The Galveston News says that the trade between that city and several Mexican ports seems to be fast increasing. There are now several small schooners plying regularly from Galveston to Tampau, Tampico and Vera Cruz.

We learn that the steamer Stone-wall will soon be placed in this trade with Mexican ports.

John D. Miles, Indian Agent at the Cheyenne and Arapahoe Agency on the North Fork of Indian River, telegraphs to Washington from Osage city, Kansas, July 7th, that 2000 Cheyennes, Kiowas and Arapahoes are on the war path.

The dispatch says that Commissioner Smith last year recommended that these tribes, who had been raiding extensively in Texas, should be in thorough subjection, and compelled to give up their raiding leaders.

New York, July 7.—A newspaper correspondent notes an interview he had at Enns with Count Borodinski, who is known at St. Petersburg as the Emperor of Russia, and which, the correspondent says, he obtained in harmony with diplomatic customs which have been the study of the best part of his life.

"I have heard nothing which could lead me to the belief that war is probable. I don't understand how it could happen at present. I am not aware of anything at this moment which could result in a European war. The mission of Russia in Asia is one of civilization. We have no desire for conquest, and have repeatedly neglected and refused opportunities of annexing territory.

To a remark of the correspondent that it has been observed, with various comments, that your Majesty did not pay a visit to Paris on your way to England, the Emperor replied: "I had no reason to go to Paris. Paris was not in my line of route. I went to England to see my daughter." And a further remark by the correspondent, that the people of the United States of America would be gratified if he were permitted to convey to them re-assurance of his Majesty's friendship and good will, the Emperor answered: "Certainly, I have always felt great esteem for the American people."

GEN. A. B. NORTON still flies the flag of the *Intelligencer* at Dallas, and the paper is prosperous.

The Galveston *Civilian*, we are glad to see, is engaged in the good work of trying to get a good free school system established in Texas.

A supporter of Coke's administration cannot be elected to Congress from Western Texas, nor, as we believe, from any district in the State.

OUR old friend, Maj. John Henry Brown, has retired from the editorship of the *Dallas Herald*, and is succeeded by Mr. E. L. McLure, of South Carolina.

THE issue is now fairly made between the railroad men and the anti-railroad men of the State, and on that issue must the candidates for Congress in the six districts of Texas stand or fall. Let them be "brought to book" everywhere. In the West, all our hopes are centred in railroad extension, harbor improvements, immigration and frontier protection. No Coke man for us, and no Supreme Court man. Judges Devine and Reeves express our sentiments in their dissenting opinion on the International Bond case.

Gov. COKE deserves our praise for one thing, at least, and we give it to him most heartily. He has refused to call together in extra session the miserable Fourteenth Legislature. It is all the State can do to keep its head above water with the members of the Fourteenth at home; should they be allowed again to herd in Austin, we should be inevitably swamped. Coke is afraid of them, too, and we do not blame him. Then they might call a constitutional convention, plunge us deeper in debt, and "break things" generally. Save us from the Fourteenth, do!

We cannot express the sorrow we feel at the announcement of the death of Hon. J. H. Banton, of Huntsville, one of the District Judges of the State. As a modest, accomplished, upright, honorable Christian gentleman, he was an ornament and a power in society, and his influence was of that gentle, elevating, and excellent sort most needed in the State. Although a fine lawyer and an approved Judge, he had lately become a most promising preacher in the "Christian" Church. We knew him well and loved him much.

ARE DEMOCRATS READY? This question is asked by the *Austin Statesman*. The question is timely. We ask it also. Will they go before the people this fall in Texas in support of Gov. Coke's administration, and the acts of the Fourteenth Legislature; or will they oppose them? They must do one or the other. They made the same issue when the Republicans were in power. They held us responsible for everything done, or that failed to be done, even when they themselves had caused the evils complained of. Now, we hold them to the same "scratch." They cannot escape it. If they will stand squarely up to their own administration, they will go under, as they ought to do. They are responsible.

THE Austin *Statesman* expresses great fear of the Democrats and the Grangers; but, at the bottom, it is Coke's administration that it is afraid of. Never did a State administration in Texas come into power with such popular support, under such favorable auspices, with such such large promises, and exciting such large hopes. And never did a State administration in Texas, however opposed, unsupported, and abused, fall half so miserably in the short course of six months. It is

disgraceful—disgraceful to the State, to the Democratic party, to the officers of the State government. Gov. Davis, opposed, abused, maligned, persecuted, thwarted in every effort to do the State good, held the helm of State with a brave heart and a mighty hand, enforced the laws, maintained the courts and magistracy, kept up the State credit, and made an impression upon the history of the State that ten such administrations as Coke's could never make. Coke, with all his advantages, ruined everything in six months. Crime, murder, and mob law rule; the courts and magistracy are powerless; the State has neither money nor credit; the Supreme Court is filled with tricksters; and nobody has confidence in anything.

JUDGES Devine and Reeves, of the Supreme Court, have come out of the International Railroad Bond case with honor; Judges Roberts and Gould, and special Judge Ferris, have come out of it with shame. Judge Moore, who was disqualified to sit in the case, is sound. There is, therefore, a majority of the Supreme Court which can be relied on to save the State from the damaging effect of the late *fiasco* of a decision, whenever a similar case comes up. A writer in the Galveston *News* truly says that "the effect of this decision, should it stand, would be that each officer of the State Government, the Comptroller, the Treasurer and the Commissioner of the Land Office, can do just what he pleases, regardless of the plainest law which any Legislature can enact. The absurdity of the thing is evident. It is entirely subversive of government. It leaves everybody to the discretion of the State officials."

But it must not be forgotten that Gov. Coke is clearly responsible for the disgraceful action of the Supreme Court. His appointment of Judge Ferris to the exclusion of the many able lawyers of Austin is proof that he sought a man whose decision he could rely on.

Judge J. H. Banton died on the 13th at Waco of congestion of the brain. Animal remains, with a tooth weighing 29 pounds, part of a horn seven feet long, and part of a jaw-bone five feet long, have been found in the Brazos near Bryan.

Beecher has appointed a committee to investigate his case, and they are at work. McMahon has suspended the *Figaro* newspapers.

The Carlists are treating newspaper correspondents as spies. They have again been defeated near Bilbao.

The crops are nearly destroyed in most of Kentucky by drought.

The Orangemen had a grand display on the 12th throughout the North.

British war vessels are concentrating at Panama.

Guatemala contributes to the American Centennial.

The Spaniards in Cuba have sentenced Deckerly to death, but it has not yet been approved by Gov. Concha.

Gov. Caldwell, of North Carolina, is dead. Lieut.-Gov. Drayton assumes the office.

Gov. Throckmorton, having been objected to for Congress because he is a railroad man, the Galveston *News* urges it as entirely in his favor.

Hon. Jno. H. Reagan deeply regrets the action of the Supreme Court in the International Bond case.

The enterprise of completing the railroad between Houston and New Orleans is being revived.

The janitor of the new Houston city hospital is "a heathen Chinese."

A gentleman in Galveston chopped out his young *Eucalyptus* shrubs, and cultivated "pawley" by mistake.

The schooner St. George has arrived at Galveston with fruit from Tampico.

Two colored boys, unable to pay a fine in DeWitt county, were, by agreement between the Justice, their fathers, and themselves, hit 20 lashes each. A Texas whipping post at last.

German-English School.

The German-English School Association passed a resolution, in a meeting held on the 8th of April, that a Committee be appointed for the purpose of creating, through voluntary contributions, a fund for the reduction of the indebtedness of the Association, and of increasing the number of its members.

The undersigned Committee, so appointed, being convinced that the preservation and development of our school is a necessity, have willingly undertaken to perform the duties assigned to them, and do not doubt but that they may, even at the present time, count upon the support of our population, particularly upon that of the Germans. The debts of the school amounted, at the close of the last term, to the aggregate sum of \$3250, bearing interest at the rate of 12 per cent., so that the amount of the annual interest would be enough to pay one-half of the salary of one teacher.

A large number of our fellow-citizens have contributed liberally for many years, and the school has, under many difficulties, acquired the reputation of being one of the best schools in the State. Many of our younger fellow-citizens, being heads of families, are much interested in the existence of an independent school as the older citizens. The Committee therefore appeal for voluntary contributions, to assist the school in its present difficult

position, in the first place to the present members of the Association. All and every contribution will be thankfully accepted.

But the Committee believe it to be their duty to make an appeal also to our younger citizens having families; and to ask them to join the Association. According to an old established custom, the payment of \$25 in coin entitles to membership; the Committee earnestly request citizens to become members.

Any one subscribing \$25 may himself fix the time for payment, and will be entitled to the privileges of membership upon making payment.

The undersigned Committee hope that they will not in vain appeal to the liberality of the public, and are ready to receive subscriptions and payments, for which they will render an account to the Association, as well as to the public.



LAW OF THE UNITED STATES

AS PASSED AT THE FIRST SESSION OF THE FORTY-THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 41.]

AN ACT to facilitate the exportation of distilled spirits, and amendatory of the acts in relation thereto.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That whenever the owner or owners of distilled spirits shall desire to withdraw the same from any distillery bonded warehouse for exportation under a flag of anchor, or owners may at their option, in lieu of executing an export bond as now provided by law, give a transportation bond with sureties satisfactory to the collector of internal revenue, and under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe, conditioned for the safe delivery thereof on board ship at a port of exportation to be named therein, and in such case, on arrival of the spirits at the port of export, the importer or owner at that port shall immediately notify the collector of the port of the fact, setting forth the intention to export the same, and the name of the vessel upon which the same are to be laden, and the port to which they are intended to be exported, and also the quantity of spirits to be exported, and the collector of the port shall immediately give bond to the United States, in at least two sureties, satisfactory to the collector of customs, conditioned that the principal named in said bond will export the spirits as specified in said entry; the port designated in said entry, or to some other port, and the collector of the port of destination shall be bound to receive the same, and on the landing of such spirits, the collector of the port, after proper bonds for the exportation of the same have been completed by the exporter or owner at the port of shipment, thereupon shall transmit to the collector of internal revenue of the port to which the said spirits were withdrawn for exportation, a correct and detailed report of the quantity of spirits, which report shall show the capacity of each cask in wine gallons, and the contents thereof in wine gallons, proof gallons, and the table and report of the collector of the port of destination, if the spirits are to be exported to a port in the United States or upon satisfactory proof that after shipment the spirits are to be landed at sea without fault or neglect of the owner or shipper thereof.

Approved, June 9, 1874.

LAW OF THE UNITED STATES

AS PASSED AT THE FIRST SESSION OF THE FORTY-THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 42.]

AN ACT to facilitate the exportation of distilled spirits, and amendatory of the acts in relation thereto.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That none of the provisions of an act, entitled "An Act to authorize the appointment of shipping commissioners by the several circuit courts of the United States," to supersede the shipping and discharge of seamen engaged in merchant ships belonging to the United States, and for the better protection of seamen, shall apply to sail or steam vessels engaged in the coastwise trade, except the coastwise trade between the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, or in the lake-going trade, or in the trade between the United States and the British North American possessions, or in any case where the seamen are by custom or agreement entitled to participate in the profits or result of a cruise, or voyage.

Approved, June 9, 1874.

LAW OF THE UNITED STATES

AS PASSED AT THE FIRST SESSION OF THE FORTY-THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 43.]

AN ACT to provide for the collection of the duties on spirits, and amendatory of the acts in relation thereto.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated for the service of the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the objects hereinafter expressed, to-wit:

For salaries of envoys extraordinary and ministers plenipotentiary to Great Britain, France, Germany, and Russia, at seven thousand five hundred dollars each, seventy thousand dollars.

For salaries of envoys extraordinary and ministers plenipotentiary to Spain, Austria, Brazil, Mexico, Japan, China, and Italy, at twelve thousand dollars each, eighty four thousand dollars.

For salaries of envoys extraordinary and ministers plenipotentiary to Chili and Peru, at ten thousand dollars each, twenty thousand dollars.

For ministers resident at Portugal, Switzerland, Germany, Belgium, Netherlands, Denmark, Sweden and Norway, Turkey, Ecuador, Colombia, Bolivia, Venezuela, Hawaiian Islands, and the Argentine Republic, at seven thousand five hundred dollars each, one hundred and five thousand dollars.

For minister resident accredited to Guatemala, Costa Rica, Honduras, Salvador, and Nicaragua, to reside at the place that the President may select in any one of the states named, by set-aside appropriations for the consular and diplomatic service approved May twenty-second, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, ten thousand dollars.
