Telegraphic.
Another Indian Engagement.
 AUSTIN, July 20, 1874.—Late intelligence received by Adjutant General Steele, from the Indian Territory, states that on June 28 the Comanches, Kiowas and Cheyennes attacked a settlement at Dotey's Wells, the Panhandle of Texas, and were repulsed with the loss of fifteen killed and twenty-three wounded, and a large number of horses killed.
 Three surveyors in the employ of Hockbush & Armstrong were killed by the Indians near Antelope Hills. Friendly Indians are collected around the Wichita Agency. The warriors and young men are all out on the war path.
 It is reported that a company of United States cavalry were attacked at Otter Creek, and four men killed, and all their horses captured.

Advice from the Indians.
 AUSTIN, July 20, 1874.—The Hon. J. W. Carroll declines to change the time and place of holding the district convention at Brenham.
 A Democratic barbecue will be held on Friday next, at which Gov. Coke, Judge Hancock and others will speak.
 No official details have been received of Maj. Jones's fight with the Indians near Jacksboro. Adjutant Gen. Steel has received advice that on the 9th 75 Indians attacked a small party of scouts belonging to Captains Stevens and Ickerd's companies. The scouts were so seriously outnumbered that they avoided the encounter.

Miscellaneous.
 An unknown man was killed near Brenham by the train.
 Capt. J. L. Halbert, a lawyer of Corsicana, died suddenly.
 A St. Louis flouring mill is to be opened at Austin immediately.
 Judge D. M. Prendegast has been appointed Judge of the Waco District in place of Judge Banton, deceased.
 Gov. Coke says the State bonds will not be hypothecated, but sold, or brought back.
Crop Report.
 HUNTSVILLE, July 20.—The cotton worm has made its appearance in one or two localities but seem to have occasioned no alarm. The planters say they entertain no fears that they will injure their crops. The prospects for good crops are better than for several years. Farmers are sanguine.
 ROCKDALE, July 20.—There are no complaints of cotton worms in this section or west of here. All reports agree that the crops, both of corn and cotton, are looking fine in the counties of Bell, Milam and Williamson.
 From forty to sixty cars of stock are shipped each week to St. Louis, some going to Sereport.
 JACKSONVILLE, July 20.—Can not hear a single farm where cotton worms have made their appearance, but the fly has made its appearance. Farmers say that the worm cannot be hatched and do any material damage in less than seven weeks. The crop prospects are better than at any time during the past ten years.
 TRINITY, July 20.—All persons from Polk, Angelina and this county are in high spirits over the promise of large crop yields.
 Merchants are so encouraged that they have already begun to make preparations for large stocks of goods for the fall trade. The worms have not made their appearance with the exception of a very few in some localities.
 The commission merchants and others anticipate a much larger crop this year than for several years past.
 MADRID, July 20.—A proclamation has been issued supplementary to the decree establishing a state of siege. It declares that charges of sedition or conspiracy against the State shall be tried by court-martial and persons convicted of interfering with the operation of railroads or telegraphs shall suffer death.

The Grangers are beginning to complain loudly that the Waco Express, Coke's organ, has been also chosen as the organ of the Grangers. The Grangers can do them no good, and the sooner they find it out the better.

CHICAGO, since the late fire, has, in a public meeting, resolved to remove or destroy the wooden buildings within the fire limits, and to allow no more wooden buildings within the corporate limits.

The election this fall for six Texas Congressmen is exciting the people of the State during this hot weather very unnecessarily. It will be only for the benefit of six men, and probably of no value to the State. Why should the hard working people fret themselves to death for a few politicians?

WHAT are the Grangers going to do in the Congressional elections this fall? It is time they should be heard from. It would be just as well for them to step in and clean out all the old politicians in the State, and we should be glad to see it. It might give us good farmers in their places.

BREWER was asked by Mrs. Tilton for advice, at the time Tilton was crazily running after the free love woman, Woodhall and Claffin. He advised her, if she could not reclaim him, to quit him. This he afterwards felt to be wrong, and apologized for it, which Tilton accepted. This, we believe, to be the whole quarrel, after reading everything that has appeared on the subject.

Mr. Simpson, an old planter, living near Shreveport, La., was recently murdered, and the murderer was hung by the people. This is the third mob law execution in that region. The Galveston News tears a war of races during the fall campaign. We hope good men of all parties will unite to prevent such a horrible disaster, which can result in nothing but the direst evils to all concerned. Our people must learn that mob law only aggravates the evils they seek to remedy.

WE are glad to believe that the epidemic of bloodshed and crime which has afflicted Texas for six months past, ever since Cokery "broke out," is beginning to subside, from exhaustion, if from nothing else. The Judges, District Attorneys, and juries seem to be fully doing their duty everywhere, and this is doing more good than anything else. Good Judges, Sheriffs, District Attorneys, magistrates, and juries can save the State from such things, and nothing else can. No other sort should either be appointed or elected.

THE CROPS, in nearly every part of Texas are of promising character. Rain has been plentiful, except in a few sections. A tremendous corn crop is already assured. This will give to the hundreds of thousand of immigrants who will come to the State this fall and winter an abundance of cheap food, bread and meat. And the knowledge of this abundance will greatly increase the immigration. It is also estimated that fully five hundred thousand bales of cotton will be made in Texas this year, if no disorder befalls the crop. But little fear is now entertained of the cotton worm. The rains have generally ceased, and the worms cannot flourish in dry hot weather during the months of July and August. Upon the whole, Texas is growing rich and great with wonderful rapidity.

THE GALVESTON NEWS is now leading off vigorously, in pursuance of its former gentler motions, in favor of independent journalism. This is in harmony with the spirit of the age, and with the present tendencies of journalism throughout the country. In the present demoralized condition of both politics and society in this country, consequent upon our great civil war, and the inordinate greed of gold which subsequently supervened, and from which no party administration is able to deliver us, a thoroughly brave, virtuous, and independent press is now the only reasonable and reliable hope of the future of the United States, and of American civilization.

And so it is in our State affairs. We have had four years of a Republican administration, and we are now in the first year of a Democratic administration. Bitter partyism has, all this time, blighted, blasted, and burnt to cinders, the fairest flowers and fruits of the most promising young civilization in the richest and grandest and most beautiful country in the world. With our claiming or trying to show that one party has been more to blame than the other, we can safely say that the bitter partisan spirit which has raged, rioted, and ravaged in Texas ever since the close of the war, has been the poisonous simoon that has blasted the better virtues of Texas society, and left the State a social wilderness, a desert of crime, of blood, and utter lawlessness.

Texas society possesses the elements of all the virtues, and the germs of a high and excellent civilization. But the very worst men that ever cursed any country in the world have too much controlled in the politics, the elections, the offices, and the administrations of both parties ever since the war—speculators, trading politicians, adventurers, office hunters, speculators in office, desperadoes, scoundrels, thieves, murderers, gamblers, bribers and bribe-takers, prostitutes, whisky dealers, and the like. This description is true, and we can prove every word of it.

An honest, independent press, of both parties, is our only hope. Shall we have it? A strictly partisan press is an unmitigated curse.

OUR AUSTIN LETTER.

The Financial Condition of the State—The School Fund Depleted—The Public Entirely in the Dark, &c.

AUSTIN, July 19, 1874.
It was one of the boasts of Coke and the Democracy that when Davis and his administration were supplanted, the credit of the State would be instantly restored, that northern and foreign capitalists would eagerly seek investment in our State securities. Coke came into office, trampling the constitution under foot in his ruthless entry, he and his legislative accomplices with public officers, high bench, the judiciary from the Supreme Bench to the district judges, the money of the State was squandered to impelment sales and selling committees; the last administration was sited to furnish Coke a sufficient capital. The pledge made to the Democracy to call a constitutional convention was violated, and the legislation of the 14th was characterized by its folly, its vindictiveness and its worthlessness. State credit did not improve, and Coke came out in a beautiful communication, saying that within "hundred days" the obligations of the State would be met, and that he meant what he said. The Legislature adjourned, carrying with it fewer regrets on the part of the people than any Legislature that ever assembled at the Capital. The 14th Legislature, corrupt though it was, came in brilliant contrast with the 14th, and the growing dissatisfaction with Coke became universal, even in extreme democratic quarters. The public printing scam had stamped the entire set, Coke, Clark, and Deberry, as men of very low and ordinary resources, and the failure to settle the International Railroad question left an unhealthy flavor in the public mouth.

Moody, a very respectable Galvestonian, was chosen to go to New York and bring back the money Coke had promised within a hundred days. A man named Creery took charge of Moody and put up with him in New York. Creery was arrested shortly after arriving in New York as a swindler, and the city press commented upon the fact that the Texas financial agent kept suspicious company. The hundred days expired, Moody returned empty-handed. Even the capitalists who had offered Gov. Davis eighty-five cents for the bonds would have nothing to do with Coke. Moody in relating his experience to a friend said that all bonds signed by Gov. Davis were negotiable, but that the impression had gotten abroad that Coke was

illegally elected and was never properly inaugurated into office. All bonds signed by Coke were looked upon with suspicion. Then came the International Railroad case. Coke's determination to have it decided adversely to the road was evident the moment he appointed Ferris to turn the scale. And now Moody has gone on again to New York, and it is given out that he will secure funds. How? There is only one way that Coke can get money at the north, to wit: By appointing some New York shyster State agent, giving him entire control of the bonds. By such arrangement perhaps a hundred thousand dollars may be obtained, and then the State will be sold out. The New York agent will control the price of the bonds, and the story of Louisiana, Florida and South Carolina will be repeated.

How does Coke's manage to get along without money? The Legislature was paid; the departments must be kept up, the frontier forces must be paid and his favorites fed. When Gov. Davis was displaced there was something over \$150,000 available school fund in the Treasury. Since that \$100,000 have been paid in as interest, and one fourth the general revenue, making in all something over \$400,000 available school fund, and about \$300,000 general revenue. This money business is kept a secret. No showing has been made since Coke came into office. But persons well posted say that the available school fund has been exhausted, used for general revenue purposes, and that Coke contemplates using the permanent school fund to save himself, which accounts for the desperate efforts to sell bonds or borrow money abroad. Meanwhile, the price of State warrants has fallen below the lowest quotation of Gov. Davis's administration.

The Coke administration is looked upon as the weakest and most ordinary ever entrusted with the management of the affairs of our State. Coke is a timid, time-serving politician, very malignant towards his opponents, whether Republicans or Democrats. He had attempted to build up a Coke party, and in six months time has made himself the most unpopular executive Texas ever had. O. K.

A Horrible Double Murder at New Braunfels.

NEW BRAUNFELS, July 23, 1874.
A horrible murder was committed here last night, at one o'clock. Miss Emma Voelcker, and Mrs. Wm. Faust, wife of the druggist here, who were sleeping together, were found dead, having been killed with an ax. The murderer is supposed to have been committed for the purpose of robbery. The murderer is believed to have worn black boots and white clothes, and to have taken the road to San Marcos. A. L. KESSLER, Mayor New Braunfels.

Texas News.

The Waco Advertiser says that a U. S. Engineer is now surveying the Brazos from Waco down, to ascertain if it can be made navigable.

District Attorney Pearce gives the opinion that owners of animals are not required to have them inspected unless they are to be driven out of the county; but the purchaser must obtain a bill of sale, certified by the inspector.

The Austin Statesman mentions the arrival of five carloads of bonded goods and a train of twelve large Chisholm wagons, with sixteen mules, four abreast, to a wagon, were busy loading apparatus to starting for our sister Republic, on the other side of the Rio Grande.

Thirteen fresh convicts have been sent from Austin to Huntsville.
