penitentiary for trying to kill his wife, he furiously cursed the whole court and knocked his wife down with a chair.

A child 18 months old was drowned in a tub at Austin a few days since while its mother was reading.

Letters from St. Louis reach Galveston in 44 hours.

A company is being raised in Washington county by authority to preserve order in De Witt county.

The Chief of Police at Waco, for brutality in arresting a man named Davis, and drawing a bowie knife on him, was fined \$10 and dismissed by the Mayor. He thought "Radicalism was dead" since Coker "broke out."

The State Convention of the Christian (Campbellite) Church has been in session in Waco, and all the churches were opened to them. This is as it should be. Judge Battle the new Criminal Judge at Waco, is highly spoken of by the *Register*.

Forty thousand young shad were turned loose in the Colorado on the 4th July, 1874, by Prof. James W. Milner, who is acting under the United States Commissioner of Fish and Fisheries, established by Congress in 1871 to protect and restore the fisheries of the United States.

We rejoice in this effort to stock Texas waters with this excellent fish, as they are sadly deficient in the fish line, but we think, as long as the Brazos was passed over, it would have been much better and safer to have chosen the clear and unfailing waters of the San Antonio for the beginning of the enterprise. At least some of them ought to have been sent here.

LOCAL AFFAIRS.

THE QUARTERLY MEETING of the African Methodist Church will commence on Friday night, and hold over Sunday.

THE DISTRICT MEETING of the M. E. Church, South, at Newton's Chapel, embracing last Sunday, was largely attended and was very interesting. It was still going on at last accounts.

AGRICULTURE ROUND SAN ANTONIO.—One of the finest and most prosperous regions of country near San Antonio has a place called "Newton's Chapel" for a centre. This place is about 25 miles South-west of the city, on the Frio and Laredo road, in Atascosa county, on the upper waters of Atascosa Creek. The immediate neighborhood around this centre is embraced within a circle of about 15 miles in every direction from the Chapel. But there is a country very similar of fully 50 miles square. A few years since this region had scarcely any inhabitants; now it is a highly prosperous agricultural region, and new-comers are pouring into it continually.

At the present time the crops of both corn and cotton are "laid by," and the yield promises to be absolutely enormous. The cotton, wherever it has been cultivated with sufficient skill and vigor, promises to yield fully a bale to the acre. The farmers admit that the force necessary to raise the crop will not by any means be sufficient to pick it out. But Mexican and other labor can be easily obtained, and at reasonable rates. The corn, also, is just as fine and promising as it well can be, as they have been blessed with abundant rains. And the whole country abounds with vegetation of all sorts, and of the finest quality. Watermelons are abundant and excellent. And wherever orchards have been planted, the limbs of the trees are literally weighed down to the ground with a superabundant crop of the very finest peaches, which are just now beginning to get ripe. It is really a magnificent peach country. The El Paso onion grows to perfection.

What makes this the more remarkable is the fact that many of the most promising farmers are now growing their first crops, having been planted before they were fenced, and afterward fenced at intervals with only brush, to protect them from the horses, principally, as there are not many cattle besides those in domestic use. Some of the farms are not even yet completely fenced, and have to be partially guarded against the intrusion of animals. One farm of a thousand acres, fenced with brush, and growing its first crop, divided between corn and cotton, is described to us, in which the cotton will yield a bale to the acre. This is absolutely wonderful.

Of this farm we hear the following facts: The proprietors paid sixty cents an acre for the land, and they now estimate that they will make \$25 an acre clear on every cultivated acre, after deducting the purchase money of the land, and paying all the expenses of building, fencing, opening the land, cultivating the crop, and getting it to market. Was this ever beaten in any part of the world? Of course, however, this is an instance of remarkable success in finding a good opportunity and in skillfully managing it. But the success of all the farmers in that region is so great that they are all prosperous, content, and jubilant.

Plenty of land in that region of country, and of similar character, can be obtained at from fifty cents to a dollar per acre. The soil is a black sandy loam, very easily cultivated, and plentifully timbered with post-oak and some live-oak. It produces everything that can be desired, with the exception of wheat, which has never yet been tried; but we have no doubt that enough wheat can be produced for home use. There is, at any rate, a fine wheat country in almost every direction around San Antonio. Honeybees abound, and "the land flows with milk and honey." Good wells of water can be obtained at various distances from the surface, according to the elevation of the situation.

A good and commodious church is being built at "Newton's Chapel" by the Methodists, and a good public school house is to be built on the ten acre tract belonging to the church. Both Methodists and Baptists flourish in this region, and public schools will be well supported. Last Sabbath, at the Methodist District meeting, fully 400 people assembled for worship. Four cotton gins are being erected in this region. The health of this region is excellent.

We do not know of any such desirable region of country for hard-working farmers in all Texas, after a residence in the State of twenty years. The statement we have made is strictly true, and we hope the press will give it general circulation.
