**Mrs. Tilton Speaks.**

NEW YORK July 23.—Mrs. Tilton's statement is published. She solemnly avers, long before the Woodhull publication, that she knew by instruction and direct statement her husband to have repeated to her very near relative and friends the substance of the accusations which shock the moral sense of the entire community this day. Many times, she says, when hearing that certain persons had spoken ill to him, he sent me to chide them for so doing, and then and there I learned he had been before me with his calumnies against myself. So I was speechless. The reiteration in his statement that he had persistently striven to hide these so-called facts is utterly false, as his hatred for Mr. Beecher has existed for many years, and the determination to ruin Mr. Beecher has been the one aim of his life, to gain which, the holiest love a wife ever offered has been recklessly sacrificed. And added to this, he endeavors, like the early scandal of Mrs. Woodhull, to make my own words condemn me, which has no parallel. I now add that, notwithstanding all misrepresentation and anguish of soul, I owe to my acquaintance and friendship with Mr. Beecher, as to no other human instrumentality, that encouragement in my mental life, and that growth toward the divine nature which enabled me to walk daily in a lively hope of life beyond. The charges in articles seven, eight and nine are fearfully false in each and every particular. The letter referred to in Mr. Tilton's paragraph was obtained from me by importunity, and by representations that it was necessary for him to use in the depending difficulty with Mr. Bowen. I was then sick nigh unto death. I signed whatever he required, without knowing or understanding its import. The paper I have never seen, and do not know what statements it contained. In charge 8, a letter of mine, addressed to Mr. Francis Moulton, is quoted to prove I never desired a pardon, or a separation, or was advised by Mr. and Mrs. Beecher to leave my husband. I reply: the letter was of Mr. Tilton's own make, which he induced me to copy and sign as my own act. The implication that the harmony of the home was unbroken until Mr. Beecher entered it as a frequent guest and friend, is a lamentable satire upon the household, where he himself, years before, laid the corner stone of free love, and deconstructed it up to the time of my departure, so that the atmosphere was not only godless, but impure for my children, and in the effort throes of agony, I would fain lift my daughters and all womanhood from the insidious and diabolical teaching of these later days. His frequent efforts to prove me insane or weak minded and insignificant and mean, rank in the category of heartlessness, selfishness and falsehood, having its climax in his present endeavor to convince the world that I am or ever have been unable to distinguish between an innocent and a guilty love. In summing up the whole matter Mrs. Tilton says: I affirm myself before God to be innocent of the crime laid upon me. I have never been guilty of adultery with "H. W. B." in thought or deed; nor has he ever offered to me an indecorous or improper proposal. She says she saw with blinding eyes that Tilton had put into execution the almost daily threat of his life. He lived to crush out Mr. Beecher's superior, and he lay in his path; that wife, children or reputation, if need be, should fall before his purpose.

NEW YORK, July 23.—Beecher has made a supplemental statement in reply to Tilton denying in toto the charge of the latter, and warmly defending Mrs. Tilton from the accusations of her husband, for for whom he says he cherishes a pure feeling, such as a gentleman might honorably offer to a Christian woman, and which she might receive and reciprocate without moral scruples. He repels with dignity every imputation which reflects upon her honor or his own. He concluded: "I do not propose to analyze and contest, at this time, the extraordinary paper of Mr. Tilton, but there are two allegations which I cannot permit to pass without special notice. They refer to the only two incidents which Mr. Tilton has witnessed personally; the one an alleged scene in my house while looking over engravings, and the other a chamber scene in his own house.

His statements concerning these are absolutely false. Nothing of the kind ever occurred, nor any semblance of any such things.

MARSHALL, TEXAS, had a great fire on the 23d instant; loss over \$100,000.

KAUFFMAN COUNTY is unanimously for Throckmorton. The Grayson county convention did the same yesterday; and Judge Hare sent in a letter withdrawing from the race. Judge Good withdrew some days since.

THE rumors in regard to General Longstreet having been selected by the President for the Russian mission are gaining ground, and the New Orleans Bulletin is inclined to think they are true.

HOUSTON has contracted with Chas. Morgan to construct her ship channel. This will bring Morgan's steamers, and all others, up to Houston—the dream of many years past. It will put Houston on equal ground with Galveston.

THE North German Gazette says, in reference to the recent outrages by Garlists: "Germany, in behalf of outraged European civilization, will seek a final means to teach the Carlists that murderers of captured Germans will not remain unpunished."

Nathan Isaacson has been arrested charged with firing the building that caused the late conflagration at Chicago. The testimony goes to show that he offered a peddler, named Wolfson, one hundred dollars; that he had once attempted the deed unsuccessfully, and then boasted that he would have better success next time.

THE Secretary of the Navy has addressed a complimentary letter to Ensign T. C. Spencer, who, it will be recollected, acted very gallantly on the occasion of the capsizing of a boat of the Fortunate on the Gulf of Mexico. He has also complimented Boatswain's Mate Christopher Fowler for heroism at the same time, and has awarded a medal of honor to him. The Fortunate was in port in Galveston last week.

PRINCE BISMARCK has received—so, at least, the voracious man at the far end of the cable says—precisely one thousand congratulatory dispatches on his escape. With one thousand yellow envelopes, delivered by one thousand messengers, littering up his estate, Bismarck probably is rather sorry that that inspired tailor's apprentice missed him.

FRENCH AFFAIRS are now beginning to assume a shape to be more definitely understood on this side of the water. McMahon refuses to commit himself to either the Monarchy, the Empire, or the Republic. On the 23d President MacMahon in response to a deputation of members of the Assembly, said he was not summoned to power in order to restore either monarchy or the empire. His acts proved he would not participate in such enterprises. The law which created the Septennate still less imposed upon him the task of constituting a definite republic. Piers' bill offered him nothing, but by isolating him from the Conservatives, by whose aid he wished to govern, would deprive him of much. Consequently the ministers would declare in his name that he rejected the project.

In conclusion, he expressed the opinion that the proclamation of a Republic might disturb order and peace; but if the laws he asked for were voted, Septennate would become the government, and be calculated to inspire confidence and respect.

THE abduction of the boy Ross, in Philadelphia, is the first instance of child-stealing which is a parallel to the cases of such crimes prevalent in England. There is no unpracticed hand in the present instance, and we incline to the belief the instigators of the abduction are either the principals in the affair, or the principals are the instigators, and both are English. The whole affair is a systematic arrangement from the beginning to the end. The stealing of the children from their play-ground in the lane reads like an incident in an English romance; the deliberate abduction of one of the children and the release of the other is the second chapter, the anonymous letters written to the distracted father, with a demand for money about equal to his resources among his friends, the finale. All this shows a shrewd calculation, a deliberate execution of the crime, and a practice in such matters which lends a security to the entire transaction by no bungling attempts to elude detection, and baffled the police.

## OUR AUSTIN LETTER.

The Return of Democracy to Power—A Review With Some Reflections Upon the Six Months of Coke's Rule.

AUSTIN, July 24, 1874.

But six months of the administration of Mr. Coke have passed into history, and yet it is as old as if he were about to make his bow to a worthier and better successor, and the year A. D. 1873 had already dawned upon us. What six months have chronicled, tells the whole story.

Amid the shouts of a mob, drunk with victory, Mr. Coke ventured to trample under foot the Constitution of the State; to declare the "will of the majority" was above the Constitution, above the law of the land, above the decisions of the highest judicial tribunal of the State—above even the laws of God, for perjury was deemed no crime if committed in the name of "the majority." He forced himself into the office of Governor by revolutionary violence rather than wait a few days for the constitutional term of his predecessor to expire, thereby injuring and disturbing the peace and dignity of the State—Coke and his followers were frantic over the sight of place and power, and could not maintain even the semblance of decency when about to seize upon the government. They spurned the Constitution when it came in their way. The majority had willed that a convention be called to frame another Constitution.

The first task of power, acted like magic upon Coke and his servile Legislature, it seemed to inspire them with the desire to make themselves officially perpetual. The command of "the majority" was disobeyed, a constitutional convention will not be held.

But "the majority" who had borne this unenviable rule to the chair of State, must be amused, a tub must be thrown to the party whole, even if the people pay for the entertainment. The political goliath was erected at the Capitol, the 14th Legislature acted as the inquisitorial court and Coke performed the part of executioner then began the trials of the District Judges, long to be remembered in Texas history, and the public was treated to the spectacle of the head of some District Judge dropping into the basket of the executioner, almost daily. Besides the judicial inquisition sundry investigation committees were set on foot to root out and bring to light the misdoings of the Davis administration. The International Railroad bill had its committee; the asylums and public charities had their committees; the departments had their committees; witnesses even summoned from a distance and after all this expenditure of time and money one State official has been arraigned and held for trial upon the embowered evidence of a witness who has fled the State.

In the midst of this desperate search after accusations against the last administration, that worthy trio, Coke, Clark and Deberry used the numble-fingered Montgomery to extract the printing bids. And democratic honesty was illustrated in Coke by his distribution of public patronage to his personal favorites.

But failure has overtaken the malignant schemes of the moral and physical coward who calls himself our "Governor." Capital drew in its cautious hand and left Coke scratching an empty treasury, and numbering over to himself the words, "I mean what I say."

Following his lawless example and remembering his cold-blooded words in justification of one of the most cowardly murders ever committed in our State, the desperado and the murderer, and that large class of men who believe in mob violence seemed for a time to break loose with the violence that attends freedom after long restraint, and the six months of Coke's rule has been the bloodiest period since reconstruction. Forced by public opinion he issues a proclamation, commanding the local authorities to put down the violence which he admits himself powerless to deal with. We have returned to the ornamental style of government, when the people are told that the good old democratic style is, for the Governor to draw his salary and hurl the penal code at

the heads of the county officials. The people must take care of themselves, or the sublime doctrine of "local self-government" might be disturbed.

The Coke Legislature was marked by its narrow-minded political bigotry, by its desire to trample on the rights of the minority, by its vain boasts, its persecution of political opponents, its contempt for the Constitution, its bad faith towards its own party, and its idiotic management of the most vital interests of the State. Texas had begun to bloom in the prospect of a brighter and more prosperous future; her reputation for law and order, for education and civilization, for enterprise and its generous reward, had gone abroad over the world, and but for the misfortune of the Coke administration there is no estimating the splendid progress Texas would have made in the next four years, as it is the impetus given to her growth by the wisdom of the last administration may hardly serve to bridge over the dark gulf of ruin the Democracy had prepared for us. Reputation sits like a thing of horror on our seath government to day, what else does the act of the 14th Legislature mean that left the issuance of the International Railroad bonds to the decision of the courts? And how will the State recover from the blow aimed at its integrity? Will the Courts be ignored and the Legislature again take it upon itself to decide? Every day the debt grows heavier and the Democratic party will fail in courage, whether it be represented by Governor, by Supreme Court or by Legislature, when the burden is sought to be laid upon its shoulders. It dare not tax the people for educational purposes! It dare not take the responsibility of enforcing the law! Will it have the hardihood to tax the people to pay the International subsidy? No! It will procrastinate, it will promise, but it will never dare to face "the majority" it has promised not to tax.

The failure of the Coke administration even in the short space of time it has been in office, is a forcible illustration of the fact that the return of the Democratic party to power can only be regarded in the light of a dangerous experiment by all reflecting, sober minded men. It is unsuited to the times, it is not in union with the spirit of the Republic. It bears about it a charm that deceives thousands into its support when it is struggling for power, but its failure in the possession of power will prove its final destruction.

## Telegraphic.

### Official Report of Major Jones.

AUSTIN, July 23.—Major Jones's report is dated July 14, 1874. He states that he arrived at Camp Stevens on the 10th inst. On the 11th he moved his company ten miles east, to Salt Creek. On the 12th an Indian trail was discovered east of the creek, and it was pursued to a rocky mountain, from the top of which they could be seen by the Indians. The Indians doubled upon them by descending the mountain on the opposite side, crossing their trail and taking up a position in front of them, and at a favorable opportunity charged them. They numbered from 100 to 150.

Major Jones's command was divided at the time, one-half being on one side of the creek and one-half on the other, and numbering twenty-eight only in all. The charge was on twelve on that side of the creek. Jones ordered them to fall back, when they did, and the two bodies united and then charged and repulsed them, and drove them back two miles, partly through prairie and partly through timber, where they took refuge among the rocks and caves of a mountain ridge. Not being able to dislodge them with so small a force, he formed his men in a ravine and kept up the firing till their firing ceased. Thinking, that, having so large a number, they would not leave that night, he dispatched a courier to Jackboro, fifteen miles distant, for aid, and Capt. Baldwin, with a company of United States cavalry was sent at once, and was in the field at daylight.

Major Jones says: We lost two men killed, D. W. H. Baily, and W. A. Glass, of Captain Stevens's company, and two wounded, Lee Carn, of Capt. Caldwell's company, right arm broken near the shoulder, and Geo. Moore, of Capt. Maltby's company, severe flesh wound in the right leg. We lost twelve horses killed and permanently disabled, and two slightly wounded. Major Jones says he shall have to join Companies B and C, and post them at the head of the Trinity, as the Indians are on the war path, and he is satisfied that they are coming down in large numbers.

### Fatal Shooting Affray.

GRONSBACH, July 23.—Tuesday, at the house of John and Alonzo Anglin, in the country, a quarrel arose between Alonzo Anglin and Jack Miller, a nephew of Mrs. John Anglin. Alonzo Anglin advanced on Miller with an axe-head and a piece of scantling about five feet long, and after being warned several times by Miller, was shot at by Miller nine times, eight balls taking effect, one in each arm, one in the right leg, and five in the body. He has since died. Miller is not yet arrested.

AUSTIN, July 13.—I am glad to correct the statement that Senator W. H. Swift, of the 2nd District, died on the 8th. Letters have been received from him dated the 13th.

The Chief Justice yesterday announced that the court had come to the conclusion to withhold their former decision in the case of Keochler, Commissioner, against Wright. This was a suit for a mandamus to compel the Court to issue patents for the location of lands which were surveyed

by railroad companies and known as the alternate sections. The District Court of Travis granted the mandamus, which, on the Commissioner appealing, the Supreme Court reversed and dismissed the case. This is the third time it has been before them. This will settle forever the locating on school lands. It was a test case. Many thousand acres of land were involved in these suits.

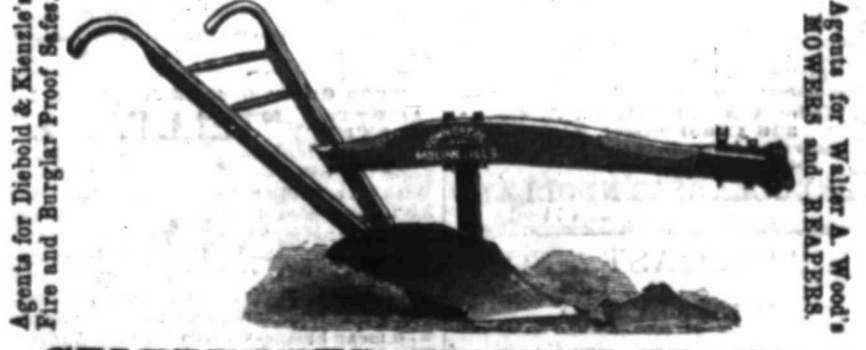
